SHIPPING & WATERFRONT NEWS CHINA IS TAKING RECORD CARGO TO ORIENT

With the distinction of being the first American steamer to reenter transpacific service since the Pacific Mail withdrew and the Seamen's Law went into effect November 4, the China Mail steamer China, formerly owned by the Pacific Mail, entered the harbor of Honolulu this morning for the first time in several months, and berthed at Pier 7 at 8 o'clock. She sails at 5 o'clock this afternoon, taking passengers and mail for China and the Philippines.

Although the liner's officers are white, all of the crew are Chinese, with the exception of 12 Filipinos in the engine room, who had to be signed on to secure the 75 per cent necessary under the language clause of the Seamen's Law. The crew passed the Seamen's Law able seamen's examination with flying colors, except the engine-room department.

Capt. F. E. Frazier reported a good trip, with the exception of two or three days of rough weather after leaving San Francisco. The passengers had a better voyage than those on the Great Northern, which, coming from San Pedro, was in the trough of heavy seas practically all the way.

Capt. Frazier is a veteran skipper of the Pacific Mail's Panama fleet, having had command of the City of Paris for a long time. Capt. Hans Thompson, the China's old commander, took the Manchuria to London.

First Officer R. O. Demarest, Chief Engineer M. Foley, Freight Clerk C. P. James and Steward H. T. Morgan were with the China under the Pacific Mail flag. Dr. F. Leach, the China's surgeon, was formerly surgeon on the Mongolia. Purser Clark is well known here, having been purser on the Mongolia when she called here in September for the last time.

New Radio Equipment. New and more powerful Marconi panel set radio equipment has been installed on the China, according to the steamer's chief operator, L. V. R. Carmine, who says it has a radius of 3000 miles, enabling the liner to communicate with Honolulu from the minute she leaves San Francisco. The assistant operator is F. A. Lafferty. Carmine was on the China under Pacific Mail ownership last year.

Among the China's passengers of prominence are Mr. and Mrs. Wong Yun Sue. He is a San Francisco merchant, and his wife is an American woman, a sister of Kathryn Clemons Gould, divorced wife of Howard Gould. Mrs. Gould passed through here a few months ago on a T. K. K. liner, bound for the Orient.

Dr. Leach, the ship's surgeon, will be married in San Francisco when the China returns, to Miss Ann Campbell, a Baltimore girl.

A bride and groom, Lieut. and Mrs. J. R. Barry, bound for Manila, are also among the through passengers.

Purser K. W. Clark said the China has 70 first-cabin through passengers, 53 second and 495 steerage. From here 10 cabin and 25 steerage are leaving this afternoon. Mail brought was 43 bags. Through freight is a capacity cargo, 1700 tons. Application for more than 8000 tons was made in San Francisco by Chinese shippers three weeks before the liner reached San Francisco on her last voyage here.

HARBOR NOTES

The oil-tanker Santa Maria sailed yesterday from Port San Luis for Honolulu.

Sailing yesterday from Grays Harbor for Port Allen was the schooner Beulah.

The Matson steamer Manoa arrived at San Francisco at 7 o'clock last evening.

Arrival at San Francisco yesterday of the steam schooner Wilmington, from here December 29, is reported.

The schooner Kitaaq, 26 days from Puget Sound, with lumber, entered the harbor today. She arrived off port late yesterday.

Two mails from the coast arrived today. The China brought in 43 bags, and the U. S. army transport Sheridan 26 pouches and two cases.

Mail for Guam, the Philippines, Hongkong and connections will leave at 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon on the U. S. army transport Sheridan, which arrived this morning from San Francisco.

The Inter-island steamer Claudine arrived from Kahului this morning, and after landing her passengers moved to Pier 6 and discharged 150 tons of pineapples into the Great Northern's hold.

New boilers will be installed on the Hill liner Minnesota without removing the steamer's 15,000-ton cargo, if possible, Marine Superintendent C. W. Wiley of the Great Northern Pacific announced in San Francisco.

Due off port at daylight tomorrow is the T. K. K. liner Tenyo Maru, due to sail for Yokohama at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, taking mail for all Oriental ports except the Philippines. The liner has 536 passengers on board.

Due to leave for Hilo at 5 o'clock this afternoon is the Matson steamer Lurline. From Hilo the liner will proceed to Kahului, returning here Sunday morning and sailing for San Francisco Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

A radio to Castle & Cooke's shipping department today from the Matson offices in San Francisco stated that the Wilhelmina, which sailed for Honolulu yesterday, and is due here Tuesday morning, has 3966 tons of cargo for this port, and 408 for Hilo.

No passengers will be taken by the W. G. Hall this afternoon, as the steamer has a cargo of explosives and combustibles on board. Next passenger steamer for Kauai will be the Maui, sailing Monday afternoon in place of the Hall, which will be overhauled and cleaned.

At 8:45 o'clock last night the American-Hawaiian steamer Panaman sailed from this port for Kahului, Kaanapali and Hilo, to complete loading her sugar cargo. General Freight Agent C. P. Moore said this morning she will sail next Wednesday, January 19, for Delaware Breakwater via the Straits of Magellan.

No passengers were brought by the Inter-island steamer Likeleke from Kauai this morning, but her freight list was fairly heavy, including 1000 bags of Kiluaea sugar, 197 of rice, 57 of peanuts and 17 packages of sundries. The steamer reported 500 bags of Kiluaea sugar awaiting shipment. Fair weather and moderate seas were experienced on the inward trip.

Several passengers on the Great Northern, which arrived yesterday, sustained bruises and sprains on the voyage, owing to the rolling of the ship. They tried to walk around on the decks while the storm was at its height, and several falls resulted. Three automobiles broke loose from their fastenings in the hold and were somewhat damaged by knocking about.

Bringing 60 cabin and 60 deck passengers, the Inter-island steamer Claudine arrived this morning from Maui. Her freight included 4787 cases of pineapples, 17 barrels of wine, nine barrels of tallow, 2500 empty bags, 27 sacks of beans, 13 crates of chickens, one crate each of turkeys and pigs, and 138 packages of sundries. Purser J. F. Mackenzie reported light winds and moderate seas on the inward trip.

Negotiations for the sale of the Inter-island schooner Omega, in port here, to George E. Billings & Company of San Francisco, owners of the schooner William Bowden, also in port receiving repairs, have practically been completed, it was learned at the Inter-island's offices today. President James A. Kennedy of the corporation said the sale depends on the condition of the vessel's hull. It has not been possible yet to get her into drydock, as the Omega is holding the deckload of the William. Bowden, until the latter's repairs are completed.

What the price named in the deal is, Mr. Kennedy said he did not care to state. The Bowden's skipper will pass on the Omega's condition when she goes into drydock, and if his report is favorable, it is believed the sale will be quickly concluded.
