

# WATER-GATE FOR HARBOR IS PLAN OF DRYDOCK MAN

### W. T. Donnelly Will Show Plans and Drawings for Great Waterfront Structure

## BIG CENTRAL TERMINAL IS BASIS OF OUTLINE

A water gate for Oahu, to which all liners will come alongside to discharge passengers, and where swimming events in future Carnivals may be held, is the big project which will be presented to Honolulu civic and commercial bodies this week by William T. Donnelly, famous engineer, as a civic ideal toward which this city may strive.

Donnelly has had plans and drawings of the big project made and will show them to the organization interested this week. A large drawing of the proposed water-gate has been made by Architect Bloodgood Tuttle of New York and is in Mr. Donnelly's possession, to be shown to the Outdoor Circle Friday afternoon, when the noted engineer, who built the inter-island's floating drydock, and the 20,000-ton drydock at Prince Rupert, B. C., will outline his ideas of what Honolulu needs.

As conceived by Mr. Donnelly the water-gate is a structure which will do for Honolulu what the big union terminals of Chicago, New York and other cities have done toward making transportation better and safer there. As designed by the architect, Mr. Tuttle, the water-gate calls for a structure 600 feet long and 150 wide, built in a manner commensurate with the city's future growth, stately, commodious and beautiful.

At the ocean end of the water-gate the location for which has not been decided, the plans call for steamers to dock alongside and discharge passengers. The plan is to have a gangway 20 feet wide or more, so that passengers could land in a small part of the time now required. No freight would be handled at the water-gate, but the boats would go to the present piers and wharves to take on and unload cargo.

The structure includes plans for a great swimming pool, partly enclosed, where aquatic events and swimming races could be held. There are landings provided for pleasure craft, spaces for bazaars, a band concert pavilion and auditorium, rooms for handling baggage and other facilities.

### Promotion Committee to Ask Chamber to Issue Formal Invitation

Hill, will be invited to Hawaii if the plans of the Hawaii Promotion Committee are carried out by the Chamber of Commerce—and it is confidently expected that they will. The Promotion Committee will meet tomorrow and ask the chamber to invite Mr. Hill here in connection with the campaign to keep the liner Great Northern in the local service. The committee wants Mr. Hill to look over the field and talk with Hawaii's people before considering taking the big liner off this run.

# COLLINS WILL OFFER PLAN TO CUT ROAD COST

A radical change in the plans of the road department, proposed by the city engineer to allow for the cut of \$4000 in April, May and June appropriations, will be submitted to the board of supervisors for its approval at tonight's meeting.

Discussion of the mayor's veto of the ordinance creating a superintendent of parks will be another matter that will occupy the attention of the board. Technical mistakes in the wording and the provision which makes the superintendent report to the park committee instead of the board are the two reasons given by the mayor for his veto.

Henry Murray, manager of the water works, has filed a report with the clerk on the cost of installing hydrants and laterals on Kalakaua avenue and this will probably be brought before the board also. The report recommends that an examination of the joints in the water main be made before the pavement is laid in order to avoid possible future trouble. The \$2670 expenditure for the hydrants and laterals is recommended to provide for the needs of the district after the Waikiki reclamation to be made by the territory is completed.

# ENTERTAINMENT BY CHINESE IS GREAT SUCCESS

More than 1000 people gathered at the Hawaiian Opera house on Saturday evening to witness the first entertainment given by the members of the Chinese Musical Society. Scattered through the audience were a goodly number of Americans who applauded heartily as the young Chinese showed to advantage in the musical and dramatic acts.

Gen. D. J. Wudan was the director and promptly at 7:30 the entertainment opened with moving pictures. This was followed by musical numbers and one-act plays by members of the society. Songs were rendered in both English and Chinese.

# CAPITAL STOCK OF I.-I. RAISED TO \$3,000,000

### Corporation Cuts Big Melon in Form of Stock Dividend; Officers Re-elected

As predicted by the Star-Bulletin several weeks ago, stockholders of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company, Ltd., at their annual meeting this morning, voted to increase the capital stock of the corporation from \$2,250,000 to \$3,000,000.

The new issue of \$750,000 stock will go to existing shareholders as a stock dividend, and will thereby reduce the company's surplus, which had reached the untidily sum of something in excess of \$1,500,000.

All the directors were re-elected with the exception of Cecil Brown, who is unable to serve on account of ill health. J. W. Waldron was elected a director in his place. More than 18,000 shares were represented at today's meeting.

The directors met a few minutes after the stockholders' meeting had adjourned, and re-elected the old officers for the ensuing year. They are James A. Kennedy, president; James L. McLean, vice-president; Norman E. Gedde, secretary and treasurer. The Audit Company of Hawaii was named as auditor for the corporation.

# GUARD OFFICERS HAVE BUSY WEEK AHEAD ON HAWAII

Brig.-gen. Samuel I. Johnson and Col. Charles S. Lincoln of the National Guard left for Hawaii on Saturday evening to make the annual inspection of 14 companies, including 13 infantry companies, one machine gun company and a troop of cavalry.

According to plans arranged previously yesterday was a big day for the two officers, who planned on making inspection of four companies, and traveling by automobile for a distance of 25 miles.

The schedule outlined is as follows: Sunday, Company A, Waialae, 7:30 o'clock; Company F, Pahoa, 9:30 o'clock; Company E, Olaa, 11 o'clock, all in the morning; Company G, Pahala, 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Today the headquarters are to be inspected, the time set being 7:30 o'clock this evening.

Tomorrow, night at 7:30 o'clock, Company B, Hilo, armory is to undergo inspection, and on Wednesday evening, Company D and Machine Gun Company at Hilo.

No inspections will be held on Thursday, according to the schedule, but on Friday Company H, Kona, will be inspected.

Inspections are planned for Saturday, that of Company K, Kohala, and of Company I, Kohala, at 5 o'clock and 7 o'clock in the evening, respectively.

Waimea cavalry is to be visited by the officers Sunday morning, the men lining up for review at 6:30 in the Honokaa; at 10:30, Company L at Honokaa, at 10:30; Company L at Paauhau, and at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, Company C at Laupahoehoe will be inspected. At 4 o'clock in the afternoon, 1st Separate Company, Paipaliku, will form the last inspection of the trip.

### NATIONAL GUARDSMEN TO CAMP OVER NIGHT ON PUNCHBOWL CREST

Punchbowl's extinct crater is to be initiated as a practise ground for the National Guard next Saturday night and Sunday. On Saturday afternoon the first battalion of the 1st Infantry, under Maj. M. M. Johnson, together with Company M, 1st Infantry, will assemble and march to the summit for an overnight camp. This will be the first regular visit from guard troops for the purpose of practise work on the famous crater and the men will be given chances to work out problems in extended formation, as well as doing patrol duty during the night. A return march will be made to the Armory building Sunday afternoon. About 350 men will take part in this trip.
