

Beware of pickpockets! Three, all Filipinos, known to be dexterous in removing the contents of pockets, have been locked in jail on suspicion and will be kept there until the holiday festivities are ended.

But several men believed to be apt pocket-pickers are at large. Some of the men are from the mainland and detectives have been detailed to watch them. Tonight in the crowds on the streets there will be at least 10 detectives moving among the people.

In addition 40 policemen have been detailed for the downtown district, and there will be an average of four to each block-length. These are traffic men and patrolmen.

During a recess of the district court today, Judge J. M. Monsarrat was presented with a gold watch charm, set with a diamond, the Christmas remembrance coming from the employees of the court.

N. Fernandez, chief clerk of the court, made a well worded presentation speech, thanking Judge Monsarrat for his courtesy and consideration to employees and saying the gift was their way of showing their esteem for him, and at the same time wishing him a Merry Christmas. Judge Monsarrat was much pleased with the present, and made a short talk thanking all the court employees.

EXPECT 150 PERSONS GOING ON HILL LINER

From the reservations which have been made at the office of Fred L. Waldron, Ltd., local agents, and the Hilo sub-office, the agents were sure today that the Great Northern will carry at least 150 passengers from here when she sails at 11 o'clock Sunday night for San Francisco direct.

To date, 51 cabin passengers have been booked. Unofficial reports from Hilo place the number of passengers booked there at close to 50, and the number of round trip passengers who will return on the steamer is approximately 80. Based on these figures, the number the big liner will take on this trip should be 130, and the agents are confident that it will not run below 150.

On her last homeward trip, December 3, the total number of passengers leaving here on the steamer was 101.

BUILDING PERMITS LESS THAN USUAL

Due probably to the fact that builders are putting off their work until the beginning of the new year or that they are busy with Christmas shopping, building permits during the last week fell far below the average. Exactly \$14,628 worth of buildings are registered in the books of the building inspector since last Saturday. This is about \$10,000 short of the usual number. Fees amounted to \$50.

HOSE PETER GRATEFUL FOR MERCHANTS' GIFT; HOPES IT RAINS SOON

Traffic Officer Hose Peter, who keeps people, automobiles and carriages from smashing into each other at Fort and Merchant streets, is hoping it will rain soon.

His reason is that he wants to get an opportunity to wear the handsome raincoat which was presented to him yesterday as a birthday present by merchants and businessmen whose establishments are adjacent to his station.

"I would like to thank the merchants who gave me the coat," said the big officer today. "It is a handsome gift and I appreciate it accordingly."

There will be no more drills for members of the National Guard until January 5, the men having been relieved from all duty for the Christmas season, beginning December 18.

Upon resumption of drills the men have some steady work ahead, as Capt. Charles S. Lincoln, U. S. A., assigned to the 1st Regiment, National Guard, will begin inspection January 5.

After inspection the men are expected to remedy any faults Capt. Lincoln may find in the work of the newly formed companies.

FILIPINO SAYS NOT GUILTY OF GRAVE CHARGE

Ricardo Cadaira who, according to court officials, has been positively identified by Mrs. M. R. Palmer as the man who assaulted her in the Lieut. W. C. Whitener home in Manoa on the night of October 3, entered a plea of not guilty in Circuit Judge Ashford's court this morning.

Cadaira, who is a Filipino, was indicted by the territorial grand jury yesterday afternoon. Today he told the court that he did not have an attorney or means to obtain one. Judge Ashford appointed Attorney Burr to defend the Filipino. As Mrs. Palmer, who is the wife of Capt. Palmer, U. S. A., will leave for the coast in the transport on January 4, the case was set for trial for 9 o'clock next Tuesday morning.

Cadaira now is serving a term in Oahu prison for a statutory offense alleged to have been committed some time after the assault on Mrs. Palmer.

COLLECTED AND KEPT MONEY BECAUSE HIS BOSS WAS SLOW PAY

Charged in the police court this morning with collecting \$18 from Brother Edward of St. Louis College on the representation that he was sent by J. F. Rosa, proprietor of a bakery, A. Leegiuar was today fined \$50, and not having the money went to jail. Leegiuar told the court that he was a baker, worked for Rosa and had not been paid, and so collected the money from Brother Edward and kept it.

There has been withdrawn from the sub-treasury in New York \$50,000 in gold coin for shipment to South America.

Karl Schulze, a stowaway on the steamer Rotterdam, who confessed to being a German deserter, will be admitted to the country, two persons having offered him work.


