

CRIMINAL CASE AGAINST FIFTY YEAR OLD KAUAHI

Charged with criminal assault on a 15 year old Hawaiian girl, A. L. Kaula was arrested last night at Fort street and Pauoa lane, and is being held in the city jail. Kaula says he is a member of the Mormon church and has the power to heal disease through magnetism. He is a big, rugged Hawaiian, more than 50 years old. Kaula has a house on Twelfth avenue, near the Leahi home, but this has been vacant for some time and he has been living at Pauoa avenue and Fort street. He got the girl to accompany him to the house under a clever pretext.

After they arrived at the house Kaula asked the girl to come in and look at it. Inside, she says, he attacked her, and as there are no residences near, her screams did not attract attention.

As soon as the girl could get away she ran home, then went at once to detective headquarters, where she told her story to Sergeant of Detectives Kellett and Dr. R. G. Ayer. Kellett

SIGHS AND SNORES GREET LETTER FROM GOVERNOR ON PAVING

Sighs, snores and urgent ex postulations greeted the reading of an 18-page letter from Governor Pinkham to the supervisors last night on the heavy subject of concrete. Three weary heads were bobbing jerkily over their respective tables when a huge block of machine mixed asphalt macadam fell off Larsen's desk and sent a shock through the hearts of more than one of those present.

It was asphalt macadam's last appeal for consideration, but not the last for the supervisors, for more than one cry arose here and there about the room, urging that the letter be cut short. Mayor Lane, however, insisted upon the complete reading of the gubernatorial tome.

"How in thunder does that concern us?" cried one of the members, referring to a portion of the message which spoke of cold weather and frozen roads, and cries of "Prunes" and "Suffering Humanity" echoed here and there.

This 18-page missive followed directly on the heels of a nine-page report on concrete by the engineer, all of which was probably responsible for the deputy clerk declaring at a late hour that he was "all in" and asking that the Beretania report be deferred until another meeting.

FAKE FIRE CALL AT FORT SHAFTER; TO TEST WORK

Fort Shafter had a fire alarm at 10 o'clock this morning that brought out the post forces in a hurry. There was excitement as the fire call sent the entire garrison into action along the lines for which the men and officers are trained. Hose carts, reels, ladders and other equipment were out in five minutes, to answer the call for fire-fighters by the main garrison of E company. Then it was found that the fire-call was a fake, being sent in to test the efficiency of the post on this line. The rapidity and order with which the soldier-firefighters disposed themselves proved the efficiency of the organizations, as in five minutes two streams of water were playing on the "threatened" building and all leaders up.

STREET-CAR IS DEATH-TRAP IN SPOKANE RIVER

[Associated Press by Federal Wireless] SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 18.—Seven persons were killed and 10 others injured today when a street car heavily loaded with workers going to their employment in the early morning plunged through a bridge over the Spokane river. A huge beam held the car under water while the drowned and drowning victims were plainly visible in their death-trap.

MORNING ON 'CHANGE

Stock prices are usually quiet Saturday afternoons, and as a rule trading practically ceases after the close of change Saturday until Monday morning, but today trading kept up, and two notable rises were made, Onomea selling at \$46.25 and Oiaa, for the first time in the history of the stock selling at \$9 per share. Onomea closed yesterday at \$45, and Oiaa on 'change this morning climbed from \$8 1/2 to \$9. (Honolulu Brewing has slumped down to 19%. Sugar stocks are all closely held in the face of rising prices. Bonds continue in demand Oiaa selling at \$99.50 to a total of \$13,000; Pacific Sugar, \$5000; Oahu Sugar, \$5000, and Mutual Telephone, \$4000.

A cable from San Francisco tells of Honolulu Consolidated Oil being bid for there at \$2.30, which marks a jump of 30 cents a share within a fortnight.

A motion to withdraw the appeal of Charles Clark, charged with furious and heedless driving, which was made to circuit court from the district court, was denied by Circuit Judge Ashford today. Clark probably will enter plea next Wednesday.


