SHIPPING & WATERFRONT NEWS

HEAVY SHIPMENT OF GOLD ON THE MATSONIA

Bringing the largest shipment of
gold forwarded here in any steamer
this year to date, 530 sacks, which
represents a week's accumulation of
Honolulu gold in San Francisco, the
Matson steamer Matsonia docked at
7:30 o'clock this morning at Pier 15.
Her mail weighed 12 tons.

On board the big boat were 254
cabin passengers. On her last trip
here the Matsonia brought 283 in her
cabins. Today's list of stowage pas-
sengers numbered 32.

Cargo on board totaled 6484 tons, of
which 4702 are for this port, 1112 for
Hilo, 475 for Port Allen and 195 for
Kaanapali. There were also 45 bright,
new shining automobiles, fresh from
the factory, and consigned to local
automobile men.

Gold consignments for local banks
amounting to \$75,000 or more, arrived
on the boat. There were \$50,000
brought by Wells-Fargo, and a large
sum in the ship's safe sent by regis-
tered mail. The mail sacks, four of
them, heavy with gold, were carried
ashore by stowaways as if they were
so many sacks of cabbages.

Capt. Charles Peterson reported a
delightful voyage, the only diverting
feature of which was the passing Sat-
urday afternoon about 1 o'clock of the
four K submarines. Another unusual
incident was the marriage on board
ship of A. E. Evans and Mrs. H. L.
Olive.

RIND ORDERED TO TAKE MANOA TO THE COAST

When the Matson steamer Manoa
sails for San Francisco at 4 o'clock
this afternoon from Pier 15, she will
be in command of Chief Officer Wil-
liam H. Rind of the Matsonia, who
was today ordered by cable to take
charge of the Manoa on her return
trip to the mainland.

John H. Drew, manager of Castle &
Cooke's shipping department, this
morning said he did not know whether
this means Rind will become the
permanent skipper of the Manoa.
Waterfront men are inclined to be-
lieve he will, however.

Capt. Henry E. Weeden of the Ma-
noa is now bound for San Francisco,
having been ordered there on less than
10 hours' notice by the Matson Navt-
gation Company. He received orders
last Thursday morning, and caught
the steamer for the mainland that af-
ternoon. There are reports that he
will not return.

TWENTY STEAMERS AND 450 SEAMEN FOUND IN HONOLULU DISTRICT

In the customs district in which Ho-
lululu is located, there are 20 steamers
with 450 men, according to the
census of able seamen which has been
completed by W. D. Wilder, deputy
collector of customs, in accordance
with the requirements of the Seaman's
Act, which becomes effective Novem-
ber 4. The report left today on the
Manoa for Washington.

Of the 20 ships, 15 are inter-island
boats. The Commercial Pacific cable
schooner Florence Ward is listed as
a steamer. The others are the Hack-
field water supply boat Pioneer, the
Matson tug Intruder and the Doering
tug Printer at Hilo. The crews num-
ber 430 men.

Schooner listed are the inter-island
schooner Omega, the Lewers & Cooke
schooner Repeat, the Allen & Robin-
son schooner Helene and the Ka Mo'i.
They have crews totaling 20 men in
all. Boats under the 100 gross ton
limit are the Matson barge Ben-
nington and the Low motor boat Luka,
having crews of four men each.

This makes the total number of able
seamen listed in this port approxi-
mately 450.

WILSON IS LOW BIDDER ON PAUOA BRIDGE JOB

last night to sign a contract with John
Wilson, contractor, for the erection of
a new concrete bridge in Pauoa valley.

PACIFIC MAILER IS PURCHASED BY CHINESE

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless]
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 12.—
Announcement was made yesterday
of the completion of the organization
of the China Mail Steamship Com-
pany, whose first liner, formerly the
Pacific Mail steamer China, will sail
from this port on October 16 for Can-
ton, making Honolulu, Nagasaki, Ma-
nila and Hongkong ports of call.

The China will fly the Chinese flag
and, with other liners to be placed on
the San Francisco-Canton run as soon
as they can be purchased, will oper-
ate, probably, under a subsidy from
the Chinese government. The line will
be made up of five steamers. If the
full plans of the company materialize,
the corporation is organized to car-
ry on a freight and passenger busi-
ness. It has a capitalization of \$10,
000,000 and Chinese capitalists of San
Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland, Seat-
tle, Tacoma, Hongkong and Canton
are the subscribers to the stock.

The fact of the subsidy from the
Chinese government is not made pub-
lic as a positive announcement, but it
is believed that the line will be sup-
ported by subsidy at a liberal rate, it
having previously been announced
that the Chinese traders and manufac-
turers desire to be free of the Japan-
ese monopoly which has been created
through the withdrawal of the Pacific
Mail.

WEATHERWAX HAS SECOND LIBEL PLASTERED ON HER

Capt. W. I. Eyres, master of the
American schooner J. M. Weatherwax
which recently arrived at this port
after being forced to abandon a trip
to Sydney, Australia, when at a point
about 900 miles south of these islands,
has filed in federal court a libel "in
personam" against the schooner, making
the second action to be brought
against the vessel within the last
week.

The first action was brought against
the Weatherwax by Charles Karlson,
first mate, and the other members of
the crew, their claim being for back
wages, maintenance and passage
money. The papers in the action
brought by Captain Eyres were served
on First Mate Karlson by Marshal J. J.
Smiddy yesterday afternoon. In the
suit brought by the seamen, Captain
Eyres is one of the respondents.

HARBOR NOTES

At 4 o'clock this afternoon the Ma-
tonia steamer Manoa will sail for
San Francisco from Pier 15 taking mail
to the mainland.

Later today the British steamer Har-
wood, Capt. Courtney, was due to sail
for Portland, after discharging her
coal cargo brought for the Inter-island.

The Great Northern liner Minnesota
will carry grain, lumber and salmon
from Seattle to the United Kingdom,
beginning October 15, according to ad-
vices reaching here yesterday.

The American steamer Mackinaw is
due here about October 20. Fred L.
Waldron is the local agent. The boat
sailed from Paganuma, New Caledonia,
October 3, instead of from Bris-
bane.

Advices to Castle & Cooke state that
the G. S. K. steamer Papama Maru is
expected here for San Francisco Octo-
ber 19, the Seattle Maru to follow her.
The Dalzen Maru is due from the Ori-
ent December 23 for San Francisco.
All these ships will call here east-
bound only.

Weekly freight service of the fleet
of 40 steamers controlled by the Rus-
sian Volunteer Fleet, has been re-
sumed, from New York to Archangel,
Russia. These ships will call here for
bunkers, after the Panama canal is
open for use again.

Inspector A. E. Arledge of the 19th
Lighthouse District, today sent out
notice to mariners in this port that
the light station on the northeast
coast of Hawaii at Laupaoehoe has
been reported extinguished but will
be relighted as soon as practicable.

Following a 30 days' leave of ab-
sence, Capt. John C. Lorenzen, terri-
torial pilot, will return to his duties
sometime during this week. The
captain has been granted a new cer-
tificate, signed by William Howe,
inspector of hulls, and Thomas J.
Creney, inspector of boilers. Capt.
M. A. Madsen has acted as pilot in
Capt. Lorenzen's absence.

There is little hope of reopening
missionary schools and colleges in the
interior of Turkey, according to a des-
patch yesterday from Ambassador
Morgenthau, who said "many school
premises remained vacant for lack
of teachers, pupils and patrons."
