# SHIPPING & WATERFRONT NEWS

## SUGAR SHIP WELL KNOWN HERE IS DISPOSED OF

A ship well known here in the early days, when she took big cargoes of sugar from Hawaii to New York around Cape Horn, has just been sold. She is the Edward Sewall, a big windjammer.

Arthur M. Sewall, founder of the firm of Arthur Sewall & Sons, owners of the Edward Sewall, was the last minister plenipotentiary from the United States to Hawaii, in the days of the Republic of Hawaii, prior to annexation.

A story in the San Francisco Chronicle of December 21 says the Sewall and Potalloch, both well-known in Hawaii and the coast city, have been sold. The Texas Company of New York, said to be a subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company, has purchased the Edward Sewall, Eschen & Minor of San Francisco, while admitting the sale of the ship Potalloch, refused to announce the purchaser.

The purchase price of the Sewall is said to be \$150,000, and the Potalloch is said to have changed hands for about \$100,000. Both are big carriers.

## CARCHELL TRIAL NOT SET

Pvt. Ben Carchell of the 25th Infantry, who killed Pvt. Benjamin Franklin in a fight in the barracks Christmas Day, is still in the guard house at Schofield Barracks, awaiting trial, the date of which is uncertain. Carchell will be tried at the post by a court martial. The date for the convening of the court martial has not been set by any orders.

## STORM DAMAGES MATSONIA STERN BREAKWATER ON KAUAI LINES PART IN HILO STORM

Great damage has been done to the \$200,000 breakwater and railroad wharf of the Makee Sugar Company, at Kealia Landing, Kauai, on the weather side of the island, according to a letter from Col. Z. S. Spalding, an officer of the company, to the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company, ordering the company to land all its freight at Nawiliwili until further orders, as the storm has partially wrecked the sugar company's breakwater.

The letter arrived yesterday on the Kinai, and President J. A. Kennedy of the Inter-Island said this morning that it states the costly breakwater and railroad wharf running out on it to be nearly destroyed. The breakwater was only recently completed. It is the main shipping point for the Makee Sugar Company and the new pineapple plantation at Kapaa, established last year.

At 5 o'clock tonight the Inter-Island steamer Claudine will sail for Maui, taking the same freight she had on her last trip, and which she was unable to land on account of the storm and raging seas.

The Claudine returned here yesterday with all her outbound freight still on board. She did not go in to Kahului at all, but anchored off Lahaina and rode out the storm all day Saturday.

At Lahaina the Claudine was able to get one boat ashore with mail. The landing nearly became a tragedy as the boat was partly filled by water from the huge breakers, drenching all occupants, including two passengers who went ashore at their own risk. Returning, the boat brought back two more passengers, who also risked their lives to get on board the steamer.

A 5 o'clock this afternoon the Maui will go out for Ahukini, taking the W. G. Hall's run this trip, as the latter steamer is now receiving her annual inspection, which began today.

As the weather moderated today at Kan-ohe, the Eben Low fleet, which was stormbound there Saturday, is believed to be at work again light-rigging 33,000 cases of canned pines out to the bark W. B. Flint, off Libby's Landing. Down to a late hour today no word had been received from the boats.

## MATSON LINE RAISES CANNED PINE RATES; NOW \$3.75 PER TON

Freight rates on canned pines have been raised from \$3 to \$3.75 a ton by the Matson Navigation Company, effective with the Matsonia, sailing Wednesday morning for San Francisco.

The old rate on canned pines has been less than that on general merchandise. The American-Hawaiian, Matson and Oceanic lines last summer increased their rates on general freight from the coast, from \$3.50 to \$4 a ton. This was followed by a boost from \$3.50 to \$4 of the general freight rate from the islands to the coast.

The canned pines rate was not raised at that time. Now, however, it also has gone up. The old rate, \$3, was made when preserved pines first began to be shipped, in order to encourage the industry. It is expected that the Oceanic and Great Northern will follow suit in the raise, and advances are expected this week.

General freight rates on the Great Northern will go up from \$3.50 to \$4 a ton beginning January 25, when the liner sails on her next voyage from the coast, the local agents, Fred L. Waldron, Ltd., have announced.

## MORNING ON 'CHANGE

Pioneer down one quarter, Olaa offered with few takers at 9 7/8, and McBryde up to \$9 again were the important features of a quiet but strong market this morning. Today is dividend day for Wailuku, and owners of the stock will receive \$1 per share, or a total of \$30,000.

Returning from Hilo, where she rode out a storm which carried away her two stern lines of eight and 19 inches diameter and compelled her to steam outside the bay for safety, the Matson steamer Matsonia docked at 6:30 this morning at Pier 16.

The big liner brought back all her Hilo freight, 1600 tons. She was unable to land anything except mail and express packages, because of the raging sea, and bringing her 40 passengers out to the wharf in launches yesterday afternoon proved a ticklish job, although the steamer came within a quarter mile of Kuhio bay wharf to get them.

Officers of the Matsonia said the sea was rough when they arrived from Honolulu and that at 7 o'clock Saturday morning the two stern lines, rope cables of eight and 10 inches diameter, carried away, about 40 fathoms of each (240 feet) being lost, together with the anchors to which they were attached. The steamer had to go outside for safety.

Went Outside Second Time. Out in the open the Matsonia rode out the storm well, and at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon, hauled up her two forward anchors and came back to the bay, making an attempt to begin discharging cargo. The sea was too high, however, so Capt. Charles Peterson took the ship outside again.

At 1 o'clock yesterday morning the steamer came back to within a quarter of a mile of Kuhio bay wharf, and passengers were brought out to the ship in launches. They had to stay overnight at hotels in Hilo, as the waves were so high that launches would have foundered had an attempt been made to use them.

All the passengers were safely brought on board by 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and the voyage back to Honolulu was begun. Extremely rough weather was met on the return trip. Capt. Ferdinand Mosher, harbor master and pilot at Hilo, told the Matsonia's officers the storm was the worst he had ever known at that port.

The Matsonia's Hilo cargo was unloaded this morning at Pier 16, and will be transhipped on the Lurline. It includes nine automobiles.
