WEST POINTERS WILL HOLD BIG FEAST IN JUNE

Data for the annual West Point dinner is being discussed by army officers, and though it has not been fixed definitely will probably be June 10 or 17. Officers from each regiment have been placed in charge of the general preliminaries, and these will later form into committees to arrange for the details of the dinner, which always is one of the big events of the year.

Stunts of various kinds and short speeches and toasts are given at the feast, many of the officers breaking forth into eloquence or poetry formerly kept hidden. The dinner last year was held at the Moana hotel, and more than 150 officers were present. At another time it was held at Haleiwa. The place has not yet been fixed for this year.

Brig. Gen. John P. Wisser, commanding the Hawaiian Department, is at present the oldest West Pointer in active service on the island, but owing to the fact that he leaves within a short time, will not be at the banquet. Brig. Gen. Robert K. Evans, who succeeds Gen. Wisser, will probably fill his place also in point of age, as Brig. Gen. Evans is to retire for age next November.

B Troop, after playing such a remarkably good game against E, dragging this team down from first place, felt a keen disappointment at being snowed under 12 runs by G Troop yesterday.

POLICE NOTES


Nikandre Tokareff, a 17-year-old Russian lad, in jumping off a moving street car yesterday stumbled and fell. He was unconscious for about an hour.
