PLENTY OF FUN AND UNLIMITED 'FREE SMOKES' FOR GUARDSMEN

Not a Dull Moment in Prospect During Three Hour Program Arranged for Tonight

Tonight it is especial good fortune to be a member of the National Guard. In the words of the late Alfred Henry Lewis, "this is their night to howl."

They are expected to howl for every number on the program prepared for the smoker, which is filled with good numbers.

The Non-Commissioned Officers' Club has invited every member of the guard, and with even greater liberality has sent invitations to many civilians, the mayor and the board of supervisors, and Gen. Wisser and other army officers, and large as the army is, it will probably be packed.

That the guardsmen expect a large crowd with good appetites, and do not intend that any of them shall suffer, is indicated by an order placed for 2000 cheese, ham and beef sandwiches besides unlimited quantities of soda and other refreshments.

The smoker will begin at 8 o'clock formally, but informally it will begin at 7:30, when the Royal Hawaiian Band will begin a concert which is to last half an hour. From that time on there will not be a moment's lull in the amusements.

ADVISES WOMEN AGAINST OPERA

Ingna Orner, Famous Norwegian Soprano, Thinks Home Life Best

"I could wish my worst enemy no greater misfortune than that he should make a grand opera career his ambition," says Miss Ingna Orner, the famous Norwegian soprano, recent prima donna of the Metropolitan Opera Company, who is to give a recital at the Opera house this evening.

"I would advise no girl to choose the operatic stage in preference to home and family, no matter how great her talent," says Miss Orner.

"At best, the life of a prima donna is no woman's true career. The life is unnatural, the strain is great, and the chances one must take are so many and so terrible. The opportunities to achieve real, enduring fame are very few; after many years of preparation that is almost heartbreaking in its intensity, one may encounter failure at the end and find that all the years of her youth are lost irrevocably. These cases the public hears little or nothing about, but I'll venture to guess that for every young woman who reaches success a hundred others have made miserable failures of their lives in the same attempt.

"True, it is not so bad if one has wealthy relatives who will supply unlimited funds for all her needs. But even then many years may be lost in hopeless struggle, under avaricious managers who will encourage the rich girl without a voice for the sake of her purse, and what he can drain from it."
