SHOWS MOLOKAI'S FOURTH OF JULY

In the motion picture show to be given by R. K. Bonine at the Opera House Sunday evening there will be seen many different phases of Hawaii, ranging from Kilauea in action to Haleakala, the Molokai settlement, lau fishing scenes, views of the Mid-Pacific carnivals of recent years and the United States army on Oahu.

The films of the Molokai settlement will be interesting to kamaaina as well as malihini, for comparatively few persons have seen the settlement, and the pictures give the next best idea to actually visiting Kalaupapa and Kalawao. Mr. Bonine selected the Fourth of July observance of this year, thus getting not only the life of the settlement and its people, but showing them in the unusual merry-making of the Fourth.

Gathering to see the Fourth of July events is first on the film; then comes the Fourth of July parade, led by the settlement police; churches, schools and societies; the boat races, representing the five principal islands of the group; Molokai, Maui, Hawaii, Kauai and Oahu; horse-racing, for which only animals bred at the settlement might be entered; the general store and scenes about the sea; Dr. W. G. Goodhue, resident physician, and Superintendent Jack McVeigh in consultation; a panorama of Kilauea, the seat of Father Damien's church, and of the Baldwin home for boys; Brother Joseph Dutton, who is doing the work Damien did before he died on Molokai; Brother Dutton and a group of inmates; the rocks of Kalawao, where the sea beats furiously; a view of the federal experiment station, and other scenes on the little peninsula that juts into the sea under the shadow of the immense windward wall of Molokai.

With the exception of a single private run of this film, which was seen by Mr. McVeigh and a few others, the Molokai scenes have not been shown in Honolulu, and they are expected to be quite as interesting to kamaainas as to malihinis.

Tickets for the Bonine pictures went on sale at the Territorial Messenger Service this morning.

ACTOR ALMOST LOST HIS LIFE BEFORE CAMERA

One of Oliver Morosco's favorite stars—Myrtle Steadman—and the leading man in the big Morosco Stock Company of Los Angeles—Forrest Stanley—are co-starred in "The Wild Olive," the Paramount offering at the Liberty theater for the last half of the week. Myrtle Steadman has been seen in the Paramount service in a number of offerings and has created a most favorable impression. Chapter 10 of "The Diamond from the Sky" deals mostly with the Far West, to which land Arthur Stanley, under an assumed name, has escaped in this section we now find Blair, Vivian Marsden, now Mrs. Blair Stanley and the great jewel. The chapter is filled with thrills.

CHARLIE CHAPLIN AS PROPERTY MAN

Opening tonight at the Popular theater, Charlie Chaplin, the great comedian, will be the headliner. He will appear in a big two-reel Keystone production entitled "The Property Man," said to be one of the funniest things Chaplin has ever done for the movies.

Recently Chaplin went over to the Keystone producers, who are celebrated for their comedy pictures, and in the mainland Chaplin in "The Property Man" has made a remarkable hit.

The second feature on Manager Hughes' bill is another fine offering entitled "The Wages of Sin." This picture deals with crime in New York City and particularly with phases of the celebrated Rosenthal murder, as a sequel to which four gunmen and former Police Lieutenant Charles S. Becker forfeited their lives in the electric chair. The picture shows, among other things, Harry Vallon, Sam Schepps and Jack Rose, all of whom were implicated in the murder of Rosenthal but turned state's evidence to escape the electric chair.
