Shipping & Waterfront News

HORSES DUE TO 11 A.-H. BOATS REACH JAPAN TUESDAY NOW CHARTERED OUT OF 26

Next Tuesday the two costly American saddle horses, the best that money can buy, going to the Japanese emperor as a coronation gift from the Japanese residents of California, are due to reach Yokohama on the T. K. K. liner Shinyo Maru. The horses passed through here on the boat February 11. The liner is scheduled to arrive in Yokohama February 22.

According to the San Francisco Chronicle, the Japanese selected horses as a gift typically American, and through the Japanese Association of America, searched the state to find the best possible. The animals were selected by Maj. A. Asano, a retired army officer, and Dr. F. Morioka.

Both animals are thoroughbreds. One of them, Dom Pedro, by Artist Jr. out of Azmoorle, was bred in Missouri; the other, Montgomery Rex, by Montgomery Gay out of Lady Rex, Macdonald, is a Kentucky-bred horse.

In order that the animals may arrive in perfect condition, unusual care was exercised in fitting up quarters for them on the Shinyo Maru, and two attendants accompany them—Dr. G. Sukuma, a veterinarian, and Y. Suzuki, a graduate of the Tokio Agricultural college.

On their arrival at Tokio the horses are to be presented to the emperor at a formal ceremony, in which Consul-General Y. Numano, who is now in Japan, will represent the California Japanese. While the mikado's stables now contain 120 horses, they are said to be practically all of European or Australian stock.

HARBOR NOTES

Thursday the British steamer Coolgardie sailed from Powell River for Adelaide. She will call here for bunkers from the Inter-Island.

Negotiations have been completed between the Southern Pacific and the Toyo Kisen Kaisha, by which the Japanese line will handle the railroad's freight business to the Orient.

Departure of the Canadian-Australian liner Niagara from Sydney is reported. She is due here March 3, to sail the same afternoon for Vancouver.

A few good rooms are left on the Hill liner Northern Pacific for her return trip to the coast, leaving here at midnight Saturday night, February 26 the local agents, Fred L. Waldron, Ltd., have announced.

Tuesday will be the first anniversary of the Hill liner Great Northern's initial appearance here. She touched at Honolulu for the first time February 22, 1915, on her cruise to the Pacific coast and Hawaiian Islands, from New York through the Panama canal.

Plenty of mail from the coast will arrive here Monday and Tuesday. The Great Northern, due Monday morning, has 504 bags, and Tuesday morning will see both the Northern Pacific and the Matsen steamer Manoa in. Both are bringing mail.

Advices from Seattle state that the Blue Funnel line may shift its coast terminus from Puget Sound to Vancouver, B. C., because of the unusual test in the Seaman's Act. The Blue Funnel line employs Chinese crews, with English-speaking Chinamen at the head of each department.

Switzerland now owns the St. Gotthard tunnel and railways.

In the course of a news story concerning the American-Hawaiian's action in abandoning the all-water route between the Islands, Pacific coast ports, and New York, via Magellan, until the canal is reopened, the San Francisco Chronicle of February 6 says that 11 of the line's steamers are now under charter to carry freight directly or indirectly connected with the war.

"There are eleven of the company's fleet of 26 steamers which are now under charter," says this paper. "Four of them are run to South American ports out of New York, and others are chartered to the Dupont Company, carrying nitrates.

No Cargoes Taken Out. "The chartered steamers include the Nebraska, which was damaged by a mine last year, and the Dakotan, American, Californian, Columbian, Hawaiian, Iowan, Oregonian, Missourian, Virginian and Kansan.

A.-H. STEAMERS NOW COMING WILL CARRY SUGAR TO MAINLAND

All American-Hawaiian steamers now on the way to Hawaii, except the Florida, will load sugar at Island ports for San Francisco, according to the line's local office. The steamers concerned are the Alaskan, due here next Thursday; Kentuckian, due March 4; Mexican, March 17; Texan, April 2; and Georgian, April 14. General Freight Agent C. P. Mors has also announced that two more big sugar-freighters will be built for the Hawaiian trade, each with a capacity of 12,000 tons, deadweight. The new steamers will be used when traffic to New York from the islands, via Panama, is resumed with the canal's reopening.
