The police say that when a particularly large batch of chickens disappears during the night, they begin to suspect Ah Sun. It was this reputation which brought him trouble Monday night, for when 12 fowls were reported missing from the chicken house of a Japanese contractor, officers were sent out at once to watch Ah Sun's actions, catching him with the full dozen in his possession.

**ARRANGE TO GO
THROUGH BOOKS
OF COMPANIES**

Three of the local public utilities corporations, the tele-telephone and electric companies, will be requested by the Public Utilities Commission to have representatives present at a special meeting to be held Monday night in the Capitol building. The procedure for the regular yearly investigation of their books by the commission will be outlined at the meeting. Later there will be special meetings at which the books of each corporation will be examined separately.

Dates for the meetings at which the affairs of utility corporations on the other islands will be gone into will be advertised in the local papers. A single meeting will be held on June 5 for the railroads, which are not altogether under the jurisdiction of the commission.

The January statement of the Hawaii Telephone Company was read at the meeting yesterday afternoon, and laid on the table. Toll rates, set in September, will not have the full approval of the commission until the expiration of a six months' period on April 1.

Testimony taken on Hawaii by Henry O'Sullivan, secretary of the commission, regarding the accidental death of Sago Yamaguchi on the Shoshone in January was still in stenographic form and its consideration was deferred until the next meeting.

Accident reports and bills occupied the attention of the commission for the rest of the session.

NEW SHIPYARDS FOR TACOMA GOING UP

Tacoma is enjoying a boom in ship building, according to the Daily News of that city, which says Babare Brothers will build a shipyard on the Old Tacoma waterfront to accommodate vessels up to 250 feet in length. Construction has been started. The new shipyard will cost more than \$50,000. It will be built alongside the present Babare yards, which will be used for the construction of small boats.

Babare Brothers have for several years engaged in the construction of fishing vessels and other small craft up to 65 and 80 feet long. A tuna fishing boat recently was launched at the Babare yards for a Los Angeles tuna fishing firm. The enlarged shipyards will give employment to several more men.

Demand for Tonnage.
Ship building promises to be one of the most important industries on the Pacific coast because high rates caused by the war and generally improved shipping conditions have led to an unparalleled demand for tonnage. Practically every American vessel on the Pacific coast is in operation. Some are chartered for two years in advance.

The Lindstrom shipyards at Aberdeen have been leased to a Puget Sound syndicate. Two auxiliary steamers will be started immediately and two more will be built later.

The Seattle port commission leased a site to the Elliott Bay Yacht and Engine Company for 15 years. Both large and small vessels will be built by the company.
