RENEW ACTIVITY OF Y. M. C. A. FOR YOUNG CHINESE

Twenty-nine New Applicants Will Be Admitted and Work Will Be Reorganized

At the monthly meeting of the Chinese Y. M. C. A., which was held last night, the names of 29 new applicants for membership were presented. All of the applicants are young men. They will be elected to membership at the next regular meeting of the organization. The desire of such a large number of young men to join the Chinese association is the result of a discussion which has been going on for some months. Recently the older members of the organization have revised the constitution so as to make it possible for the young men to join.

A week ago a meeting of a large number of Chinese young men was held at the home of C. K. Ai. At that meeting it was decided that the invitation of the older members be accepted and that they secure an active membership of young men. For some years the Chinese Association has not been very active, but now it is proposed to organize it along modern lines. The regular physical, educational, social and religious work of the Y. M. C. A. will be started as soon as possible. Various committees will be organized to plan and carry on the work.

At the present time there is no social center for the Chinese young men of the city. Those who have been studying the question for several years feel that the organization of a modern Y. M. C. A. is the thing that is needed.

When the modern association building was built here in the city it was thought that there would probably be no need of a separate work for Chinese young men. Four years in the building have shown that less than 100 Chinese have been members of the association. Many of these young men have remained for only one year while they were securing some special educational training in which they were interested. The building has not proven a social and religious center for the great majority of Chinese young men in the city. This has been the opinion of the leading Chinese businessmen, and they have been working very hard to get such a center established.

A plan of coordinating the work of the two organizations will be worked out so that any member of the Chinese association who wants to take any educational or other work offered by the central association may do so.

'SLIM PICKINGS' FOR MUSICIANS IN AUSTRALIA

Musicians are finding extremely "slim pickings" in Australia now, if the experiences of R. Condon, vocalist, and William Conway, a solo pianist, who arrived today on the Makura, are an accurate index.

"I played at 56 patriotic concerts in Australia, and got absolutely nothing," said Conway this morning. "There is nothing doing in Australia today in the money line, at least so far as musicians are concerned. People won't go to hear any concert unless it's for Red Cross relief work, and one has to live, which I couldn't do by appearing only at those concerts and donating my services."

Mr. Conway is a native Australian and has accompanied Amy Castle, Ben Davies and Margaret Cooper on their concert tours. Mr. Condon is known as the "Australian John McCormack." His wife, who is with him, is a well-known soprano. The three artists will stop in Honolulu looking over the field, and may give a concert here. They plan to go on the Orpheum or Pantages circuit later.

SPEECHES WILL BE FEATURES OF BIG CELEBRATION

Japanese Plan Program to Last From 10 in Morning Until 6 in the Evening

Always an event of national celebration, the coronation of the Japanese emperor which will take place on November 10 is peculiarly significant because the emperor has been on the throne for three years. As a rule the coronation is postponed for a reasonable length of time after the death of the former emperor, but in this case the dowager empress died shortly after her husband, and the coronation was further postponed.

To celebrate the great event the Honolulu Japanese have made unprecedented preparations. A large number of committees are at work preparing a program and gathering subscriptions from those who wish to be present.

All who become members of the "Coronation Celebration Association" pay \$1 admittance fee. Those who wish merely to contribute and become members without attending the celebration association pay 50 cents.

On the morning of the tenth the festivities begin with a series of speeches which last from 10 o'clock in the morning until 1 in the afternoon. The speeches are followed by games and dancing, which will continue until 5 or 6 in the evening.

As a side issue of the great day S. Sheba issues an enlarged special edition of the Hawaii Shippo, a 50 or 60 page sheet which will celebrate the achievements and progress of Hawaii and will be presented to the emperor. It is planned to raise a minimum of \$10,000, and of this sum the larger portion will be spent on the beautiful fountain of bronze, cast iron and polished stone which will be presented to Honolulu.

The entire festivities will take place in the rear grounds of the consulate.
