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## BRITISH DRIVE FORWARD IN BIG ATTACK ON WEST LINE

### ANOTHER MATSONIA PLANNED

#### Contract Signed For Big Matson Co. Steamer

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 14.—Capt. William Matson, president of the Matson Navigation Company, has signed a contract with the Union Iron Works for the construction of a million-dollar steamer, to ply between San Francisco and Honolulu. The steamer will be ready for service in 1917.

News of this despatch, conveyed this afternoon to J. H. Drew, manager of the shipping department of Castle & Cooke, brings definite information that the Matson company is to have built "another Matsonia."

"We have had no news that the contract is signed but it has been known that the plans were all made," said Mr. Drew. "It is probable that the steamer mentioned will duplicate the Matsonia, as those were the plans."  
The Matsonia cost approximately \$1,500,000.

### NAVY WILL SEND AID TO WRECKED SCHOONER CREW

Nine Men and One Woman from O. M. Kellogg Reach Midway Island From Laysan

### SHIP WENT TO PIECES ON DEADLY MARO REEF

Admiral Boush Gets Cable from Washington to Send Relief; Captain's Wife Saved

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 14.—Orders were today cabled to Rear Admiral Clifford J. Boush, navy commandant at Pearl Harbor, to send a relief vessel to Midway island, the cable station in mid-Pacific, to rescue nine men and one woman, survivors of the wrecked schooner O. M. Kellogg.

Just which of the government vessels will go on the relief expedition to Midway island had not been decided by Admiral Boush this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, when he was asked about the matter over the long distance telephone. A decision will probably be reached tomorrow and some ship despatched at once.

Meager details of the wreck reached the cable office in Honolulu from Midway island today. The survivors, according to the message, reached Midway only this morning. The schooner O. M. Kellogg, from San Francisco, bound for the Orient, was wrecked several days ago on treacherous Maro reef, on which so many ships have been piled. Captain Lunn, Mrs. Lunn and eight men of the crew took to small boats and reached Laysan island.

At Laysan they found Capt. Max Schlemmer of Honolulu, who has been making his home there since June. Captain Schlemmer's little sloop Teles was immediately put at the disposal of the survivors of the Kellogg and they were taken down to Midway.

### FIRST ELECTRIC DREADNOUGHT TO BE READY SOON

### Defense Plans Call For Huge U. S. Budget

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 14.—President Wilson has given his approval to the plan of Secretary of War Garrison for increasing the army. The plan calls for \$182,000,000, an increase of \$75,000,000 over the last appropriation.

This plan will be presented to Congress with the backing of the administration. Much of the increased appropriation will be devoted to coast defenses.

If the navy plan asking for an increase of \$100,000,000 carries in Congress, the total national defense appropriations will amount to \$430,000,000.

### IMPORTANT RAILROAD IN SERBIA CUT; AID WILL NOW BE DELAYED

ATHENS, Greece, Oct. 14.—The railroad between Nish, Serbia, and Saloniki, Greece, has been cut for a distance of five miles 50 miles south of Nish by the invaders. This road is a trunk communication designed for the use of the Allied expeditionary force which landed at Saloniki and is going to Serbia's assistance.

### GERMANY DECLARES EAST ZONE AGAIN FAVORABLE

BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 14.—The Russians advancing in Eastern Galicia have been checked and driven back across the Stripa river.

### SITE FOR GUARD PUNCHBOWL CAMP FORMALLY GIVEN

President Wilson Sets Aside Portion of Military Reservation for Territorial Use

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 14.—President Wilson today issued an order, according to act of Congress, transferring a portion of the military reservation of Punchbowl, Honolulu, to the territory of Hawaii. The rights of way and other privileges are retained by the United States. The area released is of 4.41 acres and 35.35 acres are retained for the United States military reservation.

### HOLLAND WOULD KEEP MUNITION WORKERS IN OWN COUNTRY NOW

THE HAGUE, Netherlands, Oct. 14.—Partial martial law has been proclaimed in The Hague on account of war conditions and to insure preparedness for Holland.

### SIR EDWARD GREY SAYS RUSSIAN TROOPS SOON TO AID BALKAN ALLIES

LONDON, England, Oct. 14.—Sir Edward Grey, the secretary of state for foreign affairs, announced today that Russian troops to aid the Allies in the Balkans will soon be available. He did not specify as to how they will reach the new war arena.

### NISH-SALONIKI RAILROAD CUT BY INVADING FORCES

Austro-Germans Sever Communications Which Would Bring Aid to Hard-Pressed Serb Army

BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 14.—A new British attack, one which promises to be among the most important movements on the western line, is in progress. The British have taken the offensive along nearly the entire front from Ypres to Loos.

### ZEPPELIN RAIDS DO MUCH DAMAGE

City of London Bombarded; Germans Say Heavy Explosions Caused and Large Fires Started

The following cablegram from official German sources was received today: "German Official Admiralty Report, Oct. 14.—Last night German airships attacked London City and important establishments, also the batteries of Ipswich. Much damage was done, especially in the city of London, by several attacks. Furthermore, London docks and the waterworks of Hampton, near London, and Woolwich were heavily bombarded with bursting and burning bombs. In all the places attacked by our airships heavy explosions and great fires were observed."

### 55 KILLED; 114 INJURED

LONDON, England, Oct. 14.—In the Zeppelin raid last night 55 persons were killed and 114 injured.

### DELCASSE RESIGNATION PUTS HIM UNDER FIRE OF RADICAL WRITERS

PARIS, France, Oct. 14.—The letter of resignation of Theophile Delcasse, the French foreign minister, has stirred Paris deeply and much controversy is in progress. According to the radical writers, dissension among the government leaders rather than ill-health is the cause of Delcasse's quitting the cabinet at this critical time. The radical writers blame Delcasse for the failure of the Allies' diplomacy to hold the Balkans together and keep Bulgaria at least neutral. They charge also that he is trying to shift the burden of responsibility upon former colleagues instead of trying to remedy their mistakes.

### FRENCH PREMIER SAYS ITALY WILL PROBABLY AID ALLIES IN BALKANS

PARIS, France, Oct. 14.—Premier Viviani announced today in the senate that Italy will probably engage in the Balkan war, aiding the Allies in meeting the Teuton and Bulgarian invaders.
