

TRADITION OF ANCIENT DAYS SAVES WOMAN

Thought "Punalua" Was All the Divorce Necessary, So Judge is Lenient

A tradition of old Hawaii stalked into the police court today and brought before Judge Monsarrat a problem in practical justice which the statute books could not fairly solve, and the result was that Rose Ah Nee, although admittedly guilty, went free, and Charles M. Lyman, charged with the same statutory offense as the woman, was fined the lowest sum allowed, \$30.

To little 20-year-old Rose Ah Nee, a pure-blooded woman in her white dress and Panama hat, has come from the grass skirt days the tradition of "punalua," which means that when a woman tires of her husband she may take another man. So when Rose and Ed Ah Nee quarreled she went to live with Charles M. Lyman, also a Hawaiian, and when her former husband came with a witness and found them together she followed again the ancient custom and introduced her husband to her lover, pointing to the latter and saying, "He is my new kane (man)."

In the woman's mind there seemed no doubt that this was all that was necessary to complete divorce. Ah Nee had his wife arrested. Today in the police court she told on the witness stand the story of her love affairs.

Frankly she said she loved Lyman, but she refused to answer when Chillingworth asked whether Lyman loved her, hanging her head and smiling in embarrassment. She said she and Lyman were to be married.

GREAT NORTHERN IS BRINGING 525

The Hawaii Tours Company received telegraphic news today that the Hill liner Great Northern, due here next Monday, is bringing 450 first class passengers and 75 second-class, a total of 525, for Honolulu from San Pedro.
