

# ATTENDANCE AT CONFERENCE IS BIG SURPRISE

### More Delegates Than Expected at Ninety-Third Evangelical Association Meeting

At 9 o'clock this morning Kaunakapili church was filled with the ministers and delegates who came from the other islands and from the Oahu churches to be present at the ninety-third annual conference of the Hawaiian Evangelical Association.

Rev. G. L. Kopa of the Kohala Hawaiian church led the half-hour devotional service. This was followed by a spirited address of welcome by Rev. Henry K. Foeppel, the moderator of the conference. Rev. E. S. Timoteo, pastor of the Waihee church at Lahaina, responded in a very happy vein.

The completion of the roll call showed a very large representation from the churches over the entire group and many more delegates were present than were expected by the committee in charge. In accordance with the constitution of the association the moderator appointed various standing committees to attend to the work of the conference. The program committee immediately reported through Rev. John P. Erdman, and submitted a complete order of exercises for the entire session. Rev. Henry P. Judd, acting secretary of the Hawaiian Board, detailed the changes that had been voted in the board in its constitution during the past year. These dealt with minor matters except in the appointment of a new committee of the board, called the ways and means committee, which consisted of the officers of the board, a few of the general superintendents and the business agents from the other islands—Rev. John M. Lydgate of Kaula, Rev. R. B. Dodge of Maui and Rev. A. S. Baker, M. D., of Kona, Hawaii.

Rev. Stephen L. Desha of Hilo spoke of the special memorial fund of \$200, which had been raised among the Hawaiian churches for the purpose of a memorial to the American Board missionaries. Mr. Desha, who was followed by other speakers on the same subject, thought this money should go into the new board building and especially into the room which would be used as an assembly room for the board. This idea of Mr. Desha's met with general favor and was so passed by the association.

Lengthy reports from the island associations occupied the remainder of the morning's session.

The meeting of special interest held tonight at the Kaunakapili church will be a memorial service for Rev. William B. Olsson. The speakers will be Dr. Doremus Gendler, Rev. Stephen L. Desha, Rev. Akalio Akana, and Mr. J. M. Kibben. This service promises to be one of very unusual interest and to all the public is cordially invited.

This afternoon the first session of the annual meeting of the Hawaiian Board is being held, and the first meeting of the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Associations.

# WIRELESS WILL LINK FAR-FLUNG PACIFIC ISLANDS

Star-Bulletin today concerning this reported move, said that he believed it correct and then told of the plans of the Mutual Telephone Company which bear out the despatch.

Here in brief are some of the plans well-developed:

Establish regular communication with Apia, British Samoa.

Establish regular communication with Suva, Fiji.

Establish regular communication with Papeete, Tahiti Islands.

Secure through communication with Australia by wireless from Honolulu to Apia, thence by wireless to Awanui, New Zealand, thence by cable to Australia.

Ultimately Honolulu, it is hoped, will be linked up by the radio system with such far-off islands as the Marshalls and the Gilberts. A year or so ago, when the Germans still held the Marshall Islands, their station had been heard by the Honolulu station.

The Mutual Wireless company is now taking up with the British administrator in Apia the plan to establish regular communication with this town and to arrange for relaying messages to and from New Zealand and Australia.

The Tahiti islands are French possessions. Dr. A. Marques, French consul in Honolulu, is much interested in the proposal to link Tahiti with Honolulu by wireless and has taken the matter up with the Tahiti authorities.

The despatch this morning that a French engineer is expected to supervise the erection of a powerful plant at Tahiti recalls the fact that a bombardment of Papeete by German cruisers put the wireless station there partly out of commission. The cruisers Gieseler and Scharnhorst, steaming swiftly across the Pacific to join the naval rendezvous off the South American coast, stopped at Papeete long enough to wreck a good part of the waterfront. The wireless plant was badly damaged. The receiving apparatus was not destroyed but the sending apparatus was hopelessly smashed. It will be necessary to rebuild the sending station.

Honolulu Wireless Center.

Discussing the steady growth of wireless on the Pacific, Manager Balch said today:

"Honolulu will be the wireless center of the world—in fact, is practically that today."

The service with the South Sea Islands, outlined above will be a night service. The Mutual Telephone Company's new plant at Waiawa is not equipped for day work so there is expected to be any necessity of it. The traffic is such that it can be handled effectively during the night hours. The growth of wireless since the company opened communication with Tutuila, American Samoa, is steady. It is expected that a large part of the business will be "through," that is, between these South Sea points and the Pacific coast, New York or Europe. From Honolulu to the Pacific coast messages are routed by whatever method—cable or transoceanic wireless—the sender chooses.

When Honolulu opens wireless communication with the Orient—the plan of the Marconi company—and when Honolulu is the connecting link for the round-the-world radio system planned by the United States government, Oahu and this city will be the true wireless center of the world.

# LOCAL AND GENERAL

A meeting of the public utilities commission will be held in the rooms of the commission, Kaulaoluani building, at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

A suit for divorce has been filed in circuit court by Mrs. Mary Jeanne Taite against Albert James Taite. The complaint alleges that the Taitees have been married since May 15, 1915, and that soon after the marriage Taite "began a course of cruel, brutal and inhuman treatment."

A meeting of the Promotion Committee, scheduled for next Friday afternoon, may be postponed because of the absence of several of its members from the territory. The directors of the Chamber of Commerce adjourned yesterday afternoon, for lack of a quorum, without transacting any business.

The printing of the revised school laws probably will be completed today. Henry W. Kinney, superintendent of public instruction, will deliver copies to every teacher in the employ of the department. Copies also may be had by other persons interested in local school work. The laws were revised by the school commission at its annual meeting last May.

To try the case of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company against the American schooner Hakaya, Judge Sanford B. Dole and Deputy Clerk Foster Davis will leave for Hilo in the Mauna Kea on July 31 or August 4. This is the first time in several years that a special session of the court outside of Honolulu has been found necessary.

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# MAUI WILL NOT CONTINUE FUND FOR PROMOTION

### Clerk of Supervisors Notifies Committee That \$50 Monthly Contribution Ceases

Although the merchants of Honolulu alone are contributing about \$20,000 each year to the support of the Hawaii Promotion Committee, the Maui board of supervisors cannot see its way clear to continue its contribution of \$50 a month to the committee.

This information came to Albert P. Taylor, acting secretary of the committee, this morning in a letter from W. F. Kaul, clerk of Maui county. The letter reads as follows:

"I am directed by the board of supervisors of the county of Maui to inform you that Maui county does not see its way clear to give you a subsidy of \$50 a month for promotion work."

There was no explanation as to why the appropriation has been discontinued. This amount has been paid regularly for the last two years, according to Mr. Taylor.

"This is the first intimation I have had that the Maui supervisors were figuring on discontinuing their appropriation," said Mr. Taylor today. "If it has anything to do with the building of the rest house on Haleakala, I do not know it, and I don't know whether the money is to be turned over to aid in building the rest house."

About \$30,000 is subscribed, each year for the maintenance of the committee. Of this amount the Honolulu merchants give about \$20,000. The territory gives \$6000 a year and the city and county of Honolulu \$3000 a year. Hawaii gives \$720 a year.
