GIRLS’ CLUB IN
SOCIAL PROGRAM**

**W. R. Farrington Speaks of
Advertising and Salesmanship
as Community Factors**

Sung to the tune of the Yale Boon,
the Honolulu Business Girl’s Club of
the Y. W. C. A. at its first “Gentle-
men’s Night” greeted W. R. Farrington,
their speaker for the evening,
with these verses:

“Did you ever—see his equal?
No we never—no we never.
Do you ever hope to see it?
No we never—no we never.”

The speaker told the assembled club
members and their guests of the rise
of Honolulu to a first-class city.

“The principal things that a club
like this engenders are enthusiasm, a
uniform spirit of courtesy, the desire
for giving real service-value, and the
effort to know one’s job better. Ad-
vertising and salesmanship are two of
the biggest things in business, and all
these things are necessary in every
worker so that salesmanship is of the

the club, informed those present that
90 years ago last night, on another
Friday, April 14, the first steamer
carrying missionaries lay off the har-
bor of Honolulu.

Miss Varney, acting general secre-
tary of the Y. W. C. A., in the absence
of Miss Caroline Chandler, resigned,
spoke on the subject of the summer
camps. In regard to the permanent
camp for business and professional
women, outlined in the Star-Bulletin
several days ago, Miss Varney said
that several sites had been offered
her, but that the most likely one was
a plot of 30 acres on the slope of
Haleakala, at an altitude of 4500 feet.
This project could be consummated if
at least 50 or 60 would contract to go
this summer, although 100 would be
necessary to make it an absolute, un-
qualified success from a financial and
every other standpoint.

Miss W. E. Frazee and Miss Car-
oline Chandler were voted in as
honorary members of the club, and a
letter of regret ordered to be writ-
ten by the secretary, Miss Hutchinson,
to Miss Chandler expressing the club’s
regrets at her resignation and depart-
ure from the local association.

The Y. M. C. A. orchestra played
the following numbers: Alliance
March, Joto; A Slippery Place, trom-
bone novelty; Hacker; Amaryllis, air
Louis XIII; Ghys; Aloha Oe waltzes,
Howard, and a number of encores.

At the close of the meeting a num-
ber of beautiful lantern slides were
shown by Dean Lake, photographer of
Bishop Museum, who took the pic-
tures himself in his trips around the
islands.
