Pleasant rains on the island of Lanai have proved very beneficial, insured excellent crops, and put the thousands of cattle and sheep there in fine condition, so that the outlook for the year is bright, according to reports made at the annual stockholders' meeting of the Lanai Company, Ltd., this morning in the office of H. All the old board of directors was re-elected with the exception of A. N. Campbell, whose place is taken by C. Q. Yee Hop of this city, who has purchased stock in the company and made a contract to take for a five-year period all the cattle and sheep available for sale.



LOCAL AND GENERAL

The case of Clarence Weakly, charged with second degree robbery, went to trial in Circuit Judge Ashford's court today.

Owing to the lack of a quorum there was no meeting yesterday afternoon of the Bar Association. No date has been set for the next meeting.

Hearing on the petition of the Hawaiian-Japanese Daily Chronicle for discharge in bankruptcy has been continued for two weeks in federal court.

Bunting, flags and electric lights in profusion are being placed about the exterior walls of the palace in preparation for Carnival week.

In the case of the territory against the Kapiolani estate, a suit for taxes, a jury in Circuit Judge Stuart's court yesterday found for the government in the sum of \$2223.54.

Charged with having obscene pictures in possession, Serafina Torres pleaded guilty in federal court today. She will be sentenced at 8:30 o'clock next Wednesday morning.

Sheriff C. H. Rose today issued an order closing the Iwilei district from tomorrow night until after the Carnival. Fear of disorders or possible rioting occasioned the order.

Further hearing of a petition for the allowance of final accounts in the estate of Carolina Pinheiro will be had in Circuit Judge Whitney's court at 10 o'clock next Monday morning.

To discuss proposed amendments to the constitution and bylaws, the members of the Woman's Board of Missions of Central Union church were to hold a special meeting this afternoon.

Snyder's flower shop in Fort street will receive and take care of all flowers contributed for the making of bouquets and floral decorations to be sold at the benefits next week for the Free Kindergarten and Children's Aid Association.

Automobile license plates for 1916 are beginning to appear on the streets. They are a bright red in color and visible for blocks. The contrast in color between the new plates and last year's blue ones is so great that it is easily distinguished by police officers.

Five hundred dollars damage was done by a fire which yesterday destroyed the home of Joe Gomes, Emma street near Gandall Lane. The new Seagraves engines were used for the first time and did fine work in preventing the blaze from spreading.

JAPANESE GO TO CLAIM PICTURE BRIDES TODAY

Fat, thin, tall, short, handsome, ugly, mature and young Japanese men stood around on the front steps and the lanai of the U. S. immigration station this morning. They were from nearly every island in the group and were waiting for their picture brides.

Inside the station the prospective wives dressed up in all their finery and made their toilettes with unusual care, because they were going to be married to men whom they had, in most cases, never before seen, except by photograph.

"We received a batch of 45 picture brides by the Chiyo Maru Monday," Federal Immigration Commissioner R. L. Halsey says. He watched the men as they stood or sat around, some stolidly smoking cigarettes, others pacing around nervously.

"The picture brides range from 17 to 25 years of age, and they wait here until their prospective husbands come for them. At the present time, according to Mr. Halsey, about 100 picture brides a month arrive here from Japan.

SERVICE AND CIVILIAN OFFICIALS TO ATTEND MILITARY MASS SUNDAY

Governor Lucius E. Pinkham, Brigadier-general John P. Wisser, Rear-admiral Clifford J. Boush and many other officers of the army and navy and civilian officials will be present Sunday morning at 10:30 at the Catholic Cathedral on Fort street, when mass will be held for the dead of the army and navy. Bishop Libert of Honolulu, Father Valentin, chaplain of the National Guard, Chaplain Jeremiah A. Lenehan, 4th Cavalry, and Chaplain Ignatius Fealy, the 1st Field Artillery, will take part in the mass.

GOVERNOR DISLIKES TASTE OF DRINKING WATER FROM NO. 4

Governor Pinkham is working on an investigation of the sanitary condition of Reservoir No. 4 and expects to have a letter on the matter ready to submit to the next meeting of the loan fund commission.

"I am drinking water from a well 1000 feet deep and I think it is mighty good water," he declared. "I want the rest of the people of Honolulu to have water equally as good. Water from Reservoir No. 4 may not be bad, but to me it seems to be so near the edge that it is suspicious. I don't like it and I don't think many other people do. Ask any one who drinks it."

GOVERNOR AND GUARD HOSTS TO WISSER AND STAFF AT BIG DINNER

At 7 o'clock tomorrow evening at the Alexander Young hotel Governor Lucius E. Pinkham, commander-in-chief; Brig.-gen. Samuel I. Johnson, the adjutant general, and other officers of the National Guard will be hosts at an informal dinner at which Brig.-gen. John P. Wisser and officers of the staff, Hawaiian Department, will be guests of honor.

The dinner is merely a social occasion and is not to be in any way formal. There may be some short responses to toasts and a few impromptu addresses.

SEALS WATER METERS FOR LONG TEST RUNS

Test runs of the four standard water meters picked by Harry Murray, general manager of the water department, will begin Monday. An agent of the firms manufacturing each meter will be present at the sealing of the meter and the start of the test. A continuous flow of water through the meters will be maintained for from four to six months in order to ascertain which meter will stand up best under wear.

Three or four meters from the 500 purchased are being installed every day. It will not be long before the 500 are all put in in the downtown district, Manager Murray says.
