HILL LINE IS NOT ASKING TRADE AS FAVOR

"It's Up to Merchants." Says Traffic Manager Relative to Great Northern

"I am not going to take up the matter of freight business with anybody here," says Cal. E. Stone, general traffic manager of the Great Northern Pacific Steamship Company. "If Honolulu merchants want to get us enough freight business to warrant keeping the Great Northern on the Honolulu run, it's up to them."

When seen at the office of Fred L. Waldron, Ltd., local agents for the Hill line, Mr. Stone remarked that he is not doing any worrying over the situation.

According to R. B. Booth, treasurer of Fred L. Waldron, Ltd., outgoing freight on both steamers Saturday night will be close to 3000 tons, of which each liner will have about half, although freight needing quick despatch will be sent by the Great Northern, going direct from here to San Francisco. The Northern Pacific stops at Hilo, and from there goes to San Pedro first.

Most of the outgoing cargo will be canned pineapples, and there will also be more than 5000 bunches of bananas. "Our whole trouble is with down freight, from San Francisco here," says Fred L. Waldron. This morning he stated that the local office is taking care of the up freight nicely, and getting enough to fill the Great Northern.

WIRELESS RATES TO GREAT BRITAIN CUT

Anyone who wants to send wireless messages from Honolulu to friends in Great Britain and Ireland can do so through the Marconi office at one-half the regular tariff on deferred business (night letters) which is still suspended on account of congestion. The reduced rate is made possible by direct communication from this city to the Atlantic coast and service direct from the Atlantic coast to the British Isles. Manager W. P. S. Hawk of the local office announced the reduction last night.

MAKURA TAKES SMALL THROUGH PASSENGER LIST TO AUSTRALIA

After only three hours and a half stay in port, the Canadian-Australian liner Makura, which docked at Pier 15 at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, went on to Australia at 6:30 last evening, taking 20 first cabin, 3 second and 1 steerage passenger from this port.

An uneventful trip was reported by officers of the steamer, who said she experienced moderate to strong variable winds and a heavy westerly swell coming down from Vancouver and Victoria. For Honolulu the Makura brought 13 first cabin, 7 second and 9 steerage passengers. Her through list is small, only 18 first, 10 second, and 23 steerage, not including those getting on here.

No cargo was brought to Honolulu. The ship's through cargo is 2320 tons. Dr. A. E. Porter is surgeon, having succeeded Dr. T. K. McAlpine, surgeon for the last two years, who is in training for the front, having resigned to fight for his country.

SAKE PRODUCES GORE SHEDDING ON WHARF; FIST FIGHT BLOODY

Several Japanese had men appear to be included in the crew of the Japanese steamer Anka Maru, No. 4, which was in port this morning taking bunker coal en route to Sydney from San Francisco, and was expected to sail some time today.

While in San Francisco eight or nine of the sailors deserted, and last night at 6 o'clock the crew was locked up here for the night, following a fist encounter in the afternoon between the third mate and the boatswain over three gallons of sake, which Watchman R. E. Nute would not allow on board unless by the captain's order.

The two officers got into a fight on the wharf, and the third mate came out second best. Watchman Nute drew his gun when things began to look dangerous for the mate, who was cut on the head and bled considerably when his nose stopped the boatswain's fist.

Inter-island ticket agents say the Mauna Kea will be crowded to capacity on her trip to Hilo and way ports leaving here next Tuesday, March 1. TOTAL BOOKINGS 1020 FOR FOUR STEAMERS

More than 1000 tourists and Honoluluans will leave this city between Saturday and next Tuesday afternoon on four steamers, all bound for the mainland.

Inquiry at local steamship offices today showed 550 to be booked to date for the great Northern, sailing at 11 o'clock Friday night; 300 for the Northern Pacific, sailing at midnight Saturday; 100 for the Oceanic steamer Sonoma, sailing Tuesday afternoon, and 70 for the Manoa, sailing at about the same hour.

This makes the total 1020 passengers, most of whom are tourists, although many are residents here leaving on business or pleasure trips. It is probable that an even larger total will be shown before Saturday, which may bring the aggregate close to 1100 or 1200—a good-sized village in itself.

The Manoa's bookings are capacity, and there is already a waiting list of nearly 90 for the Matsonia, which can carry 200. She does not sail until March 8.

HARBOR NOTES

Departure of the schooner Alpena from Newcastle for Honolulu February 20 is reported.

Another mail will not arrive from San Francisco until Tuesday morning, when the Matsonia docks.

At 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon the inter-island steamer Shoshone sailed for the Hamakua coast of Hawaii.

Next mail for San Francisco leaves at 11 o'clock Saturday night in the Great Northern, mails closing at 9 o'clock that evening at the postoffice.

Sugar on windward Kaula awaiting shipment is reported by Purser Henry Kaipo of the Maui to be Makaweli, 31,000 bags; Kilanea, 2400; Lihue, 1000; Grove Farm, 585.

The inter-island steamer Maul brought a horse, four empty carboys, 1950 bags of Grove Farm sugar, 2050 of Lihue sugar and 45 parcels of sundries from Kaula yesterday.

Some time today the Japanese steamer Anka Maru, here yesterday for bunkers, is due to resume her voyage to Sydney. She has taken 400 tons of coal from the inter-island.

The Japanese steam schooner Sumitoku Maru, here February 14 on her first call, bringing 200 tons of freight, was due to sail today for the Ladrone islands to load guano for Japan.

Advices received by Manager John K. Clarke of Hind-Rolph's local office state that the barkentine Hawaii will not be able to sail from Port Allen for Chemarus, B. C., before next week. She had expected to get away Saturday, but has been delayed.

Russian refugees fleeing to the Pacific coast on Japanese boats will be deported unless they have sufficient funds to comply with immigration requirements. A batch of 50 arriving in Seattle on the Manila Maru will be sent back by immigration authorities.

At 6 o'clock this evening the Matson steamer Manoa, Capt. Francis M. Edwards, will sail for Kahului to discharge cargo and load 2000 tons of sugar for San Francisco. She will return to Honolulu at 6:30 Sunday morning, and sail Tuesday afternoon at 4 for the mainland.
