CHINA VOTES FOR MONARCHY; CHANGE MAY BE POSTPONED

Request of Allied Powers Possibly Will Be Complied With if Can Be Legalized

MASSMEETING HERE NEXT WEEK TO FOMENT REVOLT

Revolutionists Would Raise Funds to Unseat Yuan Shih-Kai, Objecting to Monarchical Move

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] PEKING, China, Nov. 6.—Sentiment in China is overwhelmingly in favor of a return to the monarchical form of government, according to official announcement made at government offices today, after receiving by mail and telegraph the returns of the elections.

Fifteen out of eighteen provinces have returned a vote in favor of a monarchy, it is announced. It is also stated by government officials that an explanation has been made to Japan of the reason why China did not accede to the request to postpone the elections. A change, however, may be made in the plans to return to the monarchy.

One report is that a request may be made that the council of state legalize the postponement in case it is decided to change the date.

MUCH OPPOSITION HERE TO PLAN OF MONARCHY

When the news was first received here that the revolutionists had taken steps to rebel against Yuan Shih-Kai and the monarchy plan, local members forward to the National party headquarters in Nanking, a large sum was raised here during the month of October, but the exact amount has not been given out by the leaders of the party in this city.

Next week the Chinese members of the National party will call a mass meeting at which the present situation in China will be discussed, and efforts will be made to raise a large sum to forward to the National Party headquarters in the republic. Local Chinese who have lived in the southern part of China believe that the citizens of the republic will never agree to the monarchical plan, and according to their statements, Dr. Sun Yat Sen will be the next president of the Chinese Republic.

TWENTY MEN AND GIRLS PERISH IN NEW YORK FIRE

Y., Nov. 6.—Twenty men and girls were killed today and more than 50 injured in a fire which swept a four-story wooden factory building in the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn. The flames swept the stairways. Eight girls were burned to death on the fire escapes and many were hurt in jumping from the blazing building.

CULLEN AND CASH FACE TRIAL NEXT MONDAY ON ASSAULT CHARGE

Charged jointly with having assaulted Margaret Riedel and her husband, Hans F. Riedel, the latter having been a witness in the territorial grand jury's investigation of the city jail scandal, Sylvester Cullen, former traffic policeman, and Charley Cash, former inmate of the city jail, were arraigned before Circuit Judge Ashford today.

Cash pleaded not guilty to both charges. At the request of Leon M. Straus, his attorney, Cullen was allowed to reserve his plea until 9 o'clock next Monday morning. It was stated in court that, if Cullen pleads not guilty, the case will go to trial on that day. Should he plead guilty, the court added, the trial of Cash will begin. Cullen has been released on bond in the sum of \$50. Cash, being unable to raise bail, is being detained at the jail.

We will always be interested in Honolulu and our thoughts will often be of Oahu and our friends here."

THINKS PLOT OF GERMANS MAY BE BACK OF VOYAGE

Letters from Honolulu residents to the department of the interior, expressing suspicions that Capt. Max Schlemmer is on Laysan Island to aid the German cause by constructing a wireless station, or in other ways aiding such obscure expeditions as that of the Maverick and other vessels regarded with suspicion, are held responsible for the efforts of the government to remove Schlemmer. The coast guard cutter Thetis, when repaired, will probably go to Laysan to take off the Schlemmer party, Schlemmer having gone to the island, which is a bird reservation, without a permit. The Iroquois, the naval vessel which recently went to Midway to rescue the survivors of the wrecked schooner O. M. Kellogg, was ordered by wireless on word from Washington to remove Schlemmer, but did not receive the message while at sea, so the Thetis will have to make the trip.

CRIMSON TEAM IS ABLE TO RISE TO GREAT OCCASION

Tigers Lack Punch and Allow Houghton's Men to Score Touchdown By Rushing

BROWN BEATS YALE BY ONE LONE FIELD GOAL

Cornell's "Big Red Team" Easily Wins From Michigan; Other College Scores

J., Nov. 6.—The Tigers' chances for first honors on the gridiron this year were sent glimmering by the defeat today at the hands of the Harvard eleven. Coach Rush, the speedy mentor of the Princeton squad, had gathered together a strong team, and what the men took the field this afternoon the odds were in favor of the locals. Houghton's men showed a fine attack, coupled with a strong defense, and the Princeton team led by Captain Glick, although playing a good game, could not forge ahead.

The final score, Harvard 10, Princeton 5. Harvard scored one touchdown through the Tiger line and also kicked a goal from the touchdown. The Crimson also ran the score up to 10 points by kicking a goal from field. Princeton lacked the punch shown in previous games and could not cross the Harvard goal line, their six points coming from two kicks from the field. Crimson played ragged at times but their back field managed to score a touchdown although the signal work was poor. This is Harvard's fourth straight victory over the Tigers.

BOMB EXPLODED NEAR ITALIAN CONSULATE IN NEW YORK; NONE HURT

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 6.—While a hundred Italian reservists were standing on the street in front of the Italian consulate today, a bomb exploded on the pavement near them. Most of the reservists were dazed by the shock but no serious injuries are reported. The shock was so severe it shook the building and broke the glass. One arrest has been made.

TEUTONS DETAIL PROGRESS MADE ON ALL FRONTS

The following cablegram from official German sources has been received: "German Headquarters Report, Nov. 6.—The Germans have conquered the Serbian town of Varvarin, imprisoning more than 3000 Serbians. They have also got in fighting touch with the Bulgarian army which had advanced to the vicinity of Krivivir. The Germans have taken Krallievo and east of it are pursuing the enemy. "Also our troops have reached Stural, crossed the Zupanyvaca section and followed the enemy in the Morava valley beyond Abrazakirica. "Gen. Boyadoff's Bulgarian troops have defeated the Serbians near Kuko and near Sokobanya, having captured more than 500, taking also six cannons. "After three days tenacious fighting the Bulgarians have conquered the Serbian capital of Nish, taking prisoner in the engagements 350 men and capturing two cannons. "On the west front, north of Maastricht, the French who had entered the east part of a new German trench, were thrown out by the use of hand grenades. "Russian attempts to break through the German lines at Duganburg failed. Northeast of Budka Gen. von Linsinger's army took more Russian positions. The Russians have also been thrown back in their old positions on the east bank of the river Strypa (Stripa) in engagements which are now finished, 50 officers and 600 Russians being captured."

LONDON PAPER SUPPRESSED BY POLICE ORDERS

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] LONDON, Eng., Nov. 6.—The police today seized the plant of the London Globe, the well-known newspaper, and confiscated the copies of today's paper. Yesterday the Globe attacked certain ministers. Today it said that Lord Kitchener had resigned. "The Globe is said to have been 'hunting trouble' and virtually defying the authorities who have tried to compel acquiescence in the censorship rules. The paper is controlled by a brother of Lord Northcliffe, whose papers have also been attacking the government."

ABSENCE FROM LONDON LIKELY TO NECESSITATE A SUCCESSOR; TEUTON ALLIES WIN VICTORY

RUSSIANS HURLED BACK ACROSS RIVER STRIPA—BULGARIANS TAKE NISH AFTER HARD FIGHTING—GERMAN SUBMARINES PASS GIBRALTAR, REACH MEDITERRANEAN AND SINK THREE STEAMERS—RUMANIA INFLUENCED BY SUCCESS OF TEUTONS

[Associated Press Service by Federal Wireless] LONDON, England, Nov. 6.—Lord Kitchener, secretary of state for war, has left London for the Balkans, according to an announcement this morning in the London Post, which publishes what is said to be an authoritative explanation of the situation.

The war minister has been called to the Near East by the serious situation there, the important mission having to do with a question of policy, it is said, and not unlikely it will be he who will decide the policy to be pursued by the Allies in their attempt to meet the Teuton and Bulgarian offensives.

It is believed that a prolonged stay by Kitchener in the Balkans or Italy or Greece will necessitate his resignation as war secretary. He would be unable to carry on the pressing duties of the office when action on so many fronts is proceeding simultaneously.

Lord Darby, now head of the active recruiting campaign, is suggested to succeed to the war portfolio in the event that Kitchener finds himself unable to leave the Balkans for some time. Lord Darby has held a number of important public posts, among them being financial secretary to the war office in 1900-1903, and he was also secretary to Lord Roberts. From 1903 to 1905 he was postmaster-general.

Nish Falls, Germans Progress, Over Half Serbia Now Captured

LONDON, England, Nov. 6.—After three days of hard fighting and bombardment of the fortifications, the Bulgarians have succeeded in capturing Nish.

The Germans are still crowding southward from the entry positions on the north and west and are taking prisoners steadily. In a recent engagement they captured 3000 Serbs.

The Teuton and Bulgarian invaders now hold more than half of Serbia in their grasp.

German Submarines Pass Gibraltar And Destroy Ships in Mediterranean

LONDON, England, Nov. 6.—Making their way past the defenses and lookouts of Gibraltar, German submarines have reached the Mediterranean and sunk two French and one Italian steamship. One of the crews is missing. The others, taking to boats, have succeeded in reaching safety.

Teutons Administer Severe Defeat to Russians Along Stripa River

BERLIN, Germany, Nov. 6.—A severe defeat has been administered to the Russian troops in the southwest section of the eastern front, the Teutons having succeeded in driving them across the Stripa river. Fifty officers and 6000 privates have been captured by the Teutons, who have recovered the ground they lost some weeks ago.

The Russians are continuing their offensive operations in the Drvinsk section but without results.

Bomb Starts Fire on British Boat Loaded by Austrians and Germans

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 6.—An incendiary bomb started a fire on board the steamer Rio Lages, a British vessel en route from New York to Queenstown, Ireland, according to the captain, who has arrived here. The fire was discovered on the fourth day out and was extinguished. The Rio was loaded by Austrian and German stevedores in New York.

Rumania Wavering Toward Teutons

LONDON, England, Nov. 6.—As a result of the Teuton occupancy of the Serbian banks of the Danube river and the signs of Teuton success in the Balkan campaign, Rumania is being influenced against aiding the Allies. Rumanian authorities are preparing to disarm Russian munition vessels en route to Serbia.

U. S. MARINES IN HAITI ATTACKED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 6.—American marines who are attempting to preserve order in Haiti are still being beset by revolutionists. Admiral Caperton has reported two more engagements with the revolting factions. No casualties among the Americans are reported.

The Newton Hotel at Somerset, Ky., was destroyed by fire. The loss is \$150,000.

EMPEROR PASSES NIGHT AT PALACE AT NAGAWA

[Special Cable to Hawaii Shiping] TOKIO, Nov. 6.—Emperor Yoshihito with a number of Japanese officials left Tokio last evening for Nagawa, where the emperor spent the night. The party immediately retired after reaching Nagawa, and the emperor was in good spirits and appeared to be happy as he went from the station to the palace. The party will arrive in Kigo tomorrow morning, where the first of the coronation festivities will take place.
