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### TUNA CLUB WILL HEAR FROM BIG GAME FISHERMEN

James W. Jump of Los Angeles and Fred K. Burnham of Martinez, two noted fishermen of California visiting here, are to address the Hawaii Tuna Club next Monday afternoon. The following announcement is made by Secretary H. Gooding Field: "Hawaii Tuna Club—At the Chamber of Commerce rooms on Monday, the 28th inst., at 4 p. m. "Mr. James W. Jump of Los Angeles (holder of the world's record for yellowfin tuna at Catalina, Cal.) and Mr. Fred K. Burnham of Martinez, Cal., will give talks on the "Art of Game Fishing" in Hawaii and other waters, explaining the use of the rods, tackle, artificial bait and other accessories used in this fascinating sport. "Mr. Jump, from his recent angling experiences here, states that Hawaii is the leading game fish center of the world. "You are cordially invited to attend this meeting."

### A. A. WILDER RETAINS ATTORNEY TO LOOK INTO METZGER LEASE

Investigation of the transfer of the Metzger lease in Hilo will be made by Robert W. Breckons, acting as attorney for Judge A. A. Wilder. If action is brought in court it will be by Judge Wilder as a taxpayer and a citizen. "I know that land was transferred, or an attempt was made to transfer land, to Metzger at a very low appraised value in view of what it has been earning since," said Judge Wilder. "Metzger has been getting the benefit from the quarry under an agreement of sale, but I do not believe he has any title to it as yet."

### JAPANESE KILLED AT SCHOFIELD HAD LIFE INSURANCE OF \$1000

When Torahachi Urateke, carpenter's helper, was killed as he lay sleeping in his little cabin at Schofield Barracks last November by the accidental discharge of a gun in the hands of a soldier some distance away, he did not leave his wife and children without means. ### STONE HEARS OF CITY'S GOODWILL TOWARD HIS SHIP

Share of Hotels in Caring for Tourists Praised at Dinner for Great Northern Man  
Honolulu's gratitude for the magnificent service which the islands are being given by the Great Northern Pacific Steamship Company was clearly shown from five distinct angles last evening, when the attitude of official Honolulu, the Chamber of Commerce, the Promotion Committee, the hotels, and the daily newspapers was voiced at a dinner given by T. B. Thiele, manager of the Territorial Hotel Company properties, in honor of Cal E. Stone, the company's passenger traffic manager; Capt. A. Ahman of the Great Northern, and Capt. A. F. Hunter of the Northern Pacific. Covers were laid for 12 in the private dining room of the Moana hotel, and service and appointments were perfect. In the center of the big round table was an effective massing of American Beauty roses and maiden-hair fern, around the edge of which rose-lights glowed softly. Hand-painted place cards showed the giant liner Great Northern in waters of a tropical blue. One striking feature of the menu was an ice cream ship for each guest, in two colors, the ship being on a base of green ice cream representing tossing sea waves. First Cargo of Sweets. The Great Northern has not yet borne a sugar cargo, but last night a two-foot replica of the ship had her decks covered with sweets. When the model of the liner was brought in, flying the house flag of the line, and with the portholes blazing with electric lights, there was spontaneous applause from the diners as the other illuminations of the room were darkened, with the exception of the rose lights. Mr. Stone, in a frank and informal talk, spoke of his line being "wedded to the islands," and made no threat of immediate divorce. He said definitely that the ship would continue on this run until May, but beyond that date he could make no promises. H. P. Wood, formerly the San Francisco representative of the Promotion Committee, was given a large share of the credit for the inauguration of the Great Northern service here. Helped This Year's Carnival. Capt. Hunter told a story about a whale, and Capt. Ahman countered with a whale of a story, after which Mayor Lane expressed officially the city's pleasure at the coming of the great liner, and commented on how greatly the service contributed to the success of this year's Carnival. Emil A. Berndt, chairman of the Promotion Committee, emphasized the fact that Honolulu will eventually show its appreciation of the Hill line by giving adequate support in the matter of tonnage. Mr. Berndt also paid a graceful compliment to the host of the evening by praising the service of the local hotels and the spirit in which that service is tendered to visitors. Mr. Berndt then "introduced" Mr. Thiele, who touched on how his company had managed to cope with this year's unprecedented flood of tourists, and promised that if the Great Northern continues coming to Honolulu his company will enlarge its establishments so as to be able to assure satisfactory accommodations for all. Fred L. Waldron, president of the Chamber of Commerce; R. O. Matheson, editor of the Advertiser; L. de Vis-Norton of the Hawaii Publicity Commission, and Riley H. Allen, editor of the Star-Bulletin, also spoke briefly. Those who enjoyed Mr. Thiele's hospitality last evening were Cal E. Stone, Capt. A. Ahman, Capt. A. F. Hunter, Mayor John C. Lane, F. L. Waldron, Emil A. Berndt, R. O. Matheson, L. de Vis-Norton, A. P. Taylor, Riley H. Allen and Hallett E. Abend.

### J. C. McCANDLESS DIES; RESULT OF AUTO ACCIDENT

Machine Turned Over on Road Near Lodi, Cal., and Fatally Injured Honolulu  
On the Great Northern tomorrow Mr. and Mrs. John A. McCandless and Mrs. George Rodolph and her daughter, Miss Helen Rodolph, will leave for California to attend the funeral of James C. McCandless, who was killed yesterday near Lodi, in the San Joaquin valley, when an automobile he was driving overturned. Young McCandless was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. McCandless. Mr. and Mrs. J. S. McCandless are also going to the coast tomorrow night. McCandless was 23 years old, and was in business as a broker in Oakland, with George R. O'Connor. He married Miss Marian Rodolph, the daughter of an Oakland banker, last June. According to telegraphed news from California McCandless and his partner were returning from Sacramento to Stockton when the car, driven by McCandless, turned over just west of Lodi, where the county highway crosses the Southern Pacific tracks. O'Connor was thrown from the car and escaped with only a few bruises, while McCandless was pinned beneath the car and was so severely hurt that he died a few hours later in the Lodi hospital. James Christal McCandless was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. McCandless and a nephew of Lincoln L. McCandless and James S. McCandless of Honolulu. He graduated from Oahu college and then went through the University of Pennsylvania. While at the latter college he sustained a broken leg in an automobile accident. After going into the brokerage business in Oakland with O'Connor, McCandless married Miss Marian Rodolph, daughter of an Oakland banker. They took a long bridal trip through the East. Recently the bride's mother, Mrs. George Rodolph, came to Honolulu and is now, with Miss Helen Rodolph, a younger daughter, a guest at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John A. McCandless. The news of the fatal accident caused a shock to the community, for young McCandless had a great many friends and acquaintances here and the various members of the family are known all over the islands. While he had not been here for some years, McCandless kept up his wide acquaintance, and during the short time of their stay Mrs. Rodolph and Miss Helen Rodolph have been widely entertained and have won many friends.
