Judge a Comer.

The loss of Gandil, according to the players who watched the play in the International League last year, isn't going to be so great, as Griff will have Judge at the initial sack. Judge is a youngster and many predict that he is not yet ripe for fast company, but a glance at his record for last year will show that he batted .320, stole 28 bases and led the first base men of the league in fielding by a big margin.

Griff will not have the weakest catching staff in the league by any means, and if the trouble to Al Smith's optic does not keep the big fellow from the game the staff will look pretty sweet to the hangers on around the Willard. In addition the Senators will have "Vul" Gharitty, who was a star with the Millers last year. He hit the ball at a .308 clip and is figured to make the squad this year. Then Griff has John Henry, who is considered one of the real stars of the league. Ehrman from the University of Virginia is also receiving a trial.

Old Nick on Job.

Griff always has a pretty fair pitching staff and this year will be no exception. Old Nick Altrock is the pitching coach and the comedian has made a success of handing star box material. Of course, Walter Johnson will be the big show, and as one writer in Washington said recently, should make the team. Johnson is figured to make a good showing in the play this season.

Bert Gallia, who pitched great ball last year, is sure, while Harper and Ayres, who were in the first rank last year, should make an excellent showing this season. The Nationals will have three good southpaws in Beutley, Boehling and Humphreys, and Washington fans are looking to see a vast improvement in Boehling's pitching this year. Jim Shaw got off bad last season, but the big fellow has lots of stuff and may show something this year. Then Griff will have Diamond, who was a wizard at the end of last season; Gettings, who is said to be a comer, and Sloan and Dahlen, two other stars, who made good in the bushes.

Weak at Second.

There should be a hard fight on for the second base job between Morgan and Sawyer. Washington is sure to be weak here and Griff is now regretting that he did not land Gideon for the place. Ray Morgan is not the player he was a few years ago, while Sawyer has not displayed much with the bluegum, and Griff needs a hitter as well as fielder at the keystone position.

McBride will take care of the short field position, as he has since a few years after the inauguration of the first President, and although the Washington captain is not a demon with the stick, he still is able to field his position and is one of the brainiest men in baseball today. Old George will be in the lineup at the first of the season ready to go through another hard campaign.

Foster will be stationed at third again this year and should have another good year. With the exception of Malsel, the National third-sacker outbats all of the players in that position in 1915, and Griff has made to move as yet to replace him with a rookie.

Hard Hitting Outfield.

Washington should have something this year that it has lacked for a long period. That is a hard hitting outfield. For years the Washington team has been kept out of first place because it was weak on the offense, but this year with the coming of Jamieson, Earber and Rondeau, the garden tenders should be able to land a number of blows during the season.

The old trio of Milan, Shanks and Moeller is certain to be a thing of the past this year. NEW YORK, N. Y.—Lord Lonsdale of London, the most famous sportsman in England, and the donor of the famous Lord Lonsdale championship belt, now held by Freddie Welsh, will be one of the ringsiders at the Willard-Moran scrap, according to Promoter Tex Rickard. The Englishman has written Rickard, telling of his intention of coming over for the bout and asking for the reservation of a choice seat.

Rickard says that the demand for seats is very encouraging. Two women are among the purchasers of \$25 tickets. The \$5 and \$2 tickets will not be placed on sale until just a few days before March 25, the date of the big mill. In this way Rickard says he can eliminate the ticket speculating to a great extent.

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
