

## HIDALGO RUBBER REORGANIZATION SCHEME IS TOLD

### Statement is Sent to Hawaii Where Certificates are Largely Held

A statement upon the present status of the Hidalgo rubber properties in Mexico, together with a reminder that \$5 per share is needed in the reorganization scheme, was received by mail from San Francisco this morning by certificate holders of La Zacualpa Rubber Plantation Company, La Zacualpa Plantation Company, and Hidalgo Plantation & Commercial Company. The statement is signed by E. R. Stackable, president and manager of the La Zacualpa-Hidalgo Company, which was incorporated last August and is handling the reorganization scheme. Stackable was formerly customs collector here.

Together with lengthy circular letters, there is given the following summary addressed to the certificate holders:

"1. On May 8, 1915, adequate power of attorney was given to one of our directors, authorizing him to transfer the rubber properties to the to-be-formed new Mexican company. Title to the properties will be vested in new Mexican company as soon as the political situation in Mexico will permit.

"2. We are administering the properties now just as completely as if transfer thereof had actually been recorded.

"3. According to the reports received from the plantations about 230,000 pounds of rubber was produced during the calendar year 1914. We have good reports from our representative at La Zacualpa, Mr. Ker, and have every reason to anticipate a good production this year. We have reduced overhead expenses here and on the plantation to a minimum.

"4. Interest, interest coupons, convertible notes and proceeds production properties owing acreage certificate holders old companies to be paid in treasury stock this company.

"5. You must draw the line between this company and the old companies; we are not promoters; we are conservers, and doing our utmost to conserve your properties, and we desire the hearty cooperation of each and every certificate holder.

"6. Voluntary contributions—Those of you who have not already made a contribution of \$5 per share should do so at once. By so doing the liquidation of the mortgage may be greatly facilitated.

"7. In forwarding your certificates, etc., by registered mail the return post office card, signed by this company, is a receipt for the enclosures, and we ask you to accept the same, as it costs us about \$80 in postage alone to mail separate receipts.

"8. Exchange acreage certificates for stock this company with all possible despatch, that mortgage may be liquidated basis low rate exchange now ruling with Mexico.

"9. You should also fill out the forwarding form and those who have already sent in certificates should fill in and forward the assignment. Certificates should be surrendered for exchange on or before August 1, 1915.

"10. We request you to give this matter prompt attention."

occupation. In the city jail in Chicago, alone, they feed 1000 prisoners in half an hour.

"One of the things which struck me as being very favorable was a hospital in connection with the house of correction in Chicago, where all emergency cases are handled and where no questions are asked.

**Saw Seattle's Reclamation.**

"I also investigated the reclamation of an entirely new waterfront for the port of Seattle, which is now being carried on under the direction of the board of harbor commissioners. The port of Honolulu for the month of June had less than 10 per cent of the shipping done in Seattle and San Francisco."

Mr. Forbes also arranged for the designing of two pilot boats, one for Hilo and the other for Kahului. The designs are being made in Seattle. The boats will cost about \$300 each. They will be 35 feet long and develop a speed of 10 knots an hour.

At present the board of harbor commissioners of Seattle is engaged in the construction of many wharves and also several reinforced concrete grain elevators, says Mr. Forbes. The last bond issue was for \$8,000,000 and is being spent for this work. Mr. Forbes also inspected several waterfronts on the great lakes.

**Much Unemployment.**

"Speaking of labor conditions throughout the country," he continued, "in Chicago alone there are 150,000 mechanics out on strike. The strike has tied up about \$70,000,000 worth of construction work. Work around Seattle is fairly plentiful. The only drawback is the closing down of the lumber mills, there not being a sufficient exportation of lumber.

"An interesting feature of my trip was a visit to the municipal dock at Tacoma, where the local steamers, and the steamers running between Seattle

## HILO'S FOURTH PLEASES CROWDS; MANY FEATURES

### Visitors From All Parts of the Islands are Attracted By Varied Program

A large party of Honolulu folks returned this morning from Hilo after having spent the holidays in Hilo and at the Volcano House.

Hilo celebrated this year's Fourth of July in great style. There was "something doing" all day. The celebration began on Saturday evening when fireworks and a band concert attracted many to Mookheau park. Thousands gathered from all parts of the island. On Sunday afternoon there were two ball games which proved exciting. The Hilo Iron Works defeated the Ukonomine nine to the tune of 11 to 6 and George Desha's bunch won a game easily from the J. A. C.'s, 19 to 6.

On the morning of July 5 the whole town turned out in the rain to witness one of Hilo's largest parades, headed by the 4th Cavalry band. Company M, N. G. H., came next with Capt. Easton in command. The Hilo band led the fire department crew. The cadets from the training ship Newport followed with their band and made a good showing. The Honomu band, consisting of 20 school boys all under the age of 15, were next in line, and were applauded along the route. A long string of automobiles closed up the parade.

Aquatic sports at Kuhio wharf drew a large crowd.

The automobile races at the Mookheau park drew the largest crowd in the afternoon. Over 5000 spectators were present and many automobiles entered the various events. The 4th Cavalry band played during the afternoon.

The day came to a close with a dance in the Hilo armory, which was packed to the doors.

and Tacoma land. This has proven to be profitable and it is well regulated under a commission.

"I also appeared before the board of engineers in Washington, D. C., but only had a conference with the acting chairman. I took up with him matters pertaining to the local waterfront, and found the board to be in sympathy with the work of the harbor commission.

"I laid before the board our recent legislation which gives the harbor commission jurisdiction over certain waterfront property, etc., and was assured the board would approve and support our authority as vested in us by the recent legislative body."

**Conferred With Secretary Lane.**

Forbes spent some time with Frank L. Lane, secretary of the interior. The secretary was quite familiar with certain conditions in the islands and inquired at some length on other matters with which he was less familiar, he continued.

"I also took up with the board of engineers in Washington, D. C., the danger to our wharf structures owing to the uncompleted breakwater." Mr. Forbes went on, "I requested that the board take up with Col. Bromwell the question of expedition. I stated that Col. Bromwell was doing everything in his power to have the work completed; that it was not my idea to make a complaint but to simply urge the breakwater's completion."

"At the present time there is a bill before Congress for the amendment of the present public utilities law. I was requested that the public utilities commission be represented before the committee on Pacific Islands and Porto Rico at the next session of Congress, at which time the matter will be taken up."

**Believes Act Will Pass.**

The amendment provides that all franchises approved by Congress be brought under the jurisdiction of the public utilities commission. Mr. Forbes says that from the study which already has been given the amendment, its passage is reasonably assured.
