MAYOR EAGER TO STIR UP PUBLIC FOR BABY WEEK

Glad Movement is Afoot: Washington State Busy on Welfare Campaign This Week

"I am glad to see that something is being done to save the babies of Honolulu," says Mayor Lane.

"Stir up the public, give it facts telling of the number of babies who are born dead and are dying who might live, the babies who are born blind who need not have been sightless, the babies who grow up twisted and warped in body, mind and morals who can be saved, and a great work will have been done."

Enthusiasm is rampant throughout the entire state of Washington over the "Baby Week" idea, and "Better Parents, Better Babies, Better State" is the slogan adopted by the women of the Washington State Federation of Women's Clubs for a "Baby Week" now being held, and which will end tomorrow.

The state federation appointed a committee of three prominent Washington women to arrange details for the proper observance of better baby week throughout the entire state. This committee has been interested principally in the organization of meetings in rural communities, and aptly suggestions, speakers and subjects.

To instruct parents. According to the Seattle Times, the chief purpose of the better baby campaign is to instruct mothers and fathers in fundamental facts with regard to the care of babies. Chief among these has been the fact that breast milk is the greatest safeguard against sickness.

It is expected that the Washington campaign will bring home to the various communities a knowledge of the facts regarding the needless deaths of its babies and a realization of the ways in which they must protect them.

The Washington federation has made the following suggestions for the observance of a "Baby Week":

A "Baby Sunday" might begin the week when special sermons could be preached in the churches.

A school day, celebrated in the schools with talks by the teachers, compositions by the students or plays such as "The Narrow Door," or "The Theft of Thistle-down," which may be obtained from the February Ladies' Home Journal.

Father's Day Observed. Father's day, observed with talks before men's clubs and fraternal organizations, bringing home to the father his duty in protecting the baby.

Mothers' day—Women's meetings with discussions and conferences. The topics should include "Birth Registration," "Community Mortality Rates," "How the Community Can Better Baby Conditions" and "A Clean, Pure Milk Supply."

Nursery and Demonstration day with baby parade.

Community day, with a big mass meeting featuring songs of childhood and with discussions and addresses on such subjects as "After Baby Week—What?" "What the Cities Have Done for Their Babies," "The Purpose of Baby Week."

Denver's New Idea. In Denver, Colorado, in conjunction with "Baby Week," a "Better Mothers' movement" has been started whereby middle-aged women and gray-haired grandmothers are being rejuvenated. The Denver circle of the Mothers' Congress is responsible for the project and, under the direction of the hygiene committee, gymnastics, dancing and swimming classes for mothers have been started.
