VAUGHAN TAKES FIRST STEPS TO CLEAN CALENDAR

Dismisses Three Petty Statutory Cases By Nolle Prose; May Dispose of Others

Three cases involving the commission of statutory offenses, or so-called petty violations of sections 318 and 318 of the penal code, were nolle prossed in federal court today at the instance of Acting District Attorney Horace W. Vaughan. The cases were declared dismissed and were stricken from the calendar.

The first case stricken was that of Ho Tong, a local Chinese jeweler, which has been pending for several months. The second was that of M. Isaac Kaloikalani et al and the third that of Arthur Jones. The warrant issued in the Jones case also involved one Annie Kekona, who pleaded guilty and received sentence. Jones was never located.

It is this type of petty cases which have been awaiting trial for months that Mr. Vaughan says he intends to wipe off the calendar. The more gross violations of sections 318 and 318 will be prosecuted, no matter how long they have been awaiting trial, he says.

Both Mr. Vaughan and C. C. Bittling, his assistant, were hard at work today preparing to "clean up the slate." No word has yet been received from the attorney-general granting Mr. Vaughan permission to regularly appoint Mr. Bittling as assistant district attorney. At present, Mr. Bittling is giving his services gratis.

KAUAI MAN, WORRIED OVER HEALTH, KILLS SELF BY HANGING

Despondent over the condition of his health, George Gardner of Kalaheo, Kauai, committed suicide several days ago by hanging himself to a tree near his home. Gardner's body was found by a man named Kuaa, who was led to the dead man by a dog, which came to where Kuaa was working and then ran back to the body whining.

Gardner is a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. William Kruse of Elesee and has a family of 13 children. He has lived on Hawaii for a number of years and only recently returned to Kauai.

BOOZE IS CAUSE OF FATAL FIGHT AMONG SOLDIERS

Private Franklin Partly Intoxicated When He Started Row With Corporal

That Pvt. Benjamin Franklin came to his death from a knife wound in the abdomen inflicted by Corp. Benjamin Carchell, was the verdict brought in by a civilian jury under Coroner Henry H. Flemer of Waihala yesterday, after an inquest held at Schofield Barracks, where the tragedy occurred. Carchell is held in detention at Schofield, and will be tried by the military authorities on a charge of manslaughter as soon as evidence is gathered and arrangements are made for the trial.

Liquor and an overbearing disposition were the fundamental causes of the killing, according to the story told by men of the post. Franklin had been in the guard house, it is said, and was released just before Christmas Day, when he immediately proceeded, supposedly with booze bought at a place near the post, to get half-drunk. When he began a row with Carchell, about noon, he was much under the influence of liquor.

A poker game for small stakes was in progress in Company I barracks when Carchell and Franklin began an altercation. Franklin weighed 200 pounds and was inclined to bully Carchell, and in the fight chairs were picked up by the men. Before they used these the trouble was smoothed over, but a few minutes later Franklin is said to have begun the argument again, and attacked Carchell while the latter had a pen-knife open in his hand for some purpose. Before Franklin could strike Carchell the latter stabbed him with the pen-knife.

Yesterday after funeral services at the post the body of Franklin was sent by railroad to Honolulu and from here will be shipped to San Francisco and then to Lexington, Kentucky whence Franklin came and where he has relatives.

Franklin served through the Philippine campaign and has a splendid record as a soldier, but was overbearing with his comrades and inclined to look for trouble.

Carchell is now half way through his second enlistment, and has been a corporal less than a year. He is said by his superior officers to be a good soldier and a fine man, of good habits, and even temper. Drinking is admitted to be at the bottom of the trouble.

Two weeks ago a fight at the Lulluhua Beer garden, near Schofield Barracks, resulted in Pvt. Charles Walters being seriously injured when he was struck on the head with a beer bottle. Walters was taken to the post hospital, and physicians said that he would probably be ruined mentally as a result of the blow. Agitation looking to the closing of liquor places near the post was begun at the time, and it is now said that sentiment is even stronger.

A. & B. SHIPPING CALENDARS OUT EARLY MONDAY

At 8 o'clock Monday morning Alexander & Baldwin's insurance department ship calendars for 1916, 7500 of them, will be distributed to Honolulu, affording them a sure means of knowing when ships will come and go throughout the ensuing year.

The new calendars, according to A. H. Jones of the firm's insurance department, who has charge of their compilation, contain the list of steamers formerly included plus Great Northern, Persia Maru and Sierra sailings. These are three steamers not on the run when the calendars for the last quarter were printed.

There are two dates concerning the Great Northern, which should be changed, as the calendars were on the press before the change in dates was announced by cable from San Francisco. The calendar gives the steamer as arriving from the coast March 12. This should be changed to read March 13. The Great Northern will also arrive March 31 instead of April 1.

The new calendar's January sheet bears the novel inscription, paraphrasing Omar Khayyam, "Now the New Year, Reviving Old Desires, the Thoughtful Soul Protects itself from Fires."

Calendars will be distributed from the insurance department, third floor, Stangenwald building, and from the usual place for stevedores, the auto taxi stand on Merchant street, opposite the building.

Mr. Jones said today that only one calendar will be given to a person, and that if business firms send their employees after more than one, it will be necessary for the latter to have a written order for them.

BACK ON POLICE FORCE AFTER 20 YEAR LAPSE

Twenty-eight years after he was first appointed a policeman, and 20 years after his previous term expired, Dick Kekona Diamond, who lives at 1559 Emma street, was today again made an officer. Diamond served under Marshal J. L. Kaulukou, beginning his duties in November, 1887, and left the force in 1895. His commission was signed today by Sheriff C. H. Rose.
