

TRY PERSONALLY CONDUCTED TOUR TO SEE KILAUEA

The Hawaii Publicity Commission, represented in this city by L. W. de Vis-Norton, and having offices with the Hawaii Promotion Committee, has agreed to inaugurate a series of personally conducted tours to the active volcano of Kilauea and around the Big Island.

The first tour of the series will be held on Saturday of this week, and will cover the volcano district, arriving in Honolulu at 10 o'clock, arriving in Honolulu at 10 o'clock, arriving in Honolulu at 10 o'clock.

Upon arrival at 10 o'clock on Sunday morning the party will go by automobile to the beautiful Rainbow Falls, famed in Hawaiian legend as the home of the goddess Pele, and will then proceed direct to the Volcano House, directly overlooking the crater of Kilauea. This will be reached in time for luncheon after which visits will be made to the Lava Tube, the Craters of the Moon, the Aniakohi and Kilauea-Iki, and finally the automobiles will go down to the edge of the active fire-vent, arriving there about 4 in the afternoon. This allows an examination of the great fire-lake by daylight and also permits of an exploration of some of the marvels of the main crater of the volcano.

As soon as darkness falls, the party will return to the fire-lake in order that a full and prolonged view of the magnificent night spectacle may be obtained, and the journey back to the Volcano House for dinner will not be commenced until everyone is satisfied to leave. The night will be spent at the hotel; part of the following morning devoted to short local excursions, such as the Sulphur Banks and Tree Mounds, and about 11 o'clock the party will leave for luncheon at the fern-embowered Hilo Hotel, arriving there shortly before 1 o'clock.

There will be ample time for a ramble around the pretty city before embarking at 4 for Honolulu, which will be reached early on Tuesday morning. The steamer journey both ways will be made by the "Mauna Kea."

NO INCREASE IN WILDER'S TAXES IF BILL IS PAID

well as the granting of any other relief asked by Wilder.

It states that the complaint is vague, ambiguous and indefinite, and that it does not appear from the complaint for what ex. expenditures or purpose the alleged expenses were incurred by Mr. Forbes, or in what respects they are not payable out of appropriations mentioned in Wilder's bills.

Not Yet Certified.

The demurrer goes on to say that the complaint does not allege that any of the vouchers referred to by Wilder, or any bills accompanying them, have been certified or signed by Mr. Forbes, either as an individual or as a territorial official. It is also stated that the complaint does not allege that any of the vouchers or bills have been approved by Treasurer McCarthy or presented to Auditor Fisher; it being further declared that there is no allegation in the complaint to the effect that Auditor Fisher attempted to issue any warrants for the payment of the claims.

It is pointed out that the complaint makes no allegation that either Fisher, Forbes or McCarthy is about to "act in a fraudulent or corrupt manner" in approving any of the vouchers, and that, if any vouchers are approved or paid, there is no allegation made that "they are not doing it in good faith."

Is Wilder Stock Owner?

In the demurrer filed by the public utilities commission, it is alleged that it does not appear in the complaint that Wilder owns any stock or is financially interested in any public utility, or that he is required by law to make any payment or contribution to the public utility commission.

The demurrer further states that it does not appear from the complaint that the rights of Wilder as a citizen, property owner or taxpayer will be injuriously affected by the acts alleged to be threatened and sought to be restrained, or that Wilder's taxes will increase or other expenses brought about or caused by the said acts.

 "I am glad that I was raised to be a soldier!"


