CLUB GIRLS WILL OFFER MUSICAL TREAT TONIGHT

Work of Y. W. C. A. Extension Department Shown in Third of Week's Events

Good ideas of what the Y. W. C. A. is doing here in its extension department will be gained tonight by those who attend the entertainment to be given in the gymnasium of the new building by the girls of the different clubs that have been organized under the association.

Two Hawaiian songs, "Alinahau" and "Lei O Kaulani," sung by a club from the Kaulani home under the direction of Miss Alice E. Harrison, will be the opening number on the program.

Following this will come a dumb-bell drill under the leadership of Miss Leonora Andersen, physical director, by the Maile Club of Liliuokalani school.

"The Chinese Narcissus," one of Mrs. W. F. Frear's compositions, will be sung by the members of the Girl Guardian society, under the direction of Miss May Fraser, Mrs. Ernest E. Goo accompanying on the piano.

How a certain young Chinese girl decides on what to do for a life work upon graduating from a school of physical culture in Shanghai forms the basis of the plot for a little play, "A Chinese Girl's Commencement Problem," which the Tse Mui Club is giving. Miss Maude Drake of the normal school has drilled these girls. Music on a Chinese harp by Mrs. L. C. Lum will follow the little play.

Pageant Closing Number. Girls of the Beretania Club, who have been drilled by Mrs. Norma Adams, will stage a Hawaiian pageant as the closing number. The girls will be dressed to represent the different islands of the Hawaiian group.

A grand march by all the girls who have taken part in the entertainment will close the program.

No formal program was arranged. Mrs. A. G. M. Robertson, Miss Alice Hopper and Philip Hall each sang during the evening, and the Hawaiian orchestra from the Y. M. C. A. furnished string music downstairs in the lobby.

VETERANS OF FOREIGN WARS PLAN SMOKER

Hawaiian Post No. 94. Veterans of Foreign Wars, will give a smoker and vaudeville entertainment January 19 at Mansfield Hall, near Fort Shafter, to which a general invitation to all eligible soldiers or ex-soldiers is extended. C. J. Edwards, who organized the post, is sending out notices of the smoker to members and asking them each to bring at least one eligible man to the entertainment.

At the end of the year the charter was closed, more than half a hundred names being signed. Many others have expressed their intention of joining the organization.

The post at Schofield Barracks, which is made up of members of the 25th Infantry, is rapidly filling up, and has beaten the local post in point of membership, there being now more than 75 men on the charter roll. The charter of the 25th post is still open and it is thought there will be 100 members before it is closed.

POPULAR TO AID UPLIFT MOVIES
