GARRISON WORK FOR OFFICERS OF C.A.C. ANNOUNCED

Dates for indoor and outdoor instruction of coast artillery troops, and the garrison school for officers, have just been announced here by the Hawaiian Department, U. S. A.

Examinations will begin at the garrison school for officers, Coast Artillery Corps, December 1, at 10 a. m., when written tests in military field engineering will be given. December 23 is the date assigned for military hygiene examinations.

Seacoast engineering examinations will be given February 15, while the test on military topography is scheduled for March 30.

In post-graduate work, problems, exercises and special studies of a practical nature will be features. The order is issued by command of Maj.-gen. W. H. Carter, commanding the Hawaiian Department.
