ARMY & NAVY GUARD TOURNEY DATES SET IN MAY AND JUNE

Company Commanders Ordered to Commence Training of Men Without Delay

Dates have been fixed definitely through National Guard orders issued today for the two big military tournaments to be held in Honolulu this spring. The dates announced are May 14 and June 11.

The three battalions of the 1st Infantry and the 1st Separate Company of Engineers have been assigned to competition work on the earlier date, the 1st Separate Company being attached to the 1st Battalion for the purposes of competition.

Companies of each battalion winning first and second places on high aggregate score for all events of the preliminary meet will compete in the final contest on June 11.

Program for May Meet.
The program of events for the preliminary meet May 14 is as follows:

- (a) Competitive drill for companies: Company and platoon movements. Close order only.
- (b) Bayonet exercise by companies.
- (c) Setting-up exercises by companies: Without arms.
- (d) Wall scaling: Selected squads.
- (e) Shoe race: Three men from each company.

During the annual encampment (probably in the month of October, 1916) competitions in the following events will be held:

- (a) Extended order drills.
- (b) Pitching and breaking camp.
- (c) Physical drill with the rifle.
- (d) Field firing problems.
- (e) Retiring or advancing sharpshooters race.

The foregoing list of events is tentative and is subject to revision.

Major Merle M. Johnson, 1st Infantry, is continued as officer in charge of finances, and Capt. Gustav E. Schaefer, 1st Infantry, is continued as officer in charge of events, program and entries.

Company commanders are ordered to commence the preparation and training of their respective companies for the preliminary contests May 14. Representation from every company is required.
