Concerning the Russian war orders placed in Japan, the Chugai Shogyo reports that the Russo-Japanese trade has made remarkable progress since the war began. The amount of exports to Russia, including war goods, has reached 160,000,000 yen, and there are prospects of further orders, says the Japan Advertiser.

It is reported that Russia has placed another order for 3,000,000 yards of woolen cloth, but the present capacity of all the mills in Japan, including the Senju government mill, is only 1,200,000 yards. This being so the Japanese mills can accept only one-third of the present order.

Moreover, the examination of the goods by the Russian officials in Tokyo is so strict that quite a large portion of the goods have been rejected. This rejection is not confined to goods produced by private companies but also to goods from government factories have also been refused. Besides, a considerable amount of leather goods have also been rejected, and the factories have suffered from the long delay in the delivery and payment.

**PRIZE WINNING ESSAY SOON TO BE PUBLISHED**

Army men here are awaiting eagerly the arrival of the September number of "The Journal of the Military Service Institution of the United States," containing the prize essay written by Major-General Wm. H. Carter, commander of the Hawaiian department, U. S. A.

Many congratulations have been tendered the general this week on his winning the prize, one of the most coveted in American military circles. What makes the award much more significant is the fact that among the competitors were two who had previously won the institution's gold medal, awarded annually for the best essay on a subject of military importance.

Major-General Carter's theme is "The Human Element of War." His essay is 5,000 words in length. The competing manuscripts were handed in May 1. Judging was delayed this year, as of the three judges appointed in 1914 to decide the awards, one was in the Philippines and another at Panama when the time came to look over the essays submitted.

**SHIPPING & WATERFRONT NEWS**

**RUSSIAN ORDERS OF SUPPLIES TOO BIG FOR JAPAN**

**HARBOR NOTES**

The Matson steamer Lurline sails for San Francisco Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

On her way here from Grays Harbor the schooner Repeat is three days out from the Washington port.

The next mail for San Francisco will leave on the steamer Korea Tuesday. The Mongolia and Wilhelmna will both bring mail from the mainland that day.

The Pacific Mail liner Korea will arrive in this port Monday at noon from Yokohama and the Orient. She will resume her voyage to San Francisco Tuesday morning, probably between 9 and 10 o'clock, from Pier 7.

This morning was cleanup day on board the U. S. S. Maryland. The time-honored holystone was in use and sand strewn the decks as a means of removing the stains of coaling yesterday. The big fighting ship's sides were washed with soap and water, so the cruiser will be in the proverbial apple order for Sunday.

The Pacific Mail liner Mongolia is due to arrive here Tuesday morning from San Francisco. If the boat arrives at 10 o'clock or before she will leave the same day for the Orient. On the time of her arrival depends whether she will sail late Tuesday afternoon or early Wednesday morning.

Bringing 27 passengers the Matson steamer Hilonian will arrive here Wednesday from San Francisco. A radiogram to Castle & Cooke, Honolulu agents, this morning gave this information and added that the steamer has 2955 tons of cargo. For Port Allen the boat has 221 tons; for Kahului, 350; Kaanapali, 13, and Hilo 280. The Hilonian will dock at Pier 18.

About 85 cabin passengers can be accommodated here for San Francisco on the Oceanic steamer Sonoma, due to dock here the morning of September 9, and sail for the mainland later that day. A wireless to C Brewer & Company, Honolulu agents, this morning from the Sydney office, stated the ship will have room for that number on arriving here. Passenger agent D. H. Gilmore said this means the steamer can accommodate all who have applied for staterooms to date.

The Nippon Maru is on her way to Yokohama and the Orient today, having left here at 10 o'clock last night. The big liner docked about 4 o'clock yesterday, bringing in 499 sacks of mail from San Francisco. Purser H. J. Grassett said the demand in San Francisco for accommodations on the next T. K. K. liner, Shinyo Maru, was so great two weeks in advance of departure that the company is using some of its second-class cabins for first-class passengers. The Nippon made the run here from San Francisco in six days and four hours.

Having been compiled, a digest of the Seamen's Act is now in the printer's hands and will be presented to members next Tuesday by the maritime affairs committee of the local Chamber of Commerce, which prepared the summary. The digest will enable members to study the situation before voting on the referendum as to whether the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America shall take up the fight for repeal of the act.

**WILHELMINA BRINGS BIG PASSENGER LIST**

Carrying a full passenger list and a sizable cargo the Matson steamer Wilhelmna is due to dock at Pier 15 Tuesday morning. The boat has 150 cabin passengers, 27 steerage, 19 sacks of mail, 106 packages of Wells-Fargo express matter, 33 automobiles and 4082 tons of cargo.

For Hilo the steamer is bringing two autos and 732 tons of cargo, while her Port Allen consignments consist of 391 tons. For Kaanapali she has 102 tons of cargo.

**BARBER COMPANY BOATS TO CUT 'FRISCO CALL**

Half a thousand locomotives and 200,000 tons of steel rails are being carried to Vladivostok for the Russian government by the Barber Steamship Company's boats, according to Charles N. Tiffany of New York, special agent of the line.

Mr. Tiffany was in this city a few hours yesterday while the Nippon Maru was in port. He left last night on the boat for Vladivostok to see that the big cargo is despatched promptly.

While here, the steamship man called on Agent Morse of the American-Hawaiian. He said San Francisco will not in future be a port of call for the Barber freighters, because coal costs too much there. He stated that by having the boats coal at Balboa, Panama, and Comox, B. C., his firm saves from \$2 to \$2 a ton over San Francisco coal prices.

**AMERICA WILL FIX PRICE OF SILVER THROUGHOUT WORLD**

PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—Officials of big mining companies which have their offices here say that as a result of the war this country will become the world's silver market, with New York or San Francisco as the center. London has been for years the silver market, and its quotations have ruled the world, but London is fast losing its hold. China has been going to San Francisco for silver instead of to London, and is paying for the metal in drafts on San Francisco instead of on London.

The director of the mint will open bids at Washington today for 500,000 ounces of silver. It is expected that other requests for bullion will follow because of the demands for subsidiary coins.

San Francisco has been a shipper of the metal recently. In July a shipment of 300,000 ounces was made to Hongkong.

The latest British admiralty list included 12,226 lighthouses, 290 light buoys and 1266 fog signals throughout the world for the guidance of seagoing craft.
