## FLORIDAN GOING TO ORIENT, IS LATEST NEWS

The American-Hawaiian steamer Floridan, the big new freighter now on her way to San Francisco via the Straits of Magellan, from New York, will be dispatched to the Orient April 15, is stated by the San Francisco Chronicle. Says this newspaper: "Taking advantage of the high freight rates offering to the Orient, and inaugurating a new service, the American-Hawaiian Company is to dispatch the big freighter Floridan for the Orient, April 15. The vessel is now on her maiden trip from the east coast, and when she leaves here will be loaded to capacity with 10,000 tons of freight for Yokohama, Kobe and Shanghai.

"Fred Hooper, traffic manager of the company here, made the announcement of the pioneer departure of the freighter in the Orient trade. The American-Hawaiian will operate the Floridan instead of chartering it."

## PLENTY OF ROOM FOR LAST OUT TRIP OF G. N.

There will be plenty of staterooms available for the farewell trip of the Great Northern, sailing from here at 4 o'clock the afternoon of April 4, the local agents, Fred L. Waldron, Ltd., believe.

They said today that after Monday they will receive a wireless from the San Francisco offices releasing rooms not taken there and at San Pedro until that time they do not know how many cabins will be available for the return trip.

To date 206 are booked for the big liner's goodby trip. Of these, 126 are first cabin and 80 second. "We could have sold out the entire ship from here," Ticket Agent Lamb of the local agency says this morning, "but the Shriners reserved nearly everything, leaving us only a small section of the boat. We now understand that only 50 or 75 of the Shriners are coming, where several hundred had been expected. That will leave a lot of empty cabins available for the return voyage."

The Great Northern will arrive a week from today, coming via Hilo. She will not be seen in Honolulu again until next December, as service during the summer and fall has been discontinued.

## THIRTY ARE BOOKED FOR VOLCANO TRIP; NORTON WILL GUIDE

To date about 30 persons are booked for the Hawaii Tours Company personally conducted excursion to Kilian volcano, leaving here at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, in the inter-island steamer Mauna Kea.

C. H. De Vis-Norton, Honolulu representative of the Hawaii Publicity Commission, will be the "personal conductor" for the trip, and explain the history and features of everything worth seeing on the journey.

The party will be taken in automobiles from the Hilo wharf to the volcano house and the volcano's center. Returning, there will be a side trip to Rainbow Falls. The tourists will return to Honolulu at 6:30 Tuesday morning by the Mauna Kea.

## MANOA SAILING AT 8 TONIGHT FOR KAHULUI TO COMPLETE CARGO

At 8 o'clock this evening the Matson steamer Manoa, Capt. F. M. Edwards, will sail from Pier 10 for Kahului, taking a dozen passengers for that port. She is taking on practically all her Honolulu sugar here, and will load the balance of her cargo at the Maui sugar port.

Capt. Edwards says today he hopes to be able to load his cargo at Kahului and return to Honolulu either Monday night or early Tuesday morning. The steamer will sail Tuesday at noon for San Francisco. She will take out a capacity cargo.

## HARBOR NOTES

The Oceanic steamer Sonoma will arrive Monday morning, with 483 bags of mail from San Francisco.

Another mail from San Francisco, after the Sonoma Monday, will arrive Tuesday morning on the Matsonia.

The Makura sailed from Suva for Honolulu on time yesterday afternoon. She will arrive here next Friday morning.

Andrew Farrell, waterfront reporter on the Farrel, left on the inter-island steamer Maui last evening for Kaula.

Cargo of the Matsonia, due Tuesday morning from San Francisco, is 7064 tons, of which 5625 are for this port and 1439 for Hilo.

Due here a week from today from Australia, to sail the same afternoon for Victoria and Vancouver, is the Canada-Australasian liner Makura.

Next mail for the mainland will leave Sunday morning in the T. K. K. liner Nippon Maru, due off port from Yokohama at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

In February the U. S. bureau of navigation reports 44 sailing, steam, gas and unrigged vessels of 33,803 gross tons, were built in the United States and officially numbered.

The old Pacific Mail liner City of Sydney has been stripped of her boilers and machinery at Oakland. She is being converted into a sailing vessel. L. A. Pederson bought her for \$12,000 some time ago.

Lewers & Cooke, owners of the schooner Repeat, said today they hope her repairs will be completed at Aberdeen by the end of this week. She is expected to resume her voyage to this port with lumber next week.

At 2 o'clock this morning the China Mail liner China sailed for the Orient. She was supposed to leave at 11 o'clock last night, but repairs to a broken air-pump in her engine room made her late in getting away.

Late this afternoon the Matson steamer Manoa is sailing for Kahului to load sugar. She will return here Monday morning, to sail Tuesday morning for San Francisco. She will take out a capacity cargo, 6880 tons of sugar and 500 of molasses.

Capt. H. Nagano, former master of the T. K. K. South American liner Kiyu Maru, is in command of the Nippon Maru, due tomorrow afternoon from the Orient. He succeeds Capt. H. Stanley Smith, who is slated for command of the turbine Tenyo Maru, succeeding the late Capt. W. W. Greene.

Although the Matson steamers Manoa and Lurline will sail hereafter at noon Tuesdays instead of 4 o'clock in the afternoon, as announced by the Star-Bulletin yesterday, there is no change in the leaving time of the Matsonia and Wilhelmina, which will continue to depart at 10 o'clock Wednesday mornings.

Handling a total of 4350 tons from Thursday noon to 10 o'clock Monday morning, was the record made by McCabe, Hamilton & Renny's stevedores working on the steam schooner Columbia, which sailed Monday afternoon for San Francisco. The gangs unloaded the ship's nitrate cargo and put 2200 tons of sugar aboard, in the time mentioned.

Due to reach San Francisco today or tomorrow is the American steamer Republic, formerly the German freighter Walkure. She left here at 5 o'clock the afternoon of March 11, continuing her voyage from Paapeete, where she was raised, to the coast. The local agents, the B. F. Dillingham Company, said today they have not heard whether she has been sold, as rumored around the waterfront here.

Two official mascots are now possessed by the China Mail liner China. They are cute little puppies, one named Nigger. Both were born on shipboard Dec. 22, and their mother is on the ship.

There were three of the puppies originally, but one shuffled off this mortal coil a short time ago, leaving the brother and sister to see that everything goes all right on board the steamer.

Yesterday the "pups" were very busily engaged in trying to chew the legs off the furniture in Purser C. P. James' office.

## MATSON LINERS WILL HANDLE N. Y. CARGO

Every Matson steamer coming from San Francisco to Honolulu, from the present time until the existing congestion is relieved, will have 2000 tons of freight heretofore brought by American-Hawaiian steamers from New York, according to Capt. Francis M. Edwards, commander of the Matson liner Manoa, this morning.

"We expect 2000 tons per ship of this overseas freight for Honolulu from now through all summer, or until the American-Hawaiian resumes its New York-Pacific coast service," says Capt. Edwards. "That is the main reason why the Matson company is sending out the Manoa and Lurline at noon Tuesdays commencing with the Manoa next Tuesday, instead of the usual hour, 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The down freight is bothering us more than that for the coast."

"By leaving here Tuesdays at noon, we hope to get in to San Francisco at daylight the following Tuesday. This will enable us to put in a full day Tuesday, giving us that much extra time to handle this New York freight for Honolulu, all of which comes in cars."

Figuring 40 tons to a car, the usual capacity of freight cars, Matson boats will thus load every week the contents of 50 cars, two average train loads of freight shipped overland by rail from New York and Chicago for transshipment to Honolulu by Matson boats, now that the American-Hawaiian has suspended sailings until the Panama Canal reopens.

General Agent C. P. Morse of the American-Hawaiian says today that he knows of no arrangement by which his line is shipping New York cargo overland for transshipment in Matson boats. He added that he thinks the two 13,500-ton steamers retained by the American-Hawaiian to carry by rail from New York and Chicago for transshipment to eastern refineries by rail, will come back empty each trip after discharging their cargoes at San Francisco.

Advice received by the American-Hawaiian's local office from San Francisco are that the line's big new freighter Floridan is due to reach that port from New York via Magellan, about April 10. Her New York cargo for Honolulu and other island ports will be transferred to the Texan, which is scheduled to leave San Francisco with it about April 24, arriving here May 1.
