MINORITY CHARTER WORKERS MAY SPLIT INTO SEPARATE FACTIONS

Fight in Convention Over New Form of Government Takes Unexpected Turns

Three forces working in different directions, instead of two, were discovered when the majority and minority reports of the committee of 15 were read before the Charter Convention last night. The original charters proposed by W. C. Achi and the Research Club have been abandoned almost entirely by the committee in both majority and minority reports and this makes it certain that the speakers for the Civic Federation and the Chamber of Commerce, besides the individual speakers who will appear before the convention, will represent a third force at work on the convention.

From present indications ex-Governor Frear and others will strongly back the Research Club plans, very much as they were originally proposed, and this gives the work of the convention three directions, for it is unquestionable that the Chamber of Commerce, Civic Federation and other forces will rally many of the members of the convention behind them.

Tried Steam Roller.
The first conflict started when David M. Kuphea tried to start the steam roller going by moving the adoption of the majority report shortly after the reading was completed by Lorrin Andrews.

Chillingworth jumped to his feet and registered an objection on a point of order.

"There is no reason why I should not be heard and I will be heard on this point," shouted Kuphea in return to Chillingworth.

"Go ahead," said Chillingworth, "the more you talk the worse you get." The chair finally ruled that Kuphea was out of order, since the convention had just voted that action upon the committee reports should be delayed until the report had been translated into Hawaiian and distributed to the Hawaiian delegates.

Francis J. Green, presenting the minority report, prefixed his reading with a short talk explaining the attitude of the minority and their objections to such things as the ward system. In the midst of his talk he was cut short by A. D. Castro, who reminded the chair that committee reports must be read. Green then filed the report formally.

Moved for "Discharge."
The storm of the evening then broke out when Chillingworth rose to move that a vote of thanks be extended to the committee of 15 and that they be discharged. He sat down with a broad smile, while Lorrin Andrews sprang to his feet and challenged the motion anxiously.

One of the convention's recurrent parliamentary rule tangles occupied the next 30 minutes, and when the storm had cleared away and Andrews point being granted that the committee could not be discharged until the report was formally before the convention in printing, John H. Wise started the confusion again by duplicating Chillingworth's motion. He too, was ruled down by the chair.

The Chamber of Commerce communication, asking that its representatives be heard before the convention before final action was taken on the charter reports or committees was then read, and shortly after came the request of the Civic Federation that there be a mass meeting called at which the federation could present several speakers upon the charter plans.

A big war started over these communications. W. O. Smith, the pacifier of the convention, moved that the requests be granted, but the rest of the members had different views.

After a number of speakers for the minority had proposed that the convention should hear the speakers by passing into committee of the whole, Lorrin Andrews made a vigorous speech in favor of a mass meeting in Aiea Park.

Chillingworth was immediately on his feet with an objection. "Look," shouted Andrews, "see how afraid they are of turning this matter over to the citizens. I am not. I am willing to trust to their intelligence."

A certain portion of the delegates received Andrews' statement with loud applause, but Chillingworth threatened Andrews with voice and raised finger for misrepresentation of the minority position.

In the midst of these stormy objections to Andrews' motion, Samuel Keilinoi rose to one of the most incisive talks of the evening. He pointed out that if mass meetings were started the convention would soon have to be traveling over the length and breadth of the island.

"Furthermore," he said, "I perceive that the real work of the convention is only starting. It may be remembered that I asked that all this public and private discussion of the charters under consideration be voiced before we referred any matter to the committee. As it now is the work of the committee will probably be only a beginning for strife. It looks to me as though we would never get a charter."

It was decided to tell the Civic Federation and the Chamber of Commerce that their requests had been filed and that the convention would consider the replies as soon as the

report of the committee of 15 were ready for actual hearing.

Takes Middle Ground.
Signed by Francis J. Green, G. F. Bush, A. W. Eames, H. S. Johnson and C. N. Arnold, the minority report takes middle ground between the Achi plan and the city manager plan. It provides a short ballot by vesting a board of five supervisors with all the powers of the government, appointive and legislative, and offers direct responsibility to the public through the recall. Minority members all register a strong objection to the minority report, on the grounds that it is a return to a form of the ward system.

The majority report is not a new charter but an amended one. They would elect no fewer than eight supervisors, and the mayor, auditor, clerk, treasurer, sheriff, attorney and superintendent of city works. These heads are responsible to the people. The legislative and executive functions are sharply divided.

The minority seizes upon a commission plan with a few variations, and offers a government in which the responsibility is absolutely centered upon five heads.

The other two charges of being drunk while on duty and creating a disturbance in a saloon were withdrawn by James Jarrett.

The commissioners reported that in view of the excellent record of the officer and because of the fact that he had pleaded guilty to one charge, they did not feel that a more severe penalty should be exacted. Next Saturday afternoon the commission will hold a hearing on the charges of assault and battery and adultery against Police Officer Nuuanu of Waianae.

Yesterday the Promotion Committee decided to hold its first regular quarterly meeting on Maui from November 12 to November 15.

The committeemen will leave on Friday evening, November 19, on the steamer Claudine, and will be gone until the following Tuesday. They plan to take a trip to the top of Haleakala while they are on the island.
