SHIPPING & WATERFRONT NEWS

STOCK ENOUGH TO START RANCH ON LURLINE

Bringing 55 cabin and 13 steerage passengers, and mules, horses and cows sufficient to start a good-sized blooded stock farm, the Matson steamer Lurline docked at Pier 15 at 9 o'clock this morning from San Francisco.

Capt. Francis M. Edwards reported a pleasant voyage with no rough weather except the first day out. The Lurline brought 398 sacks of mail and her cargo was 5700 tons all told, of which 5300 tons are for Honolulu.

Thirty-one automobiles were unloaded, of which 30 are for this city and one for Kahului. Amidships in wooden stables built on deck, were 24 mules for the Schuman Carriage Company brought from Modoc county, California.

Adjoining the mules were 26 brood mares and one stallion for Maui plantation. Considerable difficulty was experienced in loading the mules to walk down the gangplank to the dock, but they were finally brought ashore safely. Several yearling cows were also on this deck consigned to W. H. Rice of Lihue.

HARBOR NOTES

The navy ships Princeton and Nanshan have arrived at San Francisco. They were here early this month.

The customs house is having a new floor laid and its roof repaired. Underpinning will also be placed for the foundations.

After 14 years' service here Customs inspector F. M. McGrew has resigned because of ill health, and will go to California.

Early today the Japanese steamer Toyohashi Maru, from New York by way of Panama, arrived here to take bunker coal at the Inter-island.

The China will probably sail Thursday afternoon, if she arrives at daylight Thursday morning, as she is expected to do. This will be the boat's last call here.

With three boats lying outside the harbor waiting for inspection, and the F-4 floating in the harbor going into drydock, the waterfront and seaway presented a busy scene early this morning.

Bodies of the F-4's crew reached San Francisco yesterday in the U. S. S. Supply, which left here September 9. The four identified bodies will be sent to relatives, and the others will be interred in the National cemetery at Arlington.

The paymaster's office of the naval station here has awarded to H. Hackfeld & Company a contract for 12,000 barrels of Portland cement. The contract represents approximately \$25,000. The cement is to be used in concrete work at the new Pearl Harbor coaling plant at the naval station there.

Bringing a big coal cargo, 4000 tons, from Japan for the Inter-island, the Japanese freighter Bankoku Maru arrived last night and lay outside the harbor until this morning. The ship is a big boat with a black and white striped funnel, and somewhat resembles Matson steamers in her general lines.

Next mail for San Francisco will leave here tomorrow morning at 19 o'clock in the Matson steamer Matsonia, which will sail from Pier 15 with a big cargo for the mainland, canned and fresh pines, bananas, sugar and miscellaneous freight. Mails for the Matsonia close at 8:30 o'clock tomorrow morning.

That the U. S. S. Brooklyn will stop here for coal on her way to the Orient, is generally believed here by navy men, who say that if she comes direct from the canal she will have to stop at this port to replenish her bunkers, which have a smaller carrying capacity than the Maryland. The Brooklyn left Philadelphia a few days ago for the Orient, to replace the Saratoga, a first-class cruiser, as the flagship of Admiral Winterhalter, commander-in-chief of the Asiatic fleet. The Brooklyn is one of the navy's older ships. She was Admiral Schley's flagship at the battle of Santiago, in the Spanish-American war.
