BULGARIA AND TEUTONS STRIKE HARD IN JOINT CAMPAIGN

PHILLIES TAKE FIRST GAME

ALEXANDER BEATS SHORE IN GREAT CONTEST, 3 TO 1

National League Star Keeps Hits Well Scattered While Philadelphia Sluggers Slam Ball When Runs are Needed

TREMENDOUS CROWD SEES OPENING OF WORLD SERIES

Quaker Park is Jammed; Field is Soggy From Early Rain But Skies are Clear; Boston Threatens in Eighth But Pat Moran's Team Cinches the Game With Two Runs; Paskert's Catch Saves the Day

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Oct. 8.—Grover C. Alexander, star of National League pitchers, won the greatest triumph of his great career today when he emerged victor in the first battle of the 1915 world's championship baseball series. Philadelphia beat Boston 3 to 1 and Alexander outpitched the sensational young Ernest Shore, relied on by Manager Carrigan of Boston to start the Red Sox with a win.
Excellent defense was shown by both teams but Boston erred in judgment at some critical moments while Pat Moran's Phillies went the nine innings in magnificent form.

Another player jumped into the limelight today. Ernie Shore, a young man who had never been a big factor in baseball before, pitched up to Alexander's standard for seven innings. Carrigan had said that Shore would give a good account of himself. He did. He held the heavy hitters of the Quakers to five hits in the nine innings of play. The North Carolina boy lost, but he fought on to the end against the greatest batsman in baseball today.

The Philadelphia players scored three runs on five hits and made one error. Boston scored eight hits, made one run and one error. It was expected that the fielding of the Boston team would be featured, but today the Quakers played bang-up ball throughout, and while the Red Sox made eight safe hits off the great Alexander, they could annex but one run during the day. Defensively the Phillies showed up better than was expected of them, while the Sox did not at all shine in this department.

MORAN BESTS CARRIGAN

Moran outwitted Carrigan today in the big battle of the first day of the series. Philadelphia used better judgment throughout, and the banner for the day's battle of wits goes to the Philadelphia manager. Boston faltered in the critical moments of the game, while the Quakers played a game that was filled with excellent judgment. Time and again Moran would seize an opportunity and when the Red Sox wavered the "Miracle Man" would come to the front with new tactics.

The work of both pitchers was good, but there was nothing of the sensational ball throughout, and were supported by wonderful fielding. The Philadelphia team started the scoring in the fourth when they hit Shore and drove one run across the plate. In the eighth the Red Sox braced and scored one run. In this inning the great play of the day was made. Gardner was at bat with a man on base when he reached for one of Alexander's fast balls and drove it far into center field. It looked like a homer for the Boston third sacker, and meant a lead for the Boston team, but Paskert raced far out to the edge of the crowd and as the ball was falling to the ground made one long dive and got it.

This play was one of the greatest that has ever been performed in a world series game. In the last of the eighth inning the Boston defense crumbled and the Quakers scored two runs which gave them the victory, as Boston could do nothing with Alexander in the final inning.

Alexander fanned six men in the game, while Shore sent two Quakers back to the bench via the strike-out route. Alexander passed two men and Shore walked four.

The official attendance was announced at 19,343, with half that number unable to get into the park. The receipts were \$51,066.

STEAMER ASHORE ON NORTH COAST

STRIKE TROUBLES IN ARIZONA MAY CREATE INTERNATIONAL SITUATION

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 8.—The British consul here has telegraphed to Governor Hunt of Arizona asking that protection be afforded British mining interests in the region of Arizona where the strikers have caused grave concern. British mining property around the Giffon and Morenci districts is said to be menaced. The action of the consul is based on a complaint he has received from 12 British interested in the mines.

CLIFTON, ARIZ., Oct. 8.—Additional militia arrived here today and are camped at a point commanding the railroad and mining camps.

FRANCISCO VILLA AT JUAREZ TO CONFER WITH U. S. CONSUL CAROTHERS

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 8.—News has come from across the border that Gen. Francisco Villa has arrived at Juarez to confer with the United States consul there, George C. Carothers, formerly of Torreon, on the situation.

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 7.—An official despatch from Juarez reports that Gen. Rosalio Hernandez, who was reported to have revolted from the Villa forces, was shot by his own men when they learned of his intended defection.

SAY PLAN PROGRESSING TO MAKE YUAN REAL EMPEROR

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 8.—The London Standard declares in an article today that the proposed great military review in Peking in celebration of the fourth anniversary of the founding of the republic has been abandoned in consequence of the discovery that military leaders intended forcibly to crown President Yuan Shih-Kai emperor. The monarchical movement is progressing, and it is believed that the president will be proclaimed emperor on New Year's day.

FIELD PARTY TO LOOK FOR WATER IN MOUNTAINS

Commission Decides to Send Out Competent Engineer to Make Exploration

JORGENSEN SAYS WAIHEE MAY OFFER BIG SUPPLY

Suggests Site for Tunnel Similar to Waiahole, Which Runs 30,000,000 Gallons

At the suggestion of Lorrin A. Thurston, chairman of the commission appointed by Mayor Lane to investigate Honolulu's potable water supply, and by a motion made by Charles E. Forbes and seconded by James Gibb the members today decided to place a field party to work under a fully competent and practical engineer for the purpose of exploring and investigating various distinct water sources and furnishing the results of the investigation to the commission, who will then decide on definite exploration.

Mr. Thurston in stating his opinion on the question following a somewhat lengthy discussion pro and con, in regard to different sources of water, said that he had tried to divest himself of any feeling which favored one special plan. "We must consider every available plan," he said, "and not confine ourselves to one side only."

"My idea," continued Mr. Thurston, "is to consider our surface water just as if we intended to use it only. Figure out how much the supply will be from this source, compile figures relative to this, and keep them for reference."

"After we have done this, let us do the same with other districts; with Waihee or Punaluu, in turn, and getting all the data we can from each district, use it comparatively to come to some conclusion for definite work." May Take Three Months.

Mr. Thurston stated that the field party might require 90 days in which to complete the work, possibly more, but that even if it should require six months he felt that it would be time well spent.

"We can't cut loose from any supply," he continued. "You can't take any more from a pot than you put into it, and if this island is coming at all near using up and wasting more water each year than comes to it by rainfall, we must consider every means possible to serve as supplies for water."

Mr. Thurston's statement was made following an opinion given by Thomas F. Sedgwick to the effect that all fresh water supply on the islands is from rainfall, and not likely from seepage from the ocean or by underground tunnels from some mainland source.

Mr. Sedgwick was asked by the commission if in his opinion tapping the mountains as has been done in the case of the Waiahole tunnel would have a detrimental effect upon the artesian system of the island.

"Serious," says Sedgwick. "I have not made up my mind in regard to that," said Mr. Sedgwick, "and I should not care to go on record now as saying whether it would or would not, I believe, however, it is a very serious question, and should

TEUTON GENERAL HEADS NEW DRIVE IN SERBIA

GERMANY DENIES NEW WEST DRIVE WINNING GROUND

Official Cablegrams Declare Allies Offensive Failure; Serbia is Invaded

The following cablegram from official German sources was received today:

"German Headquarters Report, October 7.—New and general offensive movements by the French continue without success. The French offensive in Champagne continues. After an intense artillery preparation the French again made an attack northwest of Soissons, being repulsed with enormous losses. Two officers and 180 French soldiers were taken prisoner. "Parts of two newly-arrived French divisions at one place passed the first German trenches on the road westward of Sommepey and Goussin in the direction of Ste. Marie. German counter attacks threw them back, 12 officers and 29 sergeants and 850 soldiers being taken prisoner. Two machine guns were captured. East of Navarin the French occupied a small piece of trench and fighting here continues. "North and near Tahure the French won 800 millimeters of ground, but were checked by German counter attacks, which made an advance. French efforts to break the German position north and northeast of Bazoujourt completely failed, three officers, 300 soldiers being taken and three machine guns captured.

"On the east front Gen. von Hindenburg's troops entered Russian positions before Duanaburg on a breadth of five kilometers. The Germans advanced south of Dryvavtya sea. The Russians are continuing attacks between Boginakoye sea and Smorgon, which are failing. Eleven officers and 1300 Russians were taken here. Gen. von Linsingen's troops have thrown the enemy from the forest west of Czartorysk. "In the new Balkan theater of war, German and Austro-Hungarian troops in several places have passed the Drina, Save and Danube rivers and established a firm footing on the east bank of the Drina and the southern banks of the Save and Danube rivers."

FERDINAND WITHOUT STATEMENT ALIGNS WITH TEUTONS, WHOSE SERBIAN INVASION PROCEEDS

GEN. VON MACKENSEN AT HEAD OF BIG COMBINED FORCE WHICH DRIVES INTO COUNTRY TO SEIZE TRUNK RAILWAY TO SALONIKI AND CONSTANTINOPLE—GREECE MAY PROCLAIM "BENEVOLENT NEUTRALITY" TOWARD ENTENTE POWERS AND MAKE NO OPPOSITION TO THE LANDING OF FRENCH TROOPS

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 8.—It is reported in official circles that Bulgarian army leaders are preparing to invade Macedonia and occupy a large portion of it at the same time as the main Austro-German offensive is launched against Serbia and probably Greece.

LONDON, England, Oct. 8.—An unofficial report on good authority, backed up by recent developments, declares that Greece will tacitly stand by the Entente Powers and will proclaim a "benevolent neutrality" toward the Entente. Thus she will not resist the sending of armed forces through Saloniki to the other border to meet the Teutons or Bulgarians.

Germany Lodges Formal Protest Against Allies on Greek Soil

BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 8.—The German government has lodged a formal protest, through its ambassador to Greece, to the Greek foreign office, the protest being based on the landing of troops on Greek soil, at Saloniki, by the Entente Powers. Germany claims such landing is a violation of neutrality or is unfriendly to the Teutonic nations. No reply to the protest has been received.

Big Austro-German Army Flung To Serbia; Seizing Railroads

LONDON, England, Oct. 8.—The Teutonic invasion of Serbia is in full swing now with hundreds of thousands of German and Austrian soldiers being flung across the border and headed toward Constantinople. Gen. von Mackensen is commanding the forces, whose main immediate object, so far as developed, is to seize the trunk railway which runs from the capital, Belgrade, to both Saloniki and Constantinople. New developments are coming hourly.

Serbia and Bulgaria Now Enemies

NISH, Serbia, Oct. 8.—The diplomatic rupture between Bulgaria and Serbia is complete now. The Bulgarian minister here has been handed his passports.

The cordial reception in Bulgaria accorded the German aviators who dropped bombs on Belgrade and Nish, killing five persons, is regarded as tantamount to the commencement of hostilities between the Bulgarians and Serbs, though no formal declarations have been made.

American Student is London Prisoner

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 8.—Kenneth Triest, a student of Princeton, who disappeared last January and had not been located in spite of a wide search, has been discovered by his relatives and friends a prisoner in London, under accusation of being a spy. His father is a naturalized German. The father has presented Secretary of State Lansing with testimonials to prove that the boy is mentally unbalanced.

Bulgaria Says Will Join Teutons

BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 8.—Bulgaria's intention to enter the war on the side of Germany has been proclaimed in a manifesto. The manifesto states that it is suicidal for Bulgaria not to align herself with Germany and that her duty is to join the Teutonic Allies to realize her national aspirations.

BIG STEAMSHIP LINES WANT TRAMPS REGULATED

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 8.—Five large coast steamship companies today filed requests with the state railroad commission asking it to assume jurisdiction over 50 corporations operating coast tramp vessels. These corporations are said to have lowered their rates to a point disastrous to the companies operating under regulation.

PRESIDENT AND FIANCE TO SEE BASEBALL GAME

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 8.—President Wilson and his fiancée, Mrs. Edith Galt, are here as the guests of Col. E. M. House of Texas and New York. There will be a dinner and theater party in their honor tonight, and tomorrow they will go to Philadelphia to see the Boston-Philadelphia baseball game.

BANDITS TAKE USELESS BANK NOTES IN RAID

WHEELING, W. Va., Oct. 8.—Early today two masked bandits held up the Baltimore & Ohio express, from New York for St. Louis, near Cassopolis, W. Va. They robbed the registered mail sacks of half a million dollars worth of unassigned bank notes being sent from Washington to banks of the Middle West. They overtook 30,000,000 in gold in strong-boxes. The passengers were not molested by the bandits, who kept them covered with guns, but went through only the express car.
