Playing up to the standard of real champions, Clarence Griffin and Ward Dawson decisively defeated Walter Dillingham and William Henoch in the first round of the Hawaiian championship doubles at the Pacific court yesterday afternoon. The mainland stars won out in straight sets, 6-2, 6-1.

A large crowd was in attendance and the spectators cheered the visiting players on many occasions when quick work at the net or a run in the back court netted them a point. Griffin was watched by all yesterday afternoon, and his net game was a revelation to a number of the spectators. Time and again he would run to the net and send a fierce drive back to the end of the line.

Griffin Double-faults. Griffin did not serve in his usual manner, making seven double faults during the afternoon, but his serve was harder to handle, and when his serve went over the opponents were invariably in a bad position to handle it. The doubles champion did not save his second serve. He placed as much behind his second as his first, and consequently a number of double faults was chalked up against him. His smashing drives to the back court, and his back hand strokes were a feature of the match.

Dawson was appreciated by the spectators. The California player worked consistently throughout the match, and his first serve was usually good. The two players showed that they understood each other's game as the drives from the back court were handled in a way that showed familiarity with each other's strokes.

Dillingham Plays Well. The local players, although up against a strong team, played good tennis throughout. Dillingham brought the crowd to its feet on two occasions by starting work at the net, and in the second set returned a drive from Dawson that seemed impossible to handle. In the first set Dillingham played especially fine tennis and sent three of Dawson's serves out of the danger zone.

Dillingham was at his best in serving in the second game of the second set, when he sent three hard ones that the mainlanders failed to handle. With the score standing 40-15, Dillingham returned a pretty drive in the back court winning his serve and the one game of the set. Henoch played a fine game in the back court, making some pretty returns of hard-hit balls. On one occasion he placed Dawson in a bad position by driving a hard one at his feet.

One Game to Local. Dawson won the toss and the serve and scored the first point on a return. The game was won by the visitors, Dawson sending a pretty drive to the back court. Dillingham lost his serve in the second game, Griffin showing some fast work in the net play. In the third game, with Griffin serving, the champion double faulted, and fast work by the locals gave them the first game of the set. Henoch lost his serve, the locals annexing but one point in this game.

the tournament yesterday afternoon. Wright played sterling tennis throughout, and was the recipient of much applause when he made the banner return of the day in the first set of the match. He went back to the line and returned what looked like an impossible shot, making the score 15 all.

Wright served well, making only two double faults, and his opponents were unable to cope with his left-hand serves and drives. The former national champion showed much of the play that earned him the brackets in the great Davis Cup matches. Through-out the two sets Wright was in evidence in the serving department, winning all of his serves.


Lowrey a Real Star. To Alan Lowrey goes much of the credit for the victory over O'Dowda and Low. The local man played the most consistent tennis of the players who appeared yesterday. His exhibition in all departments of the game was especially pleasing to his many friends, who predicted that he would be a star in the tournament play. His work in serving was the feature of the day. His serves were not deadly, but sure, and not a double fault was chalked up against him. In returns and in lobbing he was supreme, and many marveled at the fine returns that followed one after another.

Wright can keep up this game, with Wright playing up to the standard of yesterday, these players will be hard to defeat in the doubles play. O'Dowda, although erratic at times, started the crowd with his fast work on the courts. He won two serves for the only games of the afternoon, and in the first set went far back and returned one of Wright's shots that was so well placed that the opponents did not attempt a try. Low, another left-hander, did not appear to be playing up to his game, but at times showed sterling tennis.

Fast Work Here. O'Dowda, serving, lost the first game when Lowrey and Wright combined some fine shots. The second game went to deuce, but the server secured the advantage and a minute later won the game when Low made a poor return. The winners also annexed the third game after it had gone to deuce. In the fourth with Lowrey serving the only game of the afternoon went to the winners in straight points. In this game Wright and Lowrey were on top of their game, and made some deadly drives that the opponents could not return.

Great work by O'Dowda gave the losers this game. After Wright had made what looked like an impossible return, the game went to 30 all, and the local player then made the next two points by well-placed shots. Low showed some fine tennis in the next game, which went to deuce, but Lowrey starred and won the game and set. The Wright-Lowrey combination played excellent tennis in the second set, and won five straight games, two of them going to deuce. The next game was one of the best of the day. Games Best of Day. O'Dowda, serving, won the first point on a hot return to the corner of the court, and a poor return made the game 15 all. The losers won the next point, but their opponents came right back with another point. Wright made a fine return in the next play, and the game was 30-40. O'Dowda and Low each scored a point, and after each side had an advantage, the local player made a fine return that could not be handled, winning the one game of the set. With Wright serving, the next game went to his side.

LUCILLE LEGROS CONFIDENT OF WINNING SWIM

Expects to Defeat Miss Cowells; May Break Record, Says Ruth Stacker

"I believe that I will win the coming swimming meet," said Lucille Legros today, when asked about the approaching race against Miss Frances Cowells. "I appreciate the fact that Miss Cowells has a good record, but I will put forth every effort to defeat the visitor and make a new record for Hawaii."

Miss Legros has been having a strenuous time with her practice swims, but she has kept at the work in the early morning and late at night, and she has reached the point where she can safely say that she will be in excellent condition for the match with the San Francisco girl swimmer. Confident of Winning.

Last evening Miss Legros negotiated the 50-yard swim in close to 32 seconds, and she is confident that she will better this mark with a record in sight. She gives Miss Cowells great credit for her work in aquatics, but at the same time states that she will uphold the honor of Honolulu by making a great effort to come in first at the finish.

Miss Legros is not the only one who believes that she will win from the visitor. Miss Ruth Stacker, who made 31 seconds for the 50 yards, said today that she expected to see a victory for the Honolulu girl. "Miss Legros is a great swimmer, and I would not be surprised to see her make a new American record," said the former island champion.

Ruth Stacker Picks Lucille Legros. "I have watched both swimmers in action, and while I feel that Miss Cowells is a great swimmer, I do not believe that she can win from Miss Legros. The local girl has made fast time in the 50-yard event, and should come very close to the mark set by Miss Olga Dortner some time ago. It will be a great race, but I rather believe that Honolulu will receive the prize in the ladies' race," continued Miss Stacker.

TRIALS IN YALE SWIMMING MEET RUN OFF TODAY

Local Stars Will Go After Records at Y. M. C. A. at 3 P. M.

Swimming devotees of the city are expecting new world's marks to be set in the interscholastic swims at the Yale Alumni meet, which will be held at the Y. M. C. A. Saturday evening at 7:30 o'clock. The present interscholastic record for the 50-yard dash is held by Herbert Vollmer, now a student at Columbia University. Vollmer made the distance in 27 seconds.

Students in the city expect that the mark in the 50 yards will be smashed by some of the local stars. In the 100-yard event the present record is 1 minute 2 1/2 seconds, which should be lowered by Kanakani and some of the other dash men. Had Clarence Lane entered the meet for McKinley it is certain that both of these marks would be smashed. New world's records may be made in one of the three Championships Official.


Duke Kahanamoku and Ludy Langer, two of the world champions, will be judges of the meet, with Clair Tait, the Northwest diver, who is present instructor at the Y. M. C. A. George Dyson has been selected as the referee for the meet. Other officials are: Announcer—John Anderson; starter, W. T. Rawlins; timers, R. Horner and Lester Petrie; scorer, W. P. Alexander. Yale Alumni committee, E. B. Bostwick, W. T. Rawlins and W. P. Alexander.

The preliminary events will begin this afternoon at 3 p. m., at the Y. M. C. A. pool, and heats of the 100-yard, 50-yard and 220 yard trials will be held. The finals will take place tomorrow evening at 7:30, and one of the largest crowds in the history of an indoor event is expected to be present to see new records made in the aquatic events.

1ST INFANTRY EXPECTS TO BE FIRST IN MEET

T., Feb. 18.—With the Carnival athletic meet only a few days away the 1st Infantry aspirants for the various teams are working hard every available minute getting into the best possible condition. The enthusiasm which was lacking at first has at last put in an appearance and the keenest possible interest is now in evidence. If history does not repeat itself and the finish of the meet finds the laurel wreaths of victory reposing on the brows of the 1st Infantry athletes it will be because the other contestants have been able to develop better men than they had last year. Smith and Bray, whose sprinting last February was a revelation even to their friends, are better than ever and they are going to give a good account of themselves this year. Lieut. Sears has charge of the sprinters and also the flag relay race. This event is always one of the most popular at the meet. The race is a mile and there are 16 entries for each team; this makes each man run 220 yards. All the teams are competing at the same time so that every spectator can follow the course of the rival as well as his own team.

The 25th Infantry was an easy winner in this event last year with the 1st Infantry second. This year Lieut. Sears says that he will give the 25th a run for their money. The tug-of-war team from the 1st Infantry pulled all of their opponents off their feet with the greatest ease last year and practically the same team of tug-of-warriors under Lieut. Smith's coaching is going to try its best to repeat the dose again this year. Sergt. Quinn has a large and enthusiastic squad of distance runners who are struggling for places on the mile-run team and the Schofield to Honolulu marathon. This last named event, a new one, will be run off on the last day of the meet and judging by the preliminary interest, should prove a very popular event. There is nothing about long distance running that Sergt. Quinn does not know and his men should acquit themselves most creditably. Quinn is some runner himself, in fact he wants to run the entire distance in the Marathon himself.

Lieut. Gonsler and Lieut. Riley have charge of the training of the wrestlers and the baseball relay, and judging from the quality of work displayed in practice both teams will cover themselves with glory. One thing is certain, that, win or lose, the 1st Infantry athletes are going into the Carnival meet to do their best, and whatever the result, their performances will reflect nothing but credit on themselves and the 1st Infantry.

CROSS COUNTRY RUN BIG EVENT IN ATHLETICS

Cornell Run Saturday Should Furnish Stiff Competition For First Place

With the many athletic events staged for the Carnival period the school stars have not been neglected, and Saturday afternoon at the Punahou campus at 3:30, the star long-distance runners of five of the local institutions of learning will meet in the Cornell Cross Country run. To the students of the various schools this event will be the one feature of the week.

Critics differ as to the winner of the coming event. The Kamehameha squad will be in the running, as they have a number of star long distance men. A well rounded team is the result after weeks of training at that school. Mills also will have a number of runners who are picked to be first at the finish.

Stars in Long Run. Carey and Scott of St. Louis, Machado and Kalkaka of Kamehameha, Chun Lee Puck of Mills, Waterhouse of Punahou and Stickey and Lee of McKinley are picked by many to be first at the finish. Carey has captured this event the past two years and he is looked upon as a probable winner on Saturday. The St. Louis students state that whoever wins from Carey is entitled to heaps of credit.

At Mills they are pinning their faith on Chun Lee Puck to win out over a strong field. Heretofore Mills has not cut such a big swath in the cross country run, but the boys have been out over the long course for some time, and it would not be surprising to see the Mills team first at the finish. Joseph Amos and N. Kurokawa are figured to be up with the first men in.

Joe Stickey Entered. Joe Stickey has been the star at McKinley, and in his trial proved that he could go the distance. He is fast for the half mile, but whether he can win from Carey and Chun Lee Puck is the question that the critics have not answered. Jack Lee, who made good time in the mile, is expected to finish in a good place for the high school.

Punahou will be greatly weakened by the loss of Jere Smith, who was figured to be up with the winners at the finish. Smith will not be entered, but Coach Midkiff will send a well-rounded team into the field. Waterhouse, Singlehurst and Pekelo have been showing up well.

Look Out For Kam. Kamehameha is not figuring on landing the winner, but they are aiming to have their first five men up in the running. Machado should be up close to the first place man at all times, and the other runners are expected to crowd the star men throughout the grind. The course will be laid out tomorrow afternoon, and all the entries will be given an opportunity to go over the route. It is expected that the runners will go over a course twice in order to give the spectators an opportunity to see them in action. The men will be off the mark at 3:30 at the Punahou campus. Twenty Points to Winner. The officials of the meet announce that the team winning will be given 20 points on the coming Cornell track meet; the second place team will receive 12 points. Eight points will go to the third place team, and the fourth team will be given four points as a start for the coming meet. In the cross country, only the first five men on each team will be figured in the point making, giving the winner a chance for a score of 15.
