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GARDEN ISLAND IS NOW ASSURED RURAL Y. M. C. A.

Killam Returns From Kauai Trip; Money Pledged for Expenses for Two Years

Kauai is assured of a Y. M. C. A. The Garden Isle will have the first rural Y. M. C. A. in Hawaii. Lloyd R. Killam of the local association and J. M. Lydgate of Lihue, Kauai, returned on Sunday from Lihue and announced that the project of an association on Kauai was a success.

"Kauai citizens have contributed to a fund that will support a rural association for at least two years," said Mr. Lydgate today. "We are pleased with the support that has been given to the movement, and feel that the association will begin its work with every assurance of success. We will have a traveling secretary who will be trained for the work, and should the work continue to grow we may have an assistant."

The plan that has been worked out is to have a hall, church or school in each section where the activities will take place. The traveling secretary will have full charge of all the work, with local leaders to assist in the campaign. All of the features of a city association will be incorporated in the plan as outlined for the rural association.

Work in athletics, Bible study, lectures, socials and other activities will be planned for each center. The committee in charge of the work on Kauai states that there will be at least 12 centers where the work will be carried on. The association will care for the religious, athletic and social life of all races on the island.

Lloyd Killam stated that the committee—Thorvald Brandt and J. M. Lydgate—was very successful in its campaign for funds. "The members of each community were very active in supporting the movement, and wherever we went we were assured of the support of the citizens. The fact that enough has been secured to meet the budget for two years speaks for itself," said Mr. Killam.

A county committee will be formed, which will have the same duties as the board of directors in a city association. It is planned to have everything in shape to begin the work by May 1.
