## CLEMONS TO BE SENIOR JURIST OF U. S. COURT

Henry McConnell, special examiner for the department of justice, who has been in Honolulu for the last several weeks, today settled a question which has been bothering many Honoluluans. The solution is this:

If Horace W. Vaughan is confirmed to the local federal bench, there will be no "first judge" or "second judge" in the United States court here.

There will, however, be a senior judge. Judge Charles F. Clemons will acquire this "title" for the reason that he has been on the local bench for a longer period of time than the other judge. But the powers of the two judges will be equal; one will not have authority over the other.

Should a dispute arise, however, Examiner McConnell states that section 23 of the judicial code makes provisions in this respect. This section of the code reads as follows:

"In districts having more than one district judge, the judges may agree upon the division of business and assignment of cases for trial in said district; but in case they do not so agree, the senior circuit judge of the circuit in which the district lies, shall make all necessary orders for the division of business and the assignment of cases for trial in said district."

The senior judge of the circuit in which the local federal court lies is the senior judge of the circuit court of the ninth circuit, in California.

Judge C. J. Conradt is scouring the lowlands of Molokai, Ed Devaachelle is searching the mountains and Sheriff Crowell of Maui is somewhere on the island with four men. All are looking for Wing Pau, a wealthy Chinese planter and fisherman, who disappeared Wednesday morning.

Pau left after bidding goodbye to his family and carefully leaving his money and keys behind. He took a shotgun with him. The police were notified Thursday and have been on the lookout ever since.

Pau lives at Ualapue and is manager of the big Merriam fishpond. He has lived on Molokai for many years and is well known.
