The division of forestry soon will have a fresh collection of seeds from Hawaii's flowering and forest trees, reported David Haughts, forest nurseryman, to the commissioners of agriculture and forestry this morning.

Nurseryman Haughts says that the seeding season for most of the trees is just coming in. Two boys have been kept busy collecting seeds in and around the city and for some time to come the division will be at work getting up as large a collection of seeds as possible.

A package containing four species of Ficus, three of which are new to the islands, has been received from the Royal Botanic Gardens, Calcutta, India, and from the forest department, Nairah, British East Africa, a list of plants and seeds available for exchange.

KAUAI CANE IN FINE SHAPE, SAYS RODIEK AFTER VISIT TO ISLE

Plenty of rain in midwinter, followed by the present period of plentiful sunshine, has made the sugar-cane on every Kauai plantation of excellent quality, according to Georg Rodiek, who has just returned from a visit to the island, accompanied by J. F. Humbert.

"All the cane on the Kauai plantations looks fine," says Mr. Rodiek. "They had a great deal of rain some time ago, and the present sunny weather will no doubt improve the quality of the juice greatly. Indications are excellent for the coming crop."

Heart Disease Kills Dogs As Well As People

Deaths Frequently Occur After Visits From Masters or In Moments of Excitement

That human beings are not the only creatures to suffer death from heart failure, but that dogs are frequently victims of such an attack, is the statement of Territorial Veterinarian Victor A. Norgaard, made today in his report before the board of agriculture and forestry.

Three deaths from heart failure have been noted at the territorial immigration station, according to the veterinarian, and in two cases the deaths occurred immediately after the victims had been visited by their owners.

Because of this fact, visits at the station from owners to their dogs are discouraged by the officials as much as possible. Death occurs most commonly among the higher bred animals during the last months from heart failure," said Dr. Norgaard in his report. "This animal appeared in excellent health up to a few minutes before his death. The keeper of the station was at the time distributing the evening meal, and the dogs were, as usual, more or less excited."

"The dog in question was also dancing around and barking, when suddenly it rolled over, frothing at the mouth, and was dead in a few minutes. A post mortem examination showed valvular insufficiency in both sides of the heart, so that the dog could, at very best, have lived but a short time."

Dr. Norgaard says that heart failure is estimated by authorities to cause at least 5 per cent of the deaths in well bred dogs or dogs of the pet or toy variety. Frequently the disease is mistaken by the owner for rabies.

NEED MAN IN KONA TO HELP VETERINARIAN

Need of a deputy territorial veterinarian on the island of Hawaii was impressed upon the territorial commissioners of agriculture in the report read today at the monthly meeting by Territorial Veterinarian Victor A. Norgaard. Dr. Norgaard used as proof of his argument two cases of glanders which broke out last month at Kohala.

"This disease, undoubtedly a relic from the Waialeale outbreak in 1911, has made its appearance in Kohala," says the report, "a mare with a mule colt being reported as suffering from glanders by the local veterinarian, Dr. Rowat. Dr. Elliot had both animals killed and the premises disinfected."

"Since that time Dr. Rowat found one more case in a neighboring stable, which likewise was destroyed. While there is no serious cause for alarm, the desirability of having a deputy territorial veterinarian in that district becomes manifest."

Dr. Norgaard suggests that if the plantation interests and the ranchers of that neighborhood should unite in recommending the appointment of a deputy, the board ought to cooperate with them by providing a good man to look after the stock in North and South Kona. He says it is next to impossible for one veterinarian to cover the island.
