**ENTIRE PINECTAR
INTERESTS SOLD
FOR ONE DOLLAR**

Factory Manager Smith-Hiorth
Is Purchaser and Will Hus-
tle for Business

Pinectar is going to enter a new
boom period, according to the plans
of L. Smith-Hiorth, manager of the
factory in Puhale street, Kalahehi,
where the beverage is made, he hav-
ing bought the entire interests of
Pinectar Company, Ltd., under fore-
closure at the salesrooms of J. F. Mor-
gan Co., Ltd., noon today.

One dollar was the purchase price,
being the only bid offered to Auc-
tioneer Swarzbarg, but the “buy” in-
cludes all the debts against the com-
pany, the chief of which is one of
\$6788.06 due to the Bank of Hawaii,
Ltd.

The purchase is also subject to a
bottling contract for five years with
Rycroft Arctic Soda Co., Ltd., and this
company will continue, at least during
the unexpired term of the contract,
to put up the product of the factory
for the retail trade. There is also a
bottling contract with a San Francis-
co firm, but this was not included in
the conditions of the sale. Pinectar,
as now well known at thousands of
soda fountains, is a syrup made from
pineapple juice.

Mr. Smith-Hiorth said after the sale
that he intended to work the business
for all it is worth, both here and on
the mainland, reorganizing the fac-
tory and pushing sales in all direc-
tions. Manager Lethead of the Ry-
croft company, who was present at
the sale, is taking a lively interest in
the plans of the new owner of the
pinectar factory.

**CHANGE OF DATE
FOR CARNIVAL
IS ADVOCATED**

Commenting on the tourist situation
and Honolulu's ability to care for its
visitors, Mr. Dougherty said:
“We of Honolulu have placed our-
selves in the position of manager of a
large factory who, when running to
the utmost capacity of his plant, has
endeavored to dispose of twice as
much as he can produce. We have
boosted our Carnival in a manner that
has called forth admiration—and I
firmly believe that it is one of the
grandest shows given anywhere on
earth. But, gentlemen, we are abso-
lutely unable to take care of the tour-
ist and send him away pleased, for
we are crowded to the extreme not
only with our business, but with that
spirit for which we are so famous,
hospitality.”

Mr. Dougherty stated that, in his
opinion, the present dates of the Car-
nival are all wrong; in other words, it
is “out of season.” “Does it occur to
you,” he added, “that June 11 is the
great day of celebration for Hawaii
and the Hawaiians? Of course it
does, and I am going to propose here
and now that June 11 replace Febru-
ary 22 as the pivotal day of our an-
nual Mid-Pacific Carnival.”

Speaking again of the tourist situa-
tion, Mr. Dougherty said, in part:
“Let us get busy and care for the
homeward-bound tourists. Let us
bring more tourists to Hawaii at a
time when, under ordinary circum-
stances, the business world of Hawaii
is in a comatose state; at a time when
many of our own people are seeking
recreation and amusement on the
mainland. Let us work to keep these
wanderers at home, and bring stran-
gers into our midst, giving them good
reason for coming.”


Immediate Start Urged.
Mr. Dougherty suggested that work
on the 1917 Mid-Pacific Carnival be-
gin at once. He recommended that
a permanent Carnival secretary be ap-
pointed, adding that it is unfair to
ask a businessman to assume these
responsibilities. “But by all means,”
he said, “select a businessman as di-
rector-general, and make the Carnival
secretaryship a position that will at-
tract a good man.”

In closing, Mr. Dougherty urged a
well-decorated city during Carnival
week, suggesting that the Outdoor
Circle be called into this phase of the
work, and letting the members have
something to say about Carnival af-
fairs.

“I would again appeal to you to
consider the capitalization of our
greatest asset, climate,” he said. “Let
us make Honolulu as famed around
the world as a summer resort as it
now is as a winter resort.”
