

M'GARN SAYS HE FAVORS BOXING AT SCHOFIELD

Declares Matches Good for Men and Will Not Be Interfered With, if Legal

Gen. Wisser at Schofield Barracks has not submitted to me any ruling from the war department regarding the holding of boxing contests at Schofield, and he probably never will," said U. S. District Attorney Jeff McCarn today.

A news item published this morning was to the effect that Brig. Gen. Wisser, who is in command at Schofield, has been informed by the war department that there is no legal objection to the holding of boxing matches at the barracks, providing no admission is charged to the contests, and that no prizes are awarded to the contestants.

The news item goes on to say that Gen. Wisser, it is understood, will submit the ruling of the war department to the United States district attorney of Hawaii for an indication of his attitude in the premises.

"If I were to go out to Schofield Barracks and tell them not to box, they would probably box me. They ought to, if they didn't," laughed Mr. McCarn.

The district attorney went on to explain that the law regarding boxing contests is plain. He stated that a hundred boxing matches might be held each day, providing no admission was charged, and there were no prizes awarded to the contestants. The district attorney added that he was in favor of matches which were not in violation of the law; that it was excellent exercise, and that such matches would undoubtedly be good for enlisted men, from a purely physical standpoint.

"If I were a general and a district attorney came to me and told me that my men could not have boxing matches that did not conflict with the statute, I would kick the individual off the reservation," the district attorney concluded.

The team, including officers and enlisted men, will sail from Honolulu next Wednesday, September 22, on the Matsushita. There will probably be a four-day stopover in San Francisco en route.

Returning, the team will leave San Francisco for this city November 2, the boat leaving on this date being the first available steamer with which connections can be made, following the termination of the shoot.

TWO ARTILLERY COMPANIES GO ON LONG HIKE

On a practise hike around the eastern end of Oahu, the 10th and 105th companies, Coast Artillery Corps, left Honolulu this morning, to be gone until Monday.

All the men were in high spirits on leaving, and seemed to regard the strenuous trip as a picnic or an excursion party. Lieut.-col. George Blakely, commander at Fort De Russy, is in command of the men, who number 130.

The 10th company is stationed at Fort De Russy, while the 105th is a Fort Ruger company. From this city, the two companies marched to the Paia and are going from there to Waimanalo. On reaching that point, the route for the return trip will be decided and will be different than the outgoing one.

In order that the soldiers' health may not suffer, Maj. Charles A. Ragan, Medical Corps, is accompanying the companies. In his absence from his regular station, at Fort Ruger, his duties there will be performed by Capt. Joseph L. Siner, Medical Corps. Minor infantry tactics and field problems will be worked out by the troops on the trip.

COURT IS WARNED OF NAKASHIMA BEING BAD MAN, SAYS SHERIFF

"Unfortunately we have to have a warrant or a complaint at least before we can arrest a man," said Sheriff Charles Rose this morning, referring to the fact that D. Nakashima, had been left at liberty though he knew he had threatened the life of the woman Fujii, whom he shot twice yesterday morning.

"It was simply a case of unfortunate circumstances," continued the sheriff. "Of course we might have taken some action against the man, but we can't make it a rule to lock up every person against whom we hear the rumor of a suspicion."

"We did know that the man was dangerous and Chief of Detectives Arthur McDuffie warned the court to that effect at the time when the matter was brought to court in the first place. It was for the judge to decide what should be done with the man and the judge did practically all that he could by placing the man under the heavy ball of \$1000."

MAUI JUDGE ENTERS DENIAL OF CHARGES

Denying in general the charges preferred against him, William McKay, district magistrate at Wailuku, Maui, today filed in the supreme court his answer to a petition by Attorney Eugene Murphy of Wailuku, in which the latter seeks the removal of the Valley Island judge.

Murphy's charges against Judge McKay are numerous, embezzlement, forgery and court irregularities being mentioned in the petition and are all emphatically denied in Judge McKay's answer.

The case is scheduled to come before the supreme court for a hearing next Monday morning.
