U. S. TROOPERS DRIVE MEXICANS ACROSS BORDER

Raiders Balked of Loot and Several Killed and Wounded

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] NOGALES, Arizona, November 25.—A battle between 55 Villa soldiers, who crossed the line and attempted to loot a ranch house east of here, and 50 6th Cavalrymen took place yesterday. The Mexicans fired upon the cavalrymen from a distance, the troopers advancing without returning the fire until it was evident that the Mexicans wanted a fight. The cavalrymen then began shooting, killing several of the marauders and wounding another, who was captured. None of the troopers was hit.

AMERICANS INSULTED BY DRUNKEN VILLISTAS

NOGALES, Arizona, November 25.—United States troops and an ambulance detachment has been rushed to the line between this point and Nogales, Sonora, where an extremely serious situation is said to exist. The Associated Press correspondent here is informed that the Villista officers in the Sonora garrison are drunk and the troops are beyond control. An anti-American outbreak is expected at any moment, but up until midnight there had been no serious trouble. All railroads are closed.

HUDSON MAXIM PAINTS PICTURE OF INVASION

LOUIS, Mo., November 25.—Hudson Maxim, the pioneer smokeless powder manufacturer of the United States, in an address last night on the question of preparedness declared that the Atlantic coast of the United States today lies practically open to any powerful enemy.

MONGOL SMUGGLERS LOSE SMALL FORTUNE

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 25.—The federal grand jury investigating the alleged conspiracy to smuggle 58 Chinese into the United States from the liner Mongolia, on her last call under the Pacific Mail flag, has learned that if the aliens had been landed successfully the ones in the conspiracy would have received \$70,000 for distribution among themselves.

BOSS ABE RUEF BACK IN SAN FRANCISCO

JOHN HAMMOND ADVISES LARGE AERO SQUADRON

Declares for Proper Protection of U. S. Coast Line 2000 Machines Necessary

Y., Nov. 25.—John Hays Hammond, the celebrated inventor and wireless authority, who is a member of the aeronautical division of the naval advisory board, recently named by Secretary Daniels, has just returned from Europe, where he had an opportunity of seeing what some of the belligerent powers are doing in the way of airship building and fighting.

SIX PERSONS BITTEN BY HYDROPHOBIA PATIENT

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 25.—John Bukowa, who was confined in one of the hospitals here, suffering from hydrophobia, escaped from his ward yesterday morning and rushed into the street suffering from the most acute rabies. Before he could be overpowered he had attacked and bitten six persons. When recaptured and taken back to the hospital he died. The six who were bitten are to be sent to a pasteur institution for preventive treatment.

NEW YORK 'SUFFS' SPENT LOTS OF MONEY

Y., Nov. 25.—The amount expended by the Suffragist campaign committee in the recent election in this state, when the proposed amendment to the state constitution extending the suffrage to women was defeated, was \$87,131, while the amount collected by the committee for campaign purposes was \$89,303.

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IN WAR ARENA

ITALIANS GAIN DOMINANT POINT AT GORIZIA.

ROME, Italy, Nov. 25.—After a continuous assault of more than a week, in which the fighting was of the blood-fest description, the Italians have won their most important victory of the war to date and are now in undisputed possession of the summit of Mount San Michele.

TEUTONS VACATE MITAU; SUFFER HEAVY LOSSES.

PETROGRAD, Russia, November 25.—With the Russians hotly on the offensive along the greater part of the northern line, the Germans are now evacuating Mitau, falling back to a prepared line some distance south.

GREECE YIELDS TO PRESSURE IS ATHENS REPORT.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 25.—Early yesterday the despatches from Athens brought the news that Greece has definitely agreed to meet the demands of the Entente and through Premier Skoufoulis has guaranteed to fulfill all her obligations.

VON MACKENSEN HURRIES TO AID BULGARIANS.

PARIS, France, Nov. 25.—Evidently believing that the Serbian strength in the north and center is sufficiently broken to prevent any serious offensive against the lines of communication through Belgrade to Uskub, von Mackensen has now turned his attention to the operations in the Vardar valley and before Monastir, where the Bulgarians have been so severely checked and defeated.

BAGDAD WITHIN GRASP OF BRITISH TROOPS.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 25.—The British will be in Bagdad within a few hours and the important Arabian center, long the object of German diplomacy, is to be occupied and held. Yesterday the British and Indian troops drove the Bagdad defenders before them in a running fight, which carried the British almost within sight of the city, nightfall finding the battle line within eight miles of the main objective of the expedition.

SERB WAR MINISTER SAYS ARMY FAR FROM BEATEN.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 25.—Although the Serbian army has lost in the recent fighting a total of 35,100 men killed and wounded and although we have lost in prisoners nearly 20,000 men, Serbia is anything but conquer-

TORNADO SWEEPS ARKANSAS BELT AND MANY DIE

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 26.—Twelve are known to be dead and 85 injured as the result of a tornado which swept over a portion of the state yesterday, while it is feared that the detailed list will materially add to the number of casualties.

GERMANS SINK INTERNEED SHIPS

LONDON, Eng.—The British steamers City of Berlin, Auk and Iris, which were detained at Hamburg at the outbreak of the war, have been sunk by the enemy. This statement from Lloyd's is all that the censor will permit to be published at present.

AMERICAN PLAYS ARE WINNING FAVOR WITH PEOPLE OF DENMARK

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] COPENHAGEN, Denmark.—American plays are coming into such favor in Denmark that the manager of one of the Copenhagen theaters has announced his intention of devoting a whole season to American drama, with the exception of a few English plays.

ALL HANDS LOST IN SHIPWRECK ON CANADIAN COAST

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 26.—Driven ashore in a gale on the west coast of Vancouver Island, the Chilean ship Carlemapu, from Honolulu October 19, was battered to pieces last night and her entire crew of 25 men was lost.

From a Russian detention camp in Siberia there has come to Benson, Smith & Company, the local drug concern, a pathetic yet somewhat humorous appeal. A plain postal card, of the type furnished by the Russian government for its war prisoners, brought the message to Honolulu, and Otto von Asten, the writer, says that he is a "one year's volunteer; Austrian prisoner of war."
