CENTRAL UNION PLANS SERIES OF REVIVALS

Rev. John Edward Brown and C. P. Curry Will Conduct Services in December

Central Union church has had another stroke of good fortune. Just as the church was considering what form its Sunday evening service campaign for this fall should take, Mr. William Waterhouse of Pasadena arrived to offer to the church for two weeks the services of Rev. John Edward Brown and Mr. C. P. Curry, two well known evangelists.

The standing committee of Central Union has accepted the offer and invited the other English-speaking churches of Honolulu to join with it for two weeks of services. It is proposed to hold meetings every night, beginning Tuesday, November 30, and ending Tuesday, December 14. There may also be day meetings.

Several steps have already been taken in preparation for the services of these evangelists. On Friday evening Mr. Waterhouse held his first conference with a number of people gathered together by the religious education committee of Central Union in the church parlor. A plan for holding cottage prayer meetings during November has also been formulated. The Sunday evening services to be held in the church throughout November will be evangelistic in spirit with a view to arousing interest and enthusiasm for the meetings to follow. A call for volunteers from among the men and women of the congregation and city to sing in a large chorus choir has been issued.

FORMER MANAGER OF YOUNG CAFE NEARLY DROWNED BY UPSET

Swamped by a sudden gust of wind off San Mateo Point, Alameda, California, E. J. Jordan, former manager of the Young Cafe, and a companion, W. F. Lake, were near death recently, being saved in the nick of time by a passing oil steamer which picked them up.

MARRIAGES OF SLAVES ARE DECLARED LEGAL

LITTLE ROCK, Ark.—The Arkansas supreme court declared the unions of negro slaves in the antebellum days legal marriages, even though no marriage ceremony was performed. The decision was given in a case involving property which a negro had inherited from his slave grandfather.

Ninety per cent. of the banana trees on the north of the island of Jamaica were destroyed by the recent hurricane.

POOR OF INDIA ARE NEGLECTED SINCE WAR BEGAN

Arthur Larimer of the Y. M. C. A. has received a letter from Waldo H. Heinrichs, former fellowship secretary at the local association. Heinrichs is now connected with the Y. M. C. A. in Madras, India, and has been active in the campaign for new members. He states in his letter that the poor of India have been neglected since the opening of the war, as the most of the contributions have been sent to the front.

Heinrichs also states that the sanitary conditions in Madras are poor, but that the Y. M. C. A. is doing a great work in that section. Heinrichs was the head of the campaign for 300 new members for the association at Madras, and at the completion of the canvass 333 members were secured. He sends his "aloha" to friends in Honolulu.

ORDERS OF THE HAWAIIAN DEPT.

Special Orders No. 210.

October 27, 1915.
Private Ernest G. Hammer, Troop L, 4th Cavalry, Schofield Barracks, H. T., will be discharged from the army by the commanding general of that post by purchase.

So much of paragraph 3, Special Order No. 134, these headquarters, current series as directs that 1st Class Private Herbert E. Ramsey, Company I, 3rd Battalion of Engineers, be returned to his proper station on or about October 30, 1915, is amended so as to direct the soldier to remain on duty in the office of the Department Engineer until further orders.

Private Raymond D. Steinbacher, Company F, 2nd Infantry, having reported at these headquarters pursuant to telegraphic instructions dated October 26, 1915, is assigned to duty at these headquarters to take effect this date. There being no public quarters available and it being impracticable to assign this soldier to any organization for rations, the Quartermaster Corps will provide suitable quarters and commute his rations at the rate of \$1 per day while on this duty.

First Lieut. John D. Reardon, 1st Infantry, is relieved from duty as aide-de-camp to Maj.-gen. William H. Carter, U. S. Army, to take effect October 31, 1915, and will join his regiment at Schofield Barracks, H. T.

First Lieut. Victor Q. Potter, Troop M, 4th Cavalry, Schofield Barracks, H. T., is transferred to the hospital corps and will proceed to Honolulu, H. T., reporting upon arrival to the commanding officer, department hospital, for duty.

First of company inspections which have been ordered for several companies of the National Guard of Hawaii was held at the armory last night, Company G being declared by Lieut. Company K, as it will be known, will be in line with the other companies of the guard in competition next January. The majority of the members of the new company are of the younger element and are well up in military work.

TARIFF WILL BE MAIN TOPIC FOR SUGAR PLANTERS

Annual Session Will Begin in Honolulu on December 14; Reports Coming In

The Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association will begin their annual session December 14, in Honolulu, and what will be one of the most important sessions of the body will continue until all business is disposed of. No arrangements have yet been made for a hall.

Because of the tariff situation and the vital importance of retaining the duty on sugar, legislation along this line may be the principal topic of discussion by the convention. It is said that a concerted effort will be made by the planters after the convention to convey to Washington even more forcibly than heretofore the fact that the sugar industry here would be dealt a severe blow should the reduction in the tariff, which has already been sanctioned, go into effect. One hundred and twenty-six planters attended the last convention, held in 1914.

Many of the committees have reported, and when all reports have been received by Secretary and Treasurer W. O. Smith, they will be printed and distributed among the members, so they may be studied carefully. In the convention, chairmen of the committees are expected to lead the discussion of the reports of each particular committee.

Little has been done regarding the program, but it has been tentatively agreed that a banquet and other entertainment will be provided for the sugar planters when they come to Honolulu.
