HONOLULU DAIRYMEN'S ASSOCIATION

WIDE FIELD OF WORK IS COVERED BY LOCAL ASSOCIATED CHARITIES

The semi-annual report of the Associated Charities, for that part of the year from January to June, inclusive, contains statistics of importance. The report shows that the total number of families under care in this time is 255, and the total number of individuals 1170.

The social statistics show that of these persons 36 are widows and five are widowers. There is a wide difference between the number of single women and single men. The number of single women is but 12, while for single men, resident and transient, the number is 92. There are 14 deserted families, three divorced couples and 179 married couples.

Concerning the nativity of the people cared for, the report shows that the Portuguese have a large majority. The Portuguese number 193, the Americans being next with 54. There are

38 Porto Ricans, 35 Hawaiians, 35 Spanish, 14 Chinese, 12 Germans and 10 Russians. Of the remainder there are on the list Finns, Filipinos, English, Mexicans, Scotch, Bornese, Norwegians, Koreans, Italians, Hindus, Swiss, Cubans, Irish and Japanese.

In the relief work report 16 families came under home industry. Regular relief was given to 53 families, and emergency relief to 102. For 59 individuals, medical services were given and employment was secured for 49.

REMAINS OF R. F. DOWNING TAKEN HOME

The remains of the late Russell Downing, member of the Stanford University baseball team who died Sunday from the effects of a miscalculated dive at Waikiki beach, will be taken to California in the steamer Lurline this afternoon. Eight members of the team escort the remains of their dead comrade, while the other four ball players leave in the China.

Friends of the late athlete were given the opportunity of viewing the remains this morning and afternoon at Silva's undertaking establishment, the entire Stanford team and several Honolulu friends paying a last tribute to the dead collegian.

KINDLY CHEER AT OAHU PRISON

Prisoners of Oahu Prison and their share in the national celebration last night, when 250 of them met with as many visitors beneath the great kamaui tree in the prison yard, and took part in a musical program of rare excellence.

High Sheriff Jarrett was host of the evening and Samuel W. Robley, who is active in prison work as a member of the Prison Aid Society, introduced those who took part in the program. Before the program started the prisoners rose en masse and in three rousing cheers voiced their appreciation of Father Valentin, who has been a constant worker among the inmates for ten years past.

Both prisoners and local citizens appeared on the program. A Filipino orchestra from the city made the hit of the evening, and was compelled to respond to repeated encores. The playing of the Mission Orchestra was also very pleasing. Mrs. Hall and Madame Alapai sang several favorite songs and W. R. Farrington read the Declaration of Independence. Several other members were of local talent and pleased the crowd.

The prison squad did well in all the numbers, both musical and athletic. A flag drill and a drill in Butt's manual exercise were heartily applauded by the crowd, and showed careful training. The concert closed with the crowd singing Aloha Oe, Hawaii Pono and the Star Spangled Banner.

SPECULATION ON CUBAN DISCOUNT EFFECT ON SUGAR

Sugar men who read today in the latest issue of Willett & Gray's Sugar Trade Journal some comment on the Cuban sugar duty and discounts are wondering just what effect the decision by the United States court of customs appeals will have on the sales of Hawaiian sugar. Will Hawaiian sugar, being sold on the Cuban basis, be subject to similar rebates because of the Cuban preferential?

Willett & Gray's issue of June 24, explains the discounts as follows:

The difference in market quotations now being made between Cubas and free-duty sugars is possibly owing to a recent decision of the United States Court of Customs Appeals, which states that the duty on Cuba sugar is to be determined by first deducting the 5 per cent discount allowed thereon because of its importation in vessels of United States registry, or of countries with which the United States has treaties, and from the sum thus obtained to make a further reduction of 20 per cent in accordance with the stipulation of the Cuban treaty.

Full-duty 98 test sugar is 1.256c per pound. Deduct 5 per cent, gives 1.1932c per pound. Deduct 20 per cent, gives .9546c per pound as duty on Cuba sugar instead of 1.0048c per pound, as has been collected since March 1, 1914, as stipulated in tariff bill passed October 3, 1913. Under this decision United States appraisers are to recalculate the duties on Cuba sugar collected since March 1, 1914, at the rate of .9546c per pound for 98 test basis instead of 1.0048c per pound, and to refund the difference to the importers. The Cuba sugars in warehouse in bond March 1, 1914, and since withdrawn for consumption will be liquidated at the same basis.

The United States government has objected to the reduction of the 5 per cent on such imports and appealed from the decision of the Court of Customs Appeals to the Supreme Court of the United States, who accept the appeal and will render their decision at their next fall session. In meantime, the present duty on Cuba sugar (1.0048c) will continue to be collected. "It will be noted, however, that in case the United States Supreme Court decides against the government, that the 5 per cent reduction in duties takes effect from the time of the passage of the tariff bill, say October 3, 1913, while the tariff on Cuban sugar of 1.256c, less 20 per cent, was not effective until March 1, 1914.

The 5 per cent discount for this period, October 4, 1913, to March 1, 1914, would apply on the old duty of 1.685c, which, less 5 per cent and 20 per cent, would amount to 1.2906c instead of the 1.348c paid during that time."
