**U.S. MAKES BIG**  
**STRIDES TOWARD**  
**FINANCIAL GOAL**

**Year 1915 Sends Country Far**  
**Along Toward World**  
**Supremacy**

During another epochal year the  
 United States has made unprecedent-  
 ed strides toward a position of inter-  
 national supremacy, not only in com-  
 merce but also in finance. Though  
 economic events in the past twelve  
 months presented fewer sensational  
 features than those that followed the  
 outbreak of the great war, in so far  
 as this country is concerned, the de-  
 velopments of 1915, unlike those of  
 the last half of 1914, were almost en-  
 tirely on the constructive side. It has,  
 indeed, been a year in which American  
 enterprise, having fully recovered from  
 the shock and strains of the  
 world crisis, has extended over a  
 wider field and reached goals never  
 before attained. The chief difficulty  
 in describing the nation's progress is  
 to avoid the accents of extravagance,  
 and it is obvious that the remarkable  
 achievements witnessed would not  
 have been possible of fulfillment ex-  
 cept for the intrinsic strength of fun-  
 damental conditions. In the latter  
 connection, nothing has exercised a  
 more dominant influence than the un-  
 usual soundness of the banking pos-  
 ition, which has facilitated the ex-  
 pansion in general trade and indus-  
 try, besides stimulating, in conjunc-  
 tion with the wonderful success of ag-  
 riculture, the confidence essential to  
 the launching of new undertakings.  
 It is highly significant of the strik-  
 ing changes that have occurred in  
 the economic situation that New York  
 is now generally considered the  
 world's leading financial center. Cer-  
 tainly this city, as well as the coun-  
 try at large, has played a more prom-  
 inent part in international affairs than  
 ever before, and in no other way has  
 this fact been more forcibly demon-  
 strated than by the monetary events  
 of the past year. One of the most  
 noteworthy developments since the  
 outbreak of the war has been the bor-  
 rowing of vast sums here by Europe,  
 foreign loans placed in the United  
 States probably aggregating over a  
 billion dollars. Foremost among  
 these was the Anglo-French commer-  
 cial credit of \$500,000,000—the larg-  
 est individual transaction of its kind  
 in the history of finance. This ex-  
 traordinary project was launched in  
 the month of October and the amount  
 was quickly oversubscribed, part of  
 the bonds, which represent the joint  
 and several obligations of the British  
 and French governments, being of-  
 fered to the American public at a  
 price yielding about 5 1/2 per cent to  
 investors. Other loans negotiated by  
 the belligerent nations abroad are es-  
 timated at fully \$250,000,000, while  
 about \$150,000,000 of Canadian securi-  
 ties have been taken here and Latin  
 America has borrowed some \$45,000,  
 000. Moreover, in a number of in-  
 stances arrangements of a private na-  
 ture were entered upon by domestic  
 and foreign banking interests, so that  
 it seems logical to assume that loans  
 placed in this country since the war  
 started have exceeded a billion dol-  
 lars.—Dun's Review.

The British treasury advanced 200,  
 000,000 pounds to British firms to en-  
 able them to meet their obligations  
 during the early days of the war.
