CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 16.—Capt. Edward Mahan, of Harvard proved himself a worthy successor to Capt. Charles Brickley, the former football star, by personally leading the Harvard team of Virginia today, 5 to 0, by dropping three field goals, one of them from the 43-yard line. The Virginians proved less formidable than was anticipated from their 10 to 0 defeat of Yale two weeks ago. They had little in the way of an offense which Harvard did not tame in the first period, but their defense stiffened as it retreated and twice threw back the Crimson tide inside the five-yard line.

Both teams began ragedly, Harvard fumbling and offending while the Virginians were uncertain. Before Harvard woke up to the visitors' offense the ball was twice within kicking distance of the Crimson goal, but in each case Right Guard Thurman fumbled by yards. A third attempt was blocked.

Army is Defeated.
WEST POINT, N. Y., Oct. 16.—The Army was defeated today by Colgate by 13 to 0 in one of the hardest fought games ever staged here. Although the Cadets fought hard they could not ward off the powerful onslaughts of the visiting backs. In the fourth quarter Brigham muffed a punt on the Army ten-yard line and a Colgate forward dropped on it. Savage is Yale Star.

NEW HAVEN, Oct. 16.—Yale defeated the Springfield Y. M. C. A. College here today, 19 to 0. The points came from two touchdowns and the resultant goals, a beautiful field goal by Savage from the 43-yard line and a safety. The visitors made many brilliant forward passes, but were unable to gain consistently.

A touchdown for Springfield was lost early in the game when Herkimer, after picking up a blocked ball and running 55 yards, dropped it as he was tackling over the line. A Yale man fell on it for a touchback. Yale scored a safety when C. Sheldon blocked a punt and Miller of Springfield fell on it over the line.

Yale was penalized for a total of 136 yards.

NAVY 7, Penn 7.
ANNAPOLIS, Oct. 16.—Pennsylvania and Navy played a 7 to 7 tie game here this afternoon, each scoring a touchdown and goal.

Navy's score was due to the quick eye of Martin, who, after intercepting a forward pass, ran 75 yards for the touchdown, blocking kicking goal. The Quakers' points were due to persistent trying of Hunsicker and end plays with forwarding passing.

Princeton is Scored On.
PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 15.—Princeton rolled up a score of 40 to 3 against the Lafayette football team here today, but the visitors have what consolation there is in the fact that they are the first eleven that has scored on the Tigers this season. Lake, Lafayette's fullback, kicked a field goal from the 25-yard line in the fourth period. A minute before the visitors had penetrated to within two feet of Princeton's goal, but they failed in their drive against the line. Princeton's entire second team had replaced the regulars when Lafayette became dangerous.

Cornell Easy Winner.
ITHACA, N. Y., Oct. 16.—Cornell's expected test of strength with Bucknell failed to materialize today, and the Ithaca won easily by 41 to 0. The Bucknell line crumpled like paper before the Cornell attack. Capt. Barrett scoring four touchdowns, two of them on sensational long runs.

In the third quarter Cornell's second varsity replaced the first team, and in the final quarter the third string men went in. Each of the new squads scored a touchdown.

Maroons Wins Out.
CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 16.—The speed of its backfield gave the team of the University of Chicago a 13 to 7 victory over Indiana today after one of the hardest battles ever fought between the two institutions. Captain Russell led the dashing attack of the Maroons and in the first two periods it seemed probable that Chicago would run up a large score, but as the game progressed the Hoosiers braced and took the offensive. With Hathaway substituted for McIntosh at fullback in the third quarter, the Indiana machine began to tear through the Chicago line and in the last period, McIntosh, who again went in at full, dashed through the entire maroon team for 23 yards and a touchdown.

Illinois Misses Stars.
COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 16.—With two of their best ground-gainers on the side lines the Illinois football players were held to a tie by Ohio state in Ohio field today. The final score was 3 to 3.

Standing on the 33-yard line in the fourth period, Halfback Winters of Ohio kicked a goal from placement for the first score of the game.

With defeat hanging over their heads, the Illinois repeatedly made use of the forward pass, bringing the ball to the 24-yard line, where Quarterback Macomber drop-kicked the ball through the posts for his team's three points.

The Illinois, playing without Halfback Pogue and Quarterback Clark, lacked some of the dash which the team has shown with these regulars in the line-up.
