DAN KAMAKA, ONE OF WAIALEE BOYS, IS APPREHENDED

Dan Kamaka, one of the alleged ringleaders at the recent "mutiny" at the boys' industrial school at Waialeale, who has been at large since the escape of 52 of the inmates, was taken into custody by Probation Officer John Anderson today and returned to the institution.

Kamaka was found at his home in Kalihi, where it is reported he has been in hiding since he escaped from the school. Anderson says he went back into custody quietly, and did not attempt to cause trouble for the probation officer.

Dan was one of the 15 inmates of the institution indicted by the territorial grand jury on a charge of unlawful assembly. He and four other boys were not tried, three being at large and the other having had his case dropped by the county. Those who were tried were acquitted.

JAPANESE TO FORM DRAMATIC CLUB TO STUDY SHAKESPEARE

Local Japanese will present "Hamlet" or "Macbeth" in English on April 23, 1916, the 300th anniversary of Shakespeare's death. At a meeting last evening at the Union Grill many prominent Japanese gathered to plan a campaign for the furthering of Shakespeare's works among local Japanese.

An amateur dramatic club will be formed among the young men and young ladies of the city, and rehearsals will begin the first of the year. The plan as outlined at last night's meeting is to have a production of "Romeo and Juliet" in Japanese and "Hamlet" or "Macbeth" in English. At least two acts of the former classic will be given.

Costumes for the plays will be furnished by the Japanese Students' Association and lectures on Shakespeare will be featured by this organization. K. Hattori, Z. Suzuki and Y. Fuwa were appointed as a committee to look after the productions and other features for Shakespeare Day.

PRaises STAND OF GOVERNOR ON 'PREPAREDNESS'

Telegraphed Rebuke of Henry Ford is Noticed on the Coast

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal.--"Governor Pinkham of Hawaii," said Lieut. Maurice Tenweather today, "is the sort of American citizen fit to be entrusted with a responsible post. He believes in preparedness and he is in a position to realize, better than ever we can here, the dangers of unpreparedness standing as he is at the outer portals of the United States and facing the ambitious millions of Asia."

Lieut. Tenweather, who is continuing his self-instituted campaign of "boosting" for the "Battle Cry of Peace," the powerful film now running at the Columbia theater, was stirred to praise of Governor Pinkham through a cable published from Pinkham to Henry Ford, in which Pinkham, in refusing an invitation to join Ford's peace ship, rebuked the automobile manufacturer for inviting him at a time when it was essential he should remain at his post in the mid-Pacific.

"We in Hawaii are isolated," wired Pinkham, "and we are first for a complete preparedness which would enable us to place our trust in the strength of our nation and not force us to rely on the good will of others."

"That's exactly the point," continued Tenweather. "The disarmament propaganda for this country, or the doctrine of unpreparedness, which such men as Dr. Aked advocate, means exactly what Governor Pinkham says--that we must rely for our own future on the good will of others. Belgium and Serbia are fine examples of how far humanity and good will extend when the law of might and military disposals enter in."

In addition to this article from the San Francisco Examiner, all of the coast papers print the governor's cablegram to Ford, which was sent from Hawaii by Associated Press and generally used with headlines calling attention to the "rebuke."
