Two hundred big baskets, each containing enough provisions for a dinner for five persons, are being delivered to as many needy families in Honolulu by the Salvation Army today, as a part of that organization's Christmas work. Each basket contains four pounds of meat, sugar, rice, potatoes, a loaf of bread, a can of milk, a can of tomatoes and some fruit. The baskets are being delivered at the Salvation Army reading room in 814 Nuuanu street. During the Christmas season the Army will hold four Christmas trees in various sections of the city. The first will be held at 7:30 o'clock next Monday evening at Camp 2, Vineyard street; the second will be held at 10 Hotel street (the Army headquarters) at 7:30 o'clock next Tuesday evening; the third will be held at 7:30 o'clock next Wednesday evening, and the fourth will be held in the Japanese hall, Kukul street, at 7:30 o'clock next Thursday evening. The children and their parents residing in the several sections are invited to attend. There will be presents, candy and fruit for the children.

Y. W. C. A.
The girls at the Y. W. C. A. home, instead, King street, will be the guests at a bounteous Christmas dinner to be served at the home at 6 o'clock on Christmas night. Each girl is going to buy a present, with a cost limit of 25 cents. The presents will be numbered and distributed during the dinner according to the numbers held by the girls. Something in the way of a social event also may be held at the homestead either tomorrow afternoon or evening.

Palama Settlement.
The needy families coming under the jurisdiction of the Palama Settlement are being cared for this Christmas by the Ad Club. The settlement's Sunday school children held their Christmas celebration in the settlement chapel last Monday evening with a Christmas tree and presents. About 200 children were present.

Children's Hospital.

Tree for Poor Kiddies.
Poverty was banished, at least temporarily, last Wednesday night when a great crowd of children from Kakaako, Punchbowl, Aala, Waikiki and other local districts gathered at the home of Mrs. John Lucas at Kaula and enjoyed a real, old-fashioned Christmas celebration. The children gathered at the office of the Humane Society, Capitol grounds, early in the evening, with Miss Lucy Ward, humane officer, in charge. Rapid Transit cars took them out to the tree. It was a happy, care-free throng, and the kiddies shouted for sheer joy when a white-bearded Santa Claus in red suit handed out presents, right and left. There was candy, nuts, fruit and other goodies galore, and it was a tired but extremely happy crowd of youngsters that left for town after the last candle on the big tree had burned out.

Associated Charities.
Basket dinners for the 47 dependent families under the care of the Associated Charities are to be furnished tomorrow by the Honolulu Ad Club, Kamehameha Schools.

The various departments at the Kamehameha schools will have a Christmas tree and celebration this evening. Exercises at the girls' school are to be held tomorrow. At noon on Christmas Day the school will serve a special dinner. There will be no services in the chapel on Christmas morning.

Oahu Prison.

Following a custom which has prevailed for many years, the Beretania settlement held its annual Christmas celebration in the Fort street Chinese church last Tuesday evening for the Chinese children of the neighborhood. Several hundred children were present, as well as many parents and other friends of the settlement. R. H. Leach, the new superintendent, was in charge, being assisted by several other workers. Chinese costumes blended prettily with the garb of the Occident, and the kiddies enjoyed themselves thoroughly. Plenty of soda pop, doughnuts, candy and fruit was to be had for the asking, and the celebration was branded the most successful ever held by the settlement.

Kaula Home.
The girls at the Kaula home now are enjoying a two weeks' Christmas vacation, school to reopen on January 2. The time will be given over to a series of picnics and theater parties. A special Christmas dinner will be served at the home at 1 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Honolulu School for Boys.
A big chimney, chock full of presents, will form the centerpiece at a Christmas dinner to be given at the Honolulu School for Boys at noon tomorrow, at which the teachers will be the guests of Principal L. Special decorations are set up in honor of the season in the children's room, including pictures, and a miniature Christmas tree which stands deep in imitation snow on one of the tables. On January 5 will begin the new reading hour for larger children, it being the plan to take up Norse mythology in consecutive stories on Friday afternoons.
