S. W. ROBLEY IS MADE SECRETARY FOR BOYS' WORK

Y. M. C. A. Directors Name Valuable Worker for Responsible Position

In recognition of the splendid work accomplished by Samuel W. Robley during the two years that he has been connected with the local Y. M. C. A. in his various gymnasium, religious and boys' club activities, in and out of the association building, the directors of the association at their regular monthly meeting yesterday promoted Robley to a new position created for him with the title of community boys work secretary.

In his new duties which he will assume September 1, Robley will continue his extension work with the dozen or more boys' clubs he has organized, his Prison Aid Society work, and will also have general direction and supervision of the work in the association building.

Assisting him in the execution of this work in the building will be Donald Ladd, captain of the football and basketball teams at Denison University, Granville, O., this year, who will come to Honolulu August 1 as fellowship secretary, after completing a summer course at the Lake Geneva Association Training School. Ladd is the crack quarterback of the State of Ohio. He graduates in June. Robley will also have an assistant to take charge of the physical work of the Boys' Y. M. C. A.

Robley first entered as a volunteer religious worker in the local association a little more than two years ago. Later he was employed to take charge of the boys' extension work. At that time, June, 1914, there were four boys' clubs outside the building with a membership of 120. Today there are 12 such clubs with a total membership of 489 and an average attendance of 2850 at 94 meetings a month, requiring three paid assistants to work evenings.

In December last year the budget for this extension work for boys was \$4100. The matter of raising funds to meet this budget was then turned over to Mr. Robley, who has since raised it to \$4500 for the year. Work begins on the new clubhouse at Kakaako next week. This is to be the finest boys' club building in the city, with a floor space of 85x55 feet, and will be used by its founder as the center of his monthly entertainment and exhibition for his extension clubs.

A similar monthly entertainment and exhibition will be conducted by him in the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium and swimming pool for the clubs of the building proper.

In January, 1915, recognizing the need of some organization for the assistance of discharged prisoners and

paroled prisoners. Robley organized the Prison Aid Society with an advisory committee of the following named persons: William Jarrett, Ed Towse, A. E. Larimer, D. C. Peters, Dr. D. Scudder, Theodore Richards and Rev. John Erdman.
 A budget of \$800 is required by Mr. Robley for his many interviews with cases that come to his office for assistance. If the story could be told in detail many cases could be given in which Robley's work has been the means of straightening men up and giving them a new start in life.
 A strong part of Robley's work with boys is his interview system with them individually, in which a straightforward talk often results in a more manly attitude towards life on the part of the boy and undoubtedly many of his proteges are led from a possible life of "undesirable citizenship," to put it mildly and in general terms, to one of honest, worth-while service in the community.
 The nature of Robley's religious work is seen in the attendance at his weekly Oahu prison Bible class. Where formerly it had a membership of nine today there are 75 who attend each week.
 At the meeting yesterday the directors appointed W. A. Bowen and Paul Super as delegates to the international convention of the Young Men's Christian Association of North America to be held at Cleveland, Ohio, May 12-16. Forty-three members were voted into the Honolulu association, which brings the total membership up to 1761, the highest in its history.

SAYS HISTORY BIBLE PROPHECY THUS FULFILLED

"Bible prophecy is really history in advance, and history is simply Bible prophecy fulfilled." This was the opening sentence of the noted Evangelist McCord at the Opera House last night as he held his intelligent audience in the grip of one of the most interesting lectures yet delivered in this city. After a selection on the harp by Salvador S. DeNunzio, and a well rendered piece by the popular male quartet, the evangelist proceeded with the unfolding of one of Daniel's mysterious prophecies.

"In Daniel's day the seat of empire was established in the East. Then the East was highly civilized, while the West was but sparsely settled by roving tribes of barbarians. In spite of existing conditions Daniel, in the prophecy under consideration, pointed to the West as the seat of future empires. In the few verses in which this vision is recorded we have the whole history of the world from Daniel's day to our own. In this prophecy we can trace these empires on their westward course from the plains of Chaldaea, where the day dawned so brightly, to the shores of Europe, where we now behold the darkness of night closing around these nations now locked in the deadly embrace of fratricidal war.

All Bible prophecy is set in the mould of symbolism, and the many symbols used in connection with this particular vision of the prophet are all interpreted by the Bible itself. A 'sea' represented 'peoples and nations.' Rev. 17:15. 'The four winds' stood for war and commotion. Jer. 51:42. Beasts represented kings or kingdoms. Dan. 7:17. As a result, therefore, of this commotion, there arose four beasts—kings—out of the sea of humanity, and were the four great universal powers that ruled the world in succession—the lion, Babylon; the bear, Medo-Persian; the leopard, Grecia; and the fourth beast, a nondescript, Rome; and the 10 horns seen on the head of the fourth beast, the 10 kings that arose from the once universal power. And now what do we behold as a result of or the final event of this prophecy? The kingdom and dominion, and the greatness of the kingdom under the whole heaven, shall be given to the people of the saints of the Most High, whose kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and all dominions shall serve and obey him." Dan. 7:27.

The lecture for tonight will be: "New Lamps for Old Ones." Mrs. Julia Chilton, the popular singer, will render "The Holy City," and the harp soloist will play.
