F BOATS BADLY SEA BATTERED ON LONG TRIP

All of Crews Seasick, and Towing Lines Broke; Divers Submerged By Waves

"Battling for 13 out of the 15 days of their 2100-mile trip from Honolulu with heavy gales and mountainous seas, during which every man on board the mosquito fleet was seasick and some on the larger towing vessels were in the same condition, the three submarines F-1, F-2 and F-3 arrived in port here yesterday afternoon," says the San Francisco Chronicle of November 14.

"Outside the heads the submarines cast off their towing lines and at a 10-mile clip came through the Golden Gate and swung around for the dash to Mare Island and anchorage in placid waters after their storm-swept experience."

Former Trip Easy.

"More than a year ago the little craft, with the ill-fated F-4 also, started for permanent station at Pearl Harbor. On that occasion the undersea craft were towed to Honolulu by the cruisers Maryland and South Dakota, two trips being made and two of the mosquitoes taken along, astern, each trip. The trip to Hawaii was through smooth seas practically all the distance."

"Homeward bound to San Francisco, the three surviving submarines were battered and dashed around by the mountainous seas which swept over them day after day and made them really submerged when they were on the surface."

Tows Break Loose.

"Three times the F-1 broke away from the naval tug Iroquois, once the F-2 got away from the Maryland. The F-2, in tow of the supply ship Nanshan, was the only one to ride through all the weather safe at the end of the hawser which held her to the plunging Nanshan."

"Starting from Honolulu it was planned to stop at Hilo and give the sailors an opportunity to visit the volcano. Nature ruled otherwise, and when the fleet arrived off the Big Island and port it was too rough to make an anchorage, so they all came along toward the coast."

"The second day out, the Iroquois lost her tow when the line parted in a heavy sea, and twice later on the little F-1 broke away from her mother ship. On one of these occasions it was the steel shackle in the towing line which snapped, and a small boat had to be lowered to put a line again on the submarine."

"It was the third day from Honolulu that the Maryland lost her tow, but picked it up again without special difficulty, and thereafter held on fast for the remainder of the trip to San Francisco. "Never have submarines been so battered as were these three on their

OLYMPICS WILL SEND BASEBALL TEAM TO HAWAII

San Francisco Organization Will Furnish Diamond Attraction Here During Carnival

The far-famed Olympic Club of San Francisco baseball team will be the baseball attraction during the Mid-Pacific Carnival celebration next February. This matter was definitely settled yesterday upon receipt of mail from Arthur H. Muhl of the Olympic Club to the baseball committee of the Carnival.

In his communication, Muhl thanks the baseball committee for the invitation to play here and Baseball Commissioner Bart B. Burke of the Olympic Club has been instructed to take immediate action as to organizing the team and having them in excellent shape when the time comes to line up against the local teams.

Muhl further stated that he was not in a position to give the exact lineup of his team, but said that he expected to have such well known semi-professional players as Artie Benham, Eddie McMillan, "Flash" Kennedy, "Dutch" Schammel and Frank Harrington in the lineup.

Bart Burke, one of the best catchers on the mainland at the present time, and a much sought after player by the major leagues, will captain the team. The Olympics are due to arrive here February 14, and will play their opening game February 17. The baseball committee as yet has not arranged a schedule for the team, but it is expected they will play at least 10 games here during a period of three weeks.

Kalaniana'ole, if present, will present the gift, but it is doubtful if he will reach Washington in time. In case he does not it will be tendered by Princess Kawahanaokoa, who is now residing at the capital. A letter signed by members of the daughters of Hawaii will accompany the gift.

J. W. THOMPSON MAY RETURN TO CITY TOMORROW

"Yes, sir, I'm coming back to Honolulu. I'm just going away for a little trip."

This, in substance, is what former Assistant District Attorney J. Wesley Thompson--now plain Attorney Thompson--told a friend just before

he left Honolulu for the coast more than a month ago.

And Mr. Thompson's word is good. He is coming back. He is scheduled to arrive in the steamer Wilhelmina tomorrow.

The information that Mr. Thompson is returning was received in a letter by R. P. Quarles, associate justice of the supreme court, from the attorney.

"I do not know whether Mr. Thompson's wife is coming with him or not," said Judge Quarles today. "The letter simply said that Mr. Thompson would leave San Francisco in the Wilhelmina."

Following his resignation, Mr. Thompson entered law practice in Honolulu and, a few weeks later, left for the coast. It is believed that he returned to his former home in Nash-

ville, Tennessee, where Mrs. Thompson was visiting with relatives.

POLICE COURT DOCKET GETTING MORE JAMMED
