Bowling To Be Feature At Armory This Season

Three New Alleys Completed for Pin Spillers of National Guard—Members Make First Appearance on Maple Skid—Inter-Company Tournaments Will Be Promoted—Committee Plans to Purchase New Billiard Tables in Near Future

Three first-class bowling alleys have been completed at the National Guard armory, and for the first time the members of the National Guard took advantage of the sport yesterday afternoon, and a number of good scores were made.

There has been increased interest in bowling in Honolulu during the past year, and with the three new alleys at the armory and the Y. M. C. A. alleys, the Knights of the Maple Skid will have an opportunity to spill the pins.

Inter-Company Matches. The first move on the part of the committee in charge of the alleys will be the practice for those who wish to appear in the tournaments in the future or for match games. Later on an inter-company tournament will be formed, and these matches should bring out a heap of interest. There is easily enough material in the National Guard to make up at least 12 teams, and with the singles and doubles the big tournaments in the future should be a feature in local sports.

Right now the members of the National Guard are not saying much about issuing challenges, but as soon as the players get the head pin "dead," there will be considerable crowding around the city. It is possible that tournaments will be arranged later with the Y. M. C. A. contingent and the pinsmashers of the other islands. Billiards Coming. Since the appearance of Willie Hoppe and Koji Yamada at the armory, there has been an unusual amount of interest in billiards, and in the practice games the champions have shown enough to convince the members that billiard tables would be an asset to the organization.

ATHLETICS HAVE FOUND PLACE IN OPENING GAMES

Mack's Cellar Holders Settle in Well; Fielder Jones Should Not Finish Above Sixth

To date the Philadelphia Americans are about the only team that has struck their mid-season form. Connie Mack has started out with a hold on last place in Ban Johnson's circuit, and the critics believe that the Philadelphia team will finish in that same place.

In Honolulu the fans have begun to warm up on the situation and various predictions are made as to the outcome of the races in the major circuits. Fielder Jones has many friends in this city who believe that the Browns will win the pennant. It is true that the Browns have started out well, but the song this year will be "Will You Win 'Em in September as You Did in May?"

Looking at the group of players, Fielder Jones has on his team, the writer is inclined to believe that the squad will not hold up. If Fielder Jones lands his collection of players in sixth place this year he will be doing well. This prediction may not sound good to a number of the St. Louis followers, but notwithstanding there are a number of clubs in the American League which will have the edge on the squad from the Missouri city.

The addition of Tris Speaker will make the Cleveland squad strong, and Tillie Walker, who was let out by Fielder, will be a big addition to the Boston team. Jones will have Messers, Shottom and Sisler, three good fellows, but if Babe Borton fails to make good, and he will have to hurry to do so, Sisler will have to take the job at the first station, and St. Louis will miss Walker, who is one of the leading fielders in the league.

Buck Herzog has brought his Cincinnati team up close to the top, and should the Reds land a winner this year there will be much joy around the circuit, as it has been many moons since the Cincinnati club has won a pennant. With the teams fighting for first place this year, Herzog will have an excellent chance to show if his pitchers hold up.

Bill Donovan is another manager who is popular around the circuit, and a victory for the Yanks this year would help baseball around Gotham. With Magee, Gilhooly and Maisel in the outfield, and the showing made by Gedeon in training, the Highlanders will have a squad ready to fight for the flag. Otto Floto states that the Yanks will be far down this year, but inasmuch as Otto, as well as Hughes Fullerton, have failed in the past to pitch winners, the assertion of the Denver sport writer may be taken as a slam on Donovan's pitching staff, which does not appear to be the weakest in the league, by any means. When New York plays a few more games and the players get used to each other it might be well to look out for the Yanks.

It is planned to send one barge crew and one oar-cared crew from each club. Hilo will also enter one barge crew and one pair-oared.

YOUNGSTER AND VETERAN MAKE GOOD SHOWING

Speed Martin and Old Joe Corbett Show Up Well in Early Games in Coast League

Speed Martin, who was the star pitcher of the Olympic Club team which recently visited Honolulu, has signed with the Oakland team of the Pacific Coast League, and in his first game this year defeated the Salt Lake aggregation by a score of 3 to 0. Martin also appeared in another game, but was given the gate by the Coasters. Rowdy Elliott, the boss of the Oaks, intends to give Peaches a thorough tryout.

Old Joe Corbett, who used to be a star with the old Orioles at Baltimore 20 years ago, has once more taken his stand in the pitcher's box. He was given a tryout with the San Francisco Seals, and in a recent game in the Coast League held his opponents for four hits for six innings.

In case Corbett can show his worth it will be the first time in history that a pitcher has come back after such a long absence from the game. Joe Corbett, who is a brother of the ex-champion heavyweight boxer, played on the same team with Hughie Jennings and John McGraw, Wilbur Robinson, Billy Keeler and other stars. The fact that the first three are major league managers denotes that there was considerable head work in the play of the great Baltimore aggregation.

It has been definitely decided that the 100-yard national A. A. U. indoor swimming championship for women will be held in the Sutro Baths, San Francisco, on July 4. Two and probably three of the speediest mermaids of the East are to be on hand to bid for laurels.

The announcement was made a few days ago by the secretary of the governing body that tryouts would be staged in Boston, New York and Philadelphia, in order to ascertain the relative speed of the many candidates, and the election of the favored pair be made according to the times shown.

Consistent Performer. There is very little doubt, however, that Miss Claire Galligan of New York City and a member of the National Women's Lifesaving League will be sent, because she performs so excellently in competition. While not such a consistent record breaker as Miss Dornier, she nevertheless has most of her home championships, besides being the present 500-yard national champion, in winning this race a few days ago Miss Galligan established records for the 300 yards, 3:43 4/5; and the 500 yards in 8:05 1/5.

After winning the 500-yard title in record time and competing in the elimination heats of a 100-yard handicap, she took the final of the latter event in 1:13 4/5.
