McKinley Eleven Will Meet Kam on Saturday

Fans Promised Open Game When Two Elevens Face Each Other on Kamehameha Field Saturday Afternoon at 3 o'Clock—Capt. Booth Will Have Two New Men in Game Tomorrow—Clifford Melim, Who Was Injured in Punahou Game, Will Be in High School Backfield

Football in the first series in the interscholastic league will close tomorrow afternoon when Kamehameha and McKinley clash on the Kamehameha field, and the title of champion of the league will be at stake. Should McKinley win from Kamehameha, Punahou will lead the league, whereas Kam must win to still be in the running, as neither Punahou or Kam have yet lost a game in the league series. Hawaii's victory over Midland men will not count in the final counting up for the championship.

Captain Harry Melim has been working the team hard in the past few days and has been assisted by Richard Whitcomb, a former Washburn star, who perhaps is one of the best students of the gridiron game in Honolulu. The team has been practicing the lineback formation in the forward practice, which has proved to be a winner, and the McKinley players have shown a vast improvement in their work with the forward pass. Clifford Melim, who was out of the Punahou game on account of a hard tackle and has not played since, will be back in the backfield against Captain Booth's crew. Melim is one of the best of local football, and with his brother Harry should make some points around the Kam ends. Sam Carter will be seen at fullback, and although comparatively light has proved to be one of the best defensive players of the year. Hawkins has missed one or two practice scrimmages but is expected to be in the game. Bent has an excellent chance to break into the line-up against the Kam team as he has proved to be an aggressive player. Sam Lujan will oppose Peneku, and McKinley supporters are confident that the big high school tackle will give Peneku a good fight.

McKinley will be much lighter than Kam today in the line and the backfield, but the high school boys have a number of new formations that should result in a score for them. The game promises to be an open one, as Captain Booth has been giving the Kam players many open plays to work out. The ends should make a hard fight in the game as they are all light and fast. Booth is perhaps the fastest of the quarterbacks, but Hussey, F. Carter and Andrade have all showed up well in past games.

MICHIGAN LOCOMOTIVE WILL BE FEATURE AT ANNUAL VARSITY FEED

FORMER HASKELL PLAYER CARRIES 25TH TO VICTORY

(Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence) SCHOFIELD BARRACKS, Nov. 6.—The 25th Infantry continue their football successes, the crack team of B and C companies defeating F Battery Thursday afternoon on the Cavalry-Artillery gridiron. Stafford, the captain of the 25th Infantry team, is part Indian and was formerly a star on the Haskell Indian team. He has his eleven playing great football and they swept the artillerymen off their feet.

In the first quarter, after a series of line plunges and end runs which carried the ball steadily toward the artillery goal, Stafford carried the ball over for the first touchdown. From this time until near the end of the fourth quarter the wagon soldiers were able to hold their own and several times threatened the B and C companies' goal. They lacked the aggressiveness and punch necessary to carry the ball the last five yards, and three attempts at drop kicks by Menard were all failures. Some of the men in the artillery line made a good showing, but the backs are woefully deficient in speed and in forming an interference. Most of their plays were broken up before they got started by their more aggressive opponents.

Forward Pass Scores. Toward the end of the fourth quarter the 25th got the ball on the artillery five-yard line when Menard fumbled a punt. In the first play the 25th were thrown back 15 yards. They took up a formation for a place kick; Stafford received the ball, but passed it to Murphy, who made a beautiful pass to Cayson, already over the artillery goal line.

A few minutes later Cayson recovered the ball on Brown's low-bouncing kick, which had completely eluded the artillery backs, and carried it over for the third touchdown. Brown kicked goal.

Decisive Games Will Be Played Saturday

California Will Entertain Dobie's Washington Team at Berkeley—Princeton Will Meet Harvard in Big Struggle—Pittsburg Must Win From W. & J. to Hold Place in Sun—Barrett's Injury May Give Cornell Setback When Sharpe's Crew Plays on Ferry Field Against Michigan

There have been many upsets in the football world this year but none were more startling than the news that reached Honolulu last Saturday that Oregon Aggies had swamped the great Michigan Aggie team 20 to 0. Even local Oregon Aggie alumni, of whom there are several, could hardly believe the report. Doc Stewart lost a number of his stars by graduation last year and two men were injured when the Corvallis eleven started on the trip across the country. Macklin had proved that he had one of the greatest aggregations in the country when he defeated the men of Yost by a big score, and football critics were picking the Lansing team to win by a big score.

Other upsets were the defeats of the Army, Navy and Carlisle, Yale lost to Colgate by a score of 15 to 6, but that was expected, as HInkey had had the worst year in the history of Yale football. The smaller schools under the new game are coming into prominence and Yilla Nova proved that she had taken advantage of this fact by winning from the Army by three points. Frank Sommer, a former Penn star, coached the Yilla Nova team and has accepted all the possibilities of the new game.

North Carolina Aggies won from the Navy by two points, thereby placing the South one step more in advance. West Virginia defeated Carlisle for two touchdowns and Sol Metzger, a former Penn star, was the coach. Last year West Virginia was not overly strong and lost half of her games. In a sense the Chicago victory over Wisconsin was an upset. Local alumni felt that Stagg would have a hard time beating a team into shape to trim the strong aggregations of Badger, and betting on the game locally was 2 to 1 in favor of Yost's men, but the Midway stars earned a chance to fight for the conference title by winning by the narrow margin of a kick from touchdown.

The Illinois-Minnesota game was picked by many to be the best of the week. They fought it out at Urbana and a 6-6 score resulted. Zupke kept both Pogue and Clark out of the Northwestern game, as neither was in condition and it is expected that the two stars were unable to play throughout the Minnesota struggle. Soja, who was picked on the third All-American and first All-Western last year, was ruled-out of competition for laying professional baseball. These two teams were picked to fight it out for the championship.

Four Games in Middle West. The Big Nine teams will not play each other on Saturday with the exception of Ohio and Indiana and Iowa and Purdue. Chicago will meet Illinois and Minnesota in the last two games, and Stagg will have a great fight to land the championship of the conference. Harvard's victory over Penn State proved that Haughton has profited by the mistakes in the Cornell game. Syracuse who outplayed Michigan by one touchdown. Yost has had a number of injured players this year, and as Syracuse is the heaviest team in the country Michigan could not gain through the solid line. Pittsburg, Princeton, Cornell and Dartmouth won as was expected.

Who will be the champion this year? Many critics believed the Michigan Aggies had a chance to annex the title. Then came the defeat by Stewart's warriors. Others believed Wisconsin would figure, but Stagg and Pete Russell spoiled their hopes. Harvard, Pennsylvania and Yale are out of it and Pittsburg, Princeton, Cornell, Illinois, Minnesota and Chicago are left of all the teams who started the season. Three of these teams have a chance of being defeated. Harvard will try to come back with a victory over Rush and his crew and Yost will attempt to make a last stand against the Big Red team.

Warner has the greatest team that he has ever handled at Pittsburg and it is doubtful if Washington and Jefferson can defeat the Pitt squad, although they had an easy time winning at New Haven. Captain Barrett was injured in the Harvard game and the boys from Ithaca will miss the great quarter when they journey down to Ferry Field next Saturday. It would not be surprising if only Pittsburg remained of the undefeated teams in the East next Saturday, and Polwell may cause Warner trouble when they meet. There are not many better teams in the East this year than W. & J. and Pittsburg.

On the coast Gilmour Dobie will bring his unbeaten team to Berkeley to meet the University of California team. Dobie has a chance to claim the championship this year by comparative scores and will make every effort to humble the former raggers.

Local alumni of the University of California are confident that Schaefer has rounded out a team that will give the Evergreens a fight, but if California wins from the canny Scot and the great Miller then there absolutely "ain't no such animal called tops."

GOLFERS TO COMPETE FOR PRESIDENT'S CUP TOMORROW AFTERNOON

Play in the tournament for the president's trophy will begin tomorrow afternoon at the Oahu Country Club. This tourney will run two days and has been played for three times before this year. LOCAL FOOTBALL FANS LOOK FOR SURPRISES IN GAMES OF TOMORROW

How many surprises will we have tomorrow on the mainland gridirons? That is the question that the football fans of Honolulu have been asking this week. When Oregon Aggies defeated the Michigan farmers the critics around town believed that the last upset and the worst had come. Each Saturday has seen the downfall of some team that was expected to fight for the honors that year. Can Harvard muster strength enough to down Princeton? Will Yost be able to send a team back after two defeats that will send Cornell out of the race. Will the Army be able to stop the strong Notre Dame team? These are questions that are asked most.

Princeton-Harvard, Pittsburg-Washington and Jefferson, and Cornell-Michigan games appear to be the best in the East, while the battle between California and Washington takes prominence in the West. The real game that stands out in the East this week is the Pittsburg-W. & J. match. Both have strong teams, and neither has tasted defeat. The factor in this struggle looks to be the leader of football for the year, unless Cornell and Princeton can go through their season without defeat.
